PLEASE NOTE:- To fish Snipe Lake, Westlake (formerly Tuscany Lake) Daughters Lake and Majors Lake there are certain tackle requirements in force. Please call or look on our website at beaverfarmfishery.co.uk. All anglers on Westlake are required to have a dedicated Catfish mat and you are required to have a large unhooking mat and minimum 36inch net to fish Majors Lake.

Snipe Lake has seen a fair few fish banked, various original mirrors to 31lbs, stockie mirrors to 26lbs and commons to 32lbs

14ozs. The biggest common fell to Jordan Simpson who gets a special mention as it was his 1st fish from Snipe Lake and also a PB.

Westlake has seen cats banked from 7lbs all through the 20's, 30's, 40's 50's and right up to 68lbs. A special mention goes to a few PBs. Relvin Rapley banked a few to a 38lbs 14ozs PB and Marcus Cole banked a 63lbs 8ozs PB.

Jeff's Lake has been producing bream to 6lbs, F1's to 6lbs, lots of new stockie mirrors to 4lbs, commons and mirrors to 12lbs.

Daughters Lake has produced plenty of mirrors up to 16lbs, commons to 18lbs 14ozs and grassies to 28lbs 8ozs.

Eden Pond has produced carp to 8lbs, bream to 5lbs and plenty of tench to just under 5lbs.

Maze Lake has seen most anglers banking multiples of fishes, with mirror and common carp

to 8lbs, ghost carp to 6lbs and bream to 6lbs.

Majors Lake has seen anglers banking bream to over 8lbs, tench to 7lbs, fully scaled mirrors to 21lbs 9ozs, commons to 19lbs and a new lake record mirror at 28lbs 6ozs caught by Ben Bradley which is also a new PB for him.










Hopefully by the time this article goes to print my landing net would have been slipped under some nice Summer Chub as I intend to make up for lost time as last year's river campaign was nothing short of a disaster as most river sections I wanted to fish were in flood or unfishable and talking to many anglers their river fishing had to take a back seat for the same reasons so let's cross our fingers for better fortunes this time round.

Although my freezer has last season's stock of cheese and meat paste ready to go I still like to, as part of my preparation process, make up a fresh batch so stinky cheese like stilton, extra strong grated cheddar has been wafting around the garden from my mixing bowl to remind the neighbours that the new river season is near. It can be a time consuming process knocking up stinky cheese paste but very rewarding when you are looking into the landing net pan with a big fat chub sitting in it a few days later. I sometimes blitz through a blender slices of bread to mix in to form the paste or I like to use good old Aunt Bessies Shortcrust Pastry Mix which has 14g of fat content in a 500g bag size and fat is a good attractor for the hungry chub especially as they will be looking to build up the body weight again after fighting against strong currents for most of the winter season. I spend a good hour or so knocking up a few cheese paste balls for the freezer stock and the more you kneed the paste the better it will be so if you think you have reached the right consistency then you probably haven't so continue for another ten minutes until your hands and fingers have cried enough! However with cheese paste in my bait bag there is one other bait that I take with me and that is a good supply of very soft sliced bread which I have found to be deadly when targeting chub, it is such a great bait to use. I prefer to present my flake on what I like to call a 'loop hair rig' and on my Fishing Tail Films YouTube channel in the #shorts section I show the rig to camera along with the components to make it for your fishing sessions. If you are never confident that the bread is still attached to your hook then this set up will be the answer you are looking for as fishing with bread is a confidence thing and knowing the bait is still attached brings such confidence when it a waiting game type of fishing session.

The National Tench Champs

Next month I will give an update on how my early chub sessions panned out as I will as ever be filming along the way in the hope of catching that special fish or new PB. In last month's column I mentioned I competed in the 2024 National Tench Championships at Linear Fisheries on Oxlease Lake. It was another fantastic event but sadly for me the tench stayed away from my baits as it did for 15 of the 28 competitors but I did put the net under a cracking looking Common of 24lbs 15ozs as you can see by the photo. 28 tench came out in total with a few in the 9lbs bracket so some quality tincas were caught plus some big carp on tench gear with 35lbs being the biggest. I was in the only section that never troubled the steward to weigh in a tench apart from numerous carp so I am beginning to wonder if Oxlease has it in for me as that is two years running this has happened or I have just been plain unlucky and if I manage to get a ticket for next year's event and a tench blank happens again then I will have to wave the white flag of surrender.

The Result

Wyn Jones with 4 tench for a total of 31lbs 8oz was crowned the National Tench Champion ahead of Matt Perring who also had 4 tench but with a lesser weight of 28lbs 9ozs with in third place Jason Stokes with 3 tench for 25lbs 4ozs. Mark Davis collected the biggest tench trophy with a fine specimen of 9lbs 12ozs and whilst I competed in the 48 hour event I also produced a video for my channel so if you are intrigued as to what this great event is all about then you can view the build-up, updates during the competition plus the presentation and prize giving awards where some fantastic prizes were given out by the sponsors. Well done to all those that competed, the event organiser Ben Kennedy and all the stewards from the TenchFishers for making the event very enjoyable to fish and take part in plus all the sponsors like Linear Fisheries, Harrison Rods, The Tackle Box in Dartford and Hook Bait Company, roll on 2025.

Looking Ahead

I have always been an angler that looks ahead to my fishing exploits and by that I mean planning for the next part of the season whether that is spring, summer, autumn and winter and so on. I do get on my own nerves sometimes being this way as whilst fishing in summer for example I am looking what I need to be doing for the up and coming autumn and winter months. So instead of enjoying my summer fishing I am worrying about what I should be doing in the next few weeks of the season ahead, yes it is good to plan but I think I over plan and then the heavy rains arrive and destroy what I was planning to do which then becomes very frustrating. I think because I film more nowadays I feel the need to plan more and forever checking on the weather forecast for up and coming fishing sessions. During my match fishing days I planned like there was no tomorrow and know that for a successful match or session you have to put in effort as opposed to just turning up and chucking a line out in the water and hoping for the best, I can't do that, fishing to me is pointless if I just turn up unprepared and having no kind of set plan of what methods to use, bait to feed with and what species to target. I am prepared to walk two miles along a rugged riverbank and have a good days fishing than fish a few yards away from my car and have an average day catching. I know some anglers have

health issues and walking long distances is not possible I have met many on my travels over the years and I really feel for them but whilst I am capable to reach sections of big lakes or rivers where the fish tend to be I will walk that yard until my body tells me otherwise.

Eels. I love them

I saw recent reports of a huge eel well over 11lbs being caught which is likely to beat the current record of 11lbs 2ozs, what a fish and what an achievement. Catching eels on my summer holidays to Reculver Cliffs back in the late 60s and early 70s hold happy memories as I loved catching them and watch that float move along the surface before sliding away out of sight before I struck into some frantic rod bending action, it was great sport. I also won a few matches on the River Rother targeting eels whilst other anglers were scratching around for small bleak on the surface. I was then catching the eels on the pole on the first ledge after just feeding for the first two hours with dead maggots and chopped up worms. Great when a plan comes together.

Fishery Reports

Greenacres Farm Fishery Biddenden, Kent

Speci 1 This lake has come alive and has been rewarding people with some lovely fish which have all fallen to lightly baited areas fishing a solid pva bag over the top. The main goal in this lake is to keep topping up your spots with bait to keep the fish in your area as their metabolism to feed is a lot higher now that the hotter temperatures are here. Perch fishing on here has been rewarding to anglers that are willing to fish for them with some just shy of 3lbs. These fish have all been caught on float fishing tactics by using worm or maggot on the hook and constantly sprinkling maggots over the top on every cast with a catapult to keep the rudd and roach in the swim that then attracts the big perch.

Speci 2 The carp in this lake have been coming out by fishing to margin spots with solid pva bags or a little pva mesh bag and using fruity or sweet boilies like cell. Catfish are the more dominant fish in this lake and do push out the carp feeding in your area, as they will eat anything. But if you wish to just target the catfish then the best method is to use high attractant boilies or pellet like krill boilies or marine halibut pellet over a large bed of pellet that's soaked in a fishy attractant.

Heron People have been having a cracking time on here catching large mixed bags of silvers and carp on both float and method feeding tactics. Baits that seem to be working is maggots, castors and worms over a ball of groundbait when float fishing and feeder fishing seems to be banded 10mm pellets.

Kingfisher This lake is the one to be on any time of the year as it produces lovely mixed bags of fish and keeps you going all day. Fish can literally be caught on the top two sections of your pole on any bait that you wish to use, as long as you stick to the rules.

Bluebell Tench and carp are still being caught out of this pond and the key is to bait up little and often with a pole pot or with a


catapult and add a ball of groundbait every now and again just to keep their heads down grubbing around.

Don't forget to dip your nets, slings and unhooking mats/cradles or you will be asked to leave. **CCTV IS IN OPERATION!**







An unforeseen aspect of the Covid Pandemic was that as the country came out of lockdown, people turned to the British countryside for outdoor recreation in their tens of thousands and much of this was centred on our rivers. Angling, the quiet, contemplative rural pastime we'd long taken for granted, suddenly found itself marginalised as hordes of canoeists, kayakers, wild swimmers and paddle-boarders took to the water in ever increasing numbers, accompanied of course by others whose idea of a day in the country would be to leave the riverbanks liberally festooned with all manner of noxious litter. All was not lost however, far from it in fact as many of these new converts to the great outdoors, often well-educated and highly motivated, soon found themselves appalled by the shocking state of our rivers and coastline where polluters have been allowed to run rampant for decades as successive governments, keen to avoid sanctioning water bill increases had colluded with privatised water companies to cover up their lack of investment, stating that all was hunky-dory.

This of course was far from true and as we anglers had been telling everyone for generations, our rivers were in some cases little more than open sewers. Sewage treatment works designed and built in the immediate post-war decades being overwhelmed by our rapidly expanding communities, with some now barely fit for purpose.

Not surprisingly a huge outcry resulted, with all manner of campaigners and activists stirring up a furore of dissent, those with catchy sounding titles like 'Surfers against Sewage' grabbing the national media's attention. Angling of course had its heroes too like Paul Whitehouse, Bob Mortimer and Feargal Sharkey, with Paul and Feargal emerging as national spokespersons when it came to highlighting the many failings of our water industry. The role of anglers as guardians of our environment was finally becoming recognised.

However there's yet another new initiative swiftly gaining traction throughout the country, which has hitherto gone largely unnoticed. I refer to the burgeoning 'Rights for Rivers' movement.

I live in East Sussex where my local River Ouse is being used as a test case for rolling out a 'Rights for Rivers' programme throughout Britain, the proposals from which could start to become enshrined in law within as little as two years' time. Driven by 'green' leaning councillors and politicians, together with sympathetic representatives from both the Rivers and Wildlife Trusts and based on models already successfully implemented in Columbia and Venezuela, the group's proposed Charters will seek to define rivers and the wildlife dependent on them as living entities having legal rights akin to those enjoyed by human beings. 'Rights of Rivers' would thus by definition give equal rights to all the biodiversity contained within rivers, akin to the 'Human Rights' already granted to ourselves via existing legislation. Its exponents refer to this as an 'ecocentric' approach, as opposed to what they consider to be the 'homocentric' approach which has until now been applied via the UN Charter for the Earth (1982). The model being embraced is that which was applied to the Atrato River in Columbia in 2016, where illegal logging and mining were poisoning the river to a dreadful extent (mercury etc.). The indigenous people went to court and were granted 'River Rights' under which they could sue their government. The court recognised the river's biodiversity as a priority and granted it legal status, subject to international law principles.

All of which might appears quite commendable until one learns that In 2022 the Columbian Supreme Court took a quantum leap further and decided to ban all recreational angling throughout that country, based on what they termed a 'precautionary principle' even though they recognised there's no compelling evidence to prove fish suffer as a result of catch & release. As things stand it seems this has not yet been enforced, though the court's decision appears not to have been revoked.

My local angling club (The Ouse Angling Preservation Society), being based close to Lewes, was consulted by the organisers of our local Rights for Rivers movement ('Love our Ouse') and I immediately volunteered my services. Naturally, given the fact that such an organisation is bound to attract some with deeply held animal rights convictions, I felt it was essential that angling interests were properly represented here. To that end I've undertaken a series of presentations about the fish which live in



our local river, not just from an angling perspective but also looking at the threats they have to face such as pollution, abstraction, habitat

loss (via unwarranted weir removals etc.), commercial exploitation and predation. I'm pleased to say that these have been generally well received to date and that feedback so far has been very positive. Understandably perhaps, many folk are quite knowledgeable about animals, plants, trees etc.; things which they commonly encounter, yet have very little knowledge about the lives of our wild fish, other than as a source of food for various creatures. The fact that some species can live for thirty, forty, fifty years and more, or that they can only spawn successfully under certain conditions, whilst common knowledge to us, comes as a real surprise to many; as does the fact that those fishes with a low tolerance to pollution or poor water quality can be vital indicator species in this respect. In addition to discussing the fish themselves, highlighting the good work carried out by Fish Legal and its predecessors, the ACA and the Pure Rivers Society, going back to the beginning of the last century, helps reinforce angling's rightful place at the cutting edge of environmental campaigning. Other speakers at the seminars I've attended have included representatives from the local Rivers and Wildlife Trusts plus the Water Company, together with the environmental lawyers who are drafting the actual charter, so a broad and largely well-informed balance of views is being represented here.

Local Rights of Rivers movements plus other similar initiatives are rapidly spreading throughout Britain. At the last count, at least nine other such groups are in the process of development and these include the Bristol Avon, Cam, Dart, Don, Deben, Exe, Medway, Severn and Wensum. It goes without saying that angling interests need to be properly represented here so if you're aware of any such activity in your area, please don't hesitate to become positively involved, as we can't afford to be complacent or to allow other interests to dictate the future of our waterways. Angling has a long and justifiably proud history at the forefront of freshwater environmentalism and needs to underpin its position here by forming a helpful and integral part of all these various movements, going forward.

Jim's Journey

RESHWATER

Up until very recently, Jim Relf's experience with rod and line was limited to a few holiday sessions tiddler bashing with a float rod. All that changed this spring when Jim and a few of his friends started to take a more focused interest in the sport, looking to catch fish by design, rather than just as a way of killing time at a campsite. Giving us an ideal opportunity to follow his progress as he sets out on the well trodden path that we've all walked at some point. What are the pro's, and cons, of becoming an angler in 2024?

PART 1 - Where to start?

I must admit that I have an advantage over many new anglers. A dad that has amassed far more tackle than he'll ever need, over a lifetime of fishing, does mean that I am able to beg, borrow, or steal, rods, reels, landing nets and all of the hardware needed to get out on the bank, without breaking the bank.

It's only temporary, or so I tell him, until I find out which direction my fishing will take me. With the basics sorted, I still wanted to have my own input and do my own learning, so a trip to a tackle shop was the next stop.

Walking through the door of Jack Frost Tackle, in Crawley, I was blown away by the number of products on display. It was difficult to know what I needed, or where to start. Luckily, a guy called Joe, who works there, realised that I was out of my depth and came over to help me. I explained that I was interested in trying to catch a carp. Joe took me over to one of the displays and explained what did what, and why you might use it in certain situations. The most important thing that he told me was that when starting out, keep things as simple as possible. He showed me how to set up a lead clip, a variety of leads for different scenarios, and how to attach a basic pre-tied hair rig to create a simple but effective presentation. He talked me through the different types of bait, but again suggested that rather than complicate things with pop-ups, wafters or balanced baits, I should pick a proven food bait that I could use for baiting up, and as a hookbait. On his recommendation I chose a bag of 18mm fishmeal boilies. With the business end sorted, I was raring to go.

The following afternoon, dad was planning to visit Furnace Brook Fishery to do some feeder fishing and asked if I wanted to tag along. I didn't need asking twice. I looked at some of the articles on the lake that have appeared in the Freshwater Informer, and found some videos on YouTube. From what I saw and read, it seemed that quite a few fish get caught from the margins, so that

would be a good place to target. On arrival, I picked a swim on the corner of the lake. Dad pointed out an overhanging tree as a good spot, which backed up what Joe had told me the day before about how it was better to fish accurately in your own margin, rather than try and cast to the far side of the lake and be fishing badly. I tackled up my borrowed rod, and dad disappeared off to find a swim for himself.

Due to where I was fishing, I could walk along the bank and swing my rig out to where I wanted it. Then I baited up with a handful of boilies over the top of it. I walked back to the swim and put the rod on some rod rests, clipped on the bobbin, and turned on the alarm. Then sat and waited. I had read about looking for 'feeding bubbles' but a stiff breeze was making it hard to see, although on the plus side the breeze was pushing into the bank where my bait was. I had been told that this was a good thing, as it blows natural food into the area which the fish will follow. After about fifteen minutes the bite alarm let out a few beeps and the bobbin twitched a couple of times. I hovered over the rod but nothing else happened. It did it again a few minutes later, but again nothing happened. I thought that it might be the wind catching the line, but the third time it happened the bobbin went right up to the rid and the rod tip bent around, before the bait runner started to click into life.

I grabbed the rod and lifted into the fish. The first mistake I made was to not disengage the bait runner, and line fizzed off the spool. The second was to have

the drag set too tight, so that when I turned the reel handle the rod was nearly pulled out of my hand. Whatever was on the end was much bigger than the small roach I had caught float fishing on holiday. I quickly loosened the drag off to a point where the fish had to put a decent bend in the rod before it could take line. I was pretty sure that I had hooked a carp, but I know that there are a variety of species in the lake so didn't want to get too excited. The longer the fight went on, the more sure that I was, and when a big tail broke the surface, I knew it had to be a carp. After what seemed like forever, I had to try and net it. I had a 42inch net with me that was more than bigger enough, but trying to get everything lined up was guite a challenge. I'm sure it will become more naturally to me as I get more experience, but I was sure that I would loose the carp on

more than one occasion. Eventually I got the rod high enough, and the net low enough, to bundle the fish into the mesh.

I couldn't quite believe it. I had done what I set out to achieve and caught a carp. I went to get dad and he showed me how to set up the unhooking mat and handle the fish safely. The barbless hook came out really easily.

The fish looked huge to me, and we weighed it at 9lbs 2ozs. I can't imagine what it must be like to catch a twenty or thirty pounder. Hopefully I'll find out one day. We took some photos then carried the fish back to the water in the mat, before letting it go.

I repeated the process of placing the bait, and baiting up and just before we were due to leave I hooked and landed a slightly smaller carp. Incredibly, dad landed a 15lb'er on his feeder rod at almost the same time and we a great photo of us both holding our fish.

I definitely feel that I've learnt the first piece of the puzzle and feel confident that I am ready to go out on my own and stand a chance of catching, but that will have to wait until next month.

Of all the methods I use to catch fish, fly fishing is my favourite. It's a hunting style of fishing, find the food, and you'll find the fish. Like lure fishing it's possible to catch fish that aren't actually feeding. Once located, it's then a process of working out how to catch them. This can be as simple as just changing flies. Maybe a colour change is enough, or switching from un-weighted to weighted patterns, to trigger takes 'on the drop'. I'm always thinking about my next change in tactics, there's always another way! If you want to kick back and relax, then maybe fly fishing isn't for you?

PIKE ON THE FLY

As many will know, I've spent thousands of hours in pursuit of pike. I've used live baits, dead baits, and lures to catch fish from lakes, rivers and reservoirs. On odd occasions I've fly fished, usually when it was the only method allowed. So, not my first choice method!

This spring, however I choose to fly fish for pike on Bewl Water. I was on a mission to track down some of its elusive large pike. The migration of pike into the shallow margins at spawning time, meant I could eliminate most of the seven hundred and seventy acres of water. Casting lures into such shallow, weedy water would be frustrating. So I choose to fly fish instead. The fly line would deliver my un-weighted flies into the shallows

The predator becomes the prey

with no fear of snagging. Although I was hoping to catch a monster, in reality I was just hoping to see one!

My first two days were spent searching all the creeks and bays around the reservoir. These were potential spawning sites. The water was cold and dirty, so I wasn't expecting much. To my surprise, I did catch a few jacks. Often the smaller male pike arrive in the spawning bays before the larger females. So I was happy I'd discovered some locations worth revisiting on future trips.

I waited a couple of weeks, for the water to warm, before my next visit, I hoped more fish would be in the shallows. The pike I'd caught previously had come from grassy banks, rather than the tree or bush lined shoreline. Always looking for a pattern, I focused on the grass banks first, before trying the trees and bushes. Bewl can be a 'ball breaker', blanking on my next three days wasn't in my game plan! Despite not catching, I was strangely enjoying myself. I was getting more comfortable casting my 'heavy duty' #10 weight outfit, quite a contrast from my #6 trout rod!

On day six, as I motored up 'Hook straight', I inexplicably found myself drawn towards some overhanging bushes, along 'Bryant's point'. The water was gin clear and looked very inviting. I cast my floating line parallel to the bushes. As I watched my mohican 'wiggle tail' fly slowly sink, I suddenly became aware of a pike right next to it. I quickly twitched the line and saw the fish shoot forward, engulfing the fly. I set the hook and enjoyed a brief battle, this fish was no monster. Encouraged by this success, I worked my way along the bank. A small tree overhanging the water caught my eye. My cast landed perilously close, as I straightened my leader, the fly line twitched. This was enough for me to set the hook into another small pike. Two fish in less than half an hour, saw my confidence restored. So how did I manage to blank for the next seven hours? That was my last session,

the water was getting close to the 'tipping point' of 18 to 20 'C', when pike suffer from 'heat stress'. So what did I learn? Not a lot really. Despite my best efforts, I didn't see the monsters I'd hoped for.

TACKLE A 9ft, #9 or 10 weight rod is required to cast big air resistance pike flies. A selection of sinking lines, the most versatile being the intermediate, will allow you to search through the depths. Fulling Mill have a large selection of pike flies, take my advice and get several Wiggle tail patterns, the pike just want to 'kill' these! Fulling Mill also supply a range of pike leaders too.



Bass are available all along the Kent and Sussex coast. The peak time to fish for them is from June through to October. So they make a great alternative to pike during the warmer months. I'm no expert when it comes to bass, their locations or the tides effect on their behaviour. Fortunately I know a man who is! Robin Howard, AKA 'Fishy Rob' is a lure and fly fishing fanatic! He can be contacted via Facebook at 'Brighton Inshore Fishing'. Based in Brighton, Rob has an intimate knowledge of where and how to catch bass, from the beaches and estuaries along the Sussex coast. Rob also applies this knowledge to boat fishing, out of Brighton Marina. I joined Rob for a fun day afloat a few years ago, we fly fished, while others aboard used lures. It was interesting seeing how each method produced fish at different states of the tide, 'every day's a learning day'.



TACKLE A #7 weight trout rod with a floating line is all you'll need when shore fishing. I used 'Seaguar Hard' fluorocarbon leader in 15.4lb [0.285mm], a selection flies should include; Clouser minnows, Leftv's deceivers, 'Softy' minnows and 'Softy' sandeels. For boat fishing I would add a selection of sinking lines; intermediate, Di3 and Di7.

ZANDER ON THE FLY

Another viable target for fly anglers. You need look no further than Grafham or Rutland reservoirs for somewhere to start. However there are good populations of zander in many rivers now, including the Thames. Although mainly a nocturnal predator, zander are very feisty, and will not hesitate to hit a fly that comes too close! Being a shoal fish, once you



catch one, others should follow. Although not the hardest fighters, they definitely make up for this by their appearance. Takes from zander are what keep you coming back for more, 'the tug is the drug'.

TACKLE An #8 or 9 weight rod, with a selection of sinking lines, depending on whether you are boat or bank fishing. Zander are most often caught close to the bottom, so use a line that will keep your fly close to the deck throughout the retrieve. Consider using very short leaders, with a buoyant fly to achieve an aggressive 'down and up' movement, as you inch retrieve the fly along the bottom. Wire tippets are unnecessary, I use 'Seaguar Hard' fluorocarbon in 19lb [0.33mm].

BARBEL ON THE FLY?



Not a species you would expect to catch on a fly, right? By the way, I'm talking about Iberian Barbel. I have fished large reservoirs in the Extremadura region of Spain. There are several species of barbel in Spain and Portugal, the most famous being the Comizo, which can exceed 30lbs. The exciting thing about fishing for these 'wild' fish, is the vast empty waters they inhabit. Often you don't see another angler all day, bliss! Finding the barbel requires walking miles of shoreline. Scanning the crystal clear water for any signs of fish, before you even think about casting. When you do find fish, that's when the fun really begins. The barbel are feeding in very skinny water, so a stealthy approach is vital. They appear to be feeding on microscopic food items, such as corixa and daphnia. Whatever it is they can be induced to take a dry fly! Once hooked, these torpedoes take off at 'break neck speed', heading for the horizon. Definitely the best dry fly fishing I've ever experienced!

TACKLE I use a #6 weight outfit with a floating line. I use 'Seaguar Hard' fluorocarbon 8.8lb [0.205mm] for my leader, for its abrasion resistance. The barbel's lips are very abrasive! Flies need to be buoyant and easily seen. I use Bob's beetles, a black foam backed pattern with a Hi-vis "hot spot" on its back. This makes it easily to spot in the waves or weed, where barbel are often found. Two other essentials, are quality sunglasses and a canteen for water. Its hot in Spain in June and September, when I fish you can't do without either!

CARP ON THE FLY

Over the last five or six years I've become more and more obsessed with catching carp during the summer. The main difference, from all my other fly fishing, is I feed floating bait to attract the them to the surface, and to draw then into my casting range. There is a skill to this, which I have written about in detail, in past articles. I've just completed a carp fly fishing 'blog' for 'Fulling Mill Flies', which will be posted on their web-site very soon. This covers everything you need to know about catching carp on the fly!

TACKLE I use an #8 weight outfit in snag free waters, and a #10 when targeting fish over 25lbs. Matched with a weight forward floating line. Leader material is 'Sufix Duraflex', a co-polymer nylon in 15lb [0.25mm]. This ultra fine material is a 'game changer' for surface fishing, or

zig-rigging! A selection of Fulling Mill's deer hair mixer flies and Disco's completes the outfit. Lastly, some 'Gink' fly floatant and 'Leader Sink' degreaser, to make the fly float and the last few inches of leader sink.

CATFISH ON THE FLY!

Now this is a species I've only just started fly fishing for. I've not got much to say about techniques or tactics at this stage, but I'm sure I will learn a lot as I do more. The one thing I've already noticed, is I get takes very soon after moving into a swim. Changing casting angles, or flies hasn't induced any further action, so moving frequently seems to be a necessity?

TACKLE I'm currently using a #10 weight outfit, but might step up to #12 if fish sizes dictate. A selection of fly lines, floating, sink tip and intermediate have all been used on the lakes I fish, which rarely exceed ten feet [3m] in depth. I'm current using some of my pike flies attached to 44lb [0.52mm] 'Seaguar Hard' fluorocarbon. Catfish have very abrasive mouths, covered in micro 'velcro' like teeth, so wire is unnecessary.



Trout, where it all starts

If you've never tried fly fishing, I strongly recommend you start with trout. It's a simple style of fishing, which requires very little stuff to get started. It's surprisingly in-expensive when compared with other forms of fishing. There are several local waters, Bewl, Brick Farm, Spring Hill and Tenterden, that can help you out with casting instruction, advise and fishing of course. So what are you waiting for?



July update

This time of year, is a very busy time in the school fishing calendar. Fishing for Schools got their Kent programme underway at the start of May and will be busy with various schools up until the end of July when the schools go on their summer break.



Les Jones, who now runs the Fishing for school's programme in Kent, sent me over a few stories, which gives an insight to his school sessions.

Thamesview School, Gravesend at Grove Farm Fishery, Hadlow

Another sunny Monday for Thamesview and we welcomed a new fly-fishing coach. David Fisher has joined our Kent team, a recommendation from Bob Goble. One of the students spent the morning with David and was so taken with the new skill of fly casting, that he was keen after lunch to have another session with David.





He watched patiently as another student started the afternoon session with David but was asking questions all the time. At the end of the day, he said he was going to ask

his parents to buy him a fly-fishing kit. We had a wheelchair student who was very keen. He was putting bait on, casting a whip and with help unhooking and returning fish. Everyone caught decent sized roach, plus the share of big carp as is normal at Hadlow. At the end of the session, all students, obtained cast starter and cast level one awards. We had a short recap and a presentation ceremony, where they were all presented with certificates for passing.

Longfield Academy at Grove Farm Fishery, Hadlow

They had been so unlucky with the weather, the two sessions that they have had so far have been in heavy rain.

Again, all students were shown basic whip set ups. Catching, roach, perch, and of course hooking carp. I had a margin pole set up and explained why we gear up the tackle to target and land safely the bigger fish. Explaining how the elasticated sections of a strong pole work. One student who had been with me all day, said that after catching smaller fish, she wanted to have a go with the margin pole for something bigger. With the last cast of the day, fishing with suspended bread flake, we watched as a 12lbs common circled the bait before

taking it. The squeal, of delight from the student could be heard across the lake "I've hooked a big one". Very soon the 12lbs was in the net, then unhooked on the mat before being photographed and returned safely. Thanks to the Tackle box Dartford for sponsoring Longfield Academy for this course.

Rowhill School, Longfield

I (Warren White) work mainly now with one school, Rowhill SEN school at Longfield, where we combine fishing and teaching a fishing qualification. When I first started at the school 16 years ago, we had two students on the course. Recently at a meeting at the school, planning for the coming year, we have 16 students wanting to do the fishing course. It just shows the demand for young people wanting to fish.

Rowhill School, fishing sessions

A good session at Hadlow today with Rowhill school. We have been a bit unlucky with the weather this week, Tuesday and today it rained throughout the session although it did not dampen the spirits of the students, who seemed to really enjoy the day. The two students I was coaching today opted to fish on the bottom with feeders. One who loves a long cast, went close to the island in the middle of the lake and the other fished close in. He was fishing in the margins, catapulting a few pellets in, close to a bush and an easy under arm cast with a little method



feeder combined with pineapple wafter, saw it hitting the same spot each cast. The lad fishing near the island couldn't get a bite but the lad fishing in the margins, had four carp and lost a few. A lesson to be learnt here. To his credit the lad who struggled near the island, changed tactics as the session went on, fed on top and soon had the fish feeding, and near the end of the session had a nice carp.



On another day we took a field trip to Allhallows to look at the difference in fresh and saltwater environments. What a beautiful day! The students really seemed to enjoy being at a such a beautiful and peaceful place. The lads combed the beach looking for things of interest and had fun finding various crustacean shells. We had a fish on a freshwater dyke, which is just beginning to wake up after the recent wet and cold conditions. A few rudd


caught today but the potential for some nice fish in the coming months.

Part of the BTEC course work this year at Rowhill school, has been learning about Aquatic environments and part of this is about learning how to identify different flora that live in these environments to better understand how to care for the water and surrounding land.

On a recent angling session with Rowhill school at Shorne country park, Gravesend. Something pointed out to me, was a distinctive and beautiful plant that was growing on the edge of the path next to the lake. The Bee Orchid is a sneaky imitator the flowers look identical to a female bee. Males fly in to try to mate with it and end up pollinating the flower. Nature at its best.



The Golden Years of Coarse Fishing

Legends of the 60's - No.4 Bernard Venables MBE 1907 - 2001



Bernard Venables, or B.V as we all came to know him, was no great captor of huge coarse fish, but his writings, paintings and drawings from 1940 to 2000 were inspirational to generations of young anglers.


An accomplished artist and newspaper journalist, who started his working life in Fleet Street on the Daily Express in 1937 at the age of 30, his first published work was a brochure on Tank Warfare in 1942.

Born in Catford in 1907, his family soon moved out to the Kentish countryside, to Ham Street on the edge of Romney Marsh, then to South Norwood during the First World War, where he discovered the joys of fishing, wildlife and the English countryside, before a move back to the outer London suburbs again.

His interest in fishing brought his first angling book 'A Fisherman's Testament' in 1949 together with 34 of his b/w line drawings at the insistence of his journalistic friend a Victor Taylor, with whom he drank in the bar of the 'Olde Bell Pub' in Fleet Street just after the war.

My first edition of this book once belonged to his work colleague Maurice Wiggin to whom he presented it in Nov 1949 with a signed copy, Maurice gave it to me years ago.

The books 'Fishing' and 'Fish and Fishing' came next in 1953, but it was the cartoon strip 'Mr Crabtree Goes Fishing', first published in 1949, that really first put BV's angling artistry on the map in a very big way. Bernard was poached by the Daily Mirror in 1946 and they wanted to promote fishing in the paper, and BV was the man to do it. Mr Crabtree was originally a gardening strip, but come the winter months when all gardening was done, Mr Crabtree turned to fishing with his fictional son Peter, modelled on his real son Julian. Jack Hargreaves suggested the name, himself an original Fleet St man from days gone by. The Mirror sold millions in those days, and the fishing strip proved very popular, so popular that Jack Hargreaves, himself a well known angler suggested that it should be made into a book. This was done, and in 1949 the famous paperback book printed its first edition which sold out in no time. Later editions followed and it ended up selling over 2 million copies at 5 shillings a copy. Bernard was on the staff of the Daily Mirror so never received a penny from its vast

Angling became a great feature of the old Daily Mirror, they gave prizes for the fish of the week and an annual Angling Awards dinner and ceremony to which all the great anglers of the time attended. This was all well before my time in angling, I never did see a copy of the paper with Mr Crabtree in it, but Bernard stayed on at the Mirror until 1953 when he was asked to start the Angling Times up in Peterborough by the East Midland Allied Press in July by Howard Marshall.

Countless young boys grew up in the 50s and 60s reading the exploits of pipe smoking Mr Crabtree and his son Peter, catching fish to die for, Tench and carp in summer, Barbel and perch in Autumn and Pike in the winter on plugs, from idyllic pristine well stocked waters in the south of England, an era long since passed us by I regret to say. The colour plate of the Rudd on page 91 eying a surface fly are imprinted on my mind! I met him once in that glorious fishing tackle shop J. Peak and Sons at 40 Grays Inn Road off High Holborn. I went to school at Blackfriars on the Embankment and often

walked to the shop after school past Fetter Lane, where BV's office was in the

appropriately named Breams Buildings. One day on a late summers afternoon, when I should have been at sports day, I went up there and talked my sort of sport with Bernard Venables in the shop. We talked of Roach of Kennet Chub and of Keston Ponds which he knew all about.

I had just caught my first Keston Carp and he wanted to know all about it. Then Trevor Housby came in and the talk turned to that of Shark off the Azores and big game fishing off Fowey in Cornwall. I was out of my depth by then and made a hasty retreat, I lived on that encounter for many years! In 1953 BV teamed up with Jack Thorndyke and Howard Marshall to start the new publication Angling Times, now in its 71st year, he wrote a column in it for 9 years from 1953 to 1962. I bought my first copy in August 1957 for just 6 old pence, had the headline 'Bob does it again' referring of course to Bob Reynolds massive carp catches from Billing Aquadrome in Northampton. This is what inspired me to start serious big fish angling, then meeting and fishing with him 10 years later. The Angling Times had a circulation of 170,000 copies in its heyday of the mid 1960s and remains to this day the greatest angling periodical in the world. Bernard left Fleet Street after 16 years for his new project which was to change his life. This new Angling newspaper venture wasn't the only project that Bernard was involved with. In 1963 he started the very upmarket colour monthly magazine 'Creel', which was far before its time in its quality of print and photographic reproduction. Sadly it only lasted 4 years as production costs and falling circulation meant that it came off our shelves in Nov 1967 to be




Fishing magazine had the same fate 2 years later. During BV's tenure as editor the circulation reached 40,000 in its 18 issues but fell to 5000 when John Nixon took over for the last 2 years. John included a specimen hunters column in which I wrote, but the product could not survive the 5 different wonderful magazines of the glorious 1960s! These really were the Golden Years of Fishing journalism in this country. Brian Harris kept 'Angling' going for 10 more years but eventually this too fell by the wayside, probably because of my writing in it!

TV producers snapped up Bernard in 1965 to do a series on the coarse fish species called 'Anglers Corner' which was shown first on BBC 2, and later on BBC 1. He sat in his study and talked eloquently, in that refined voice of his, about a different species each week. These short films are still available to watch on YouTube.

Best known as a freshwater angler, Goffs Park Lake, near Crawley, was the scene for success in 1958, where Bernard caught 3 large carp to 19lbs and was seen there by my old mate Dennis Darkin when he was a boy.

BV was also a sea angler and big game angler of some repute, an explorer and promoter of tourism for Portugal, Ireland and Zambia. He spent



I saw him on the quayside at Fowey and Polruan in Cornwall during the 1960s unloading blue shark off the Gurney Grice boat Blue Phantom, but it was off Machao in Madeira, that Bernard had his most epic capture in January 1959.

The old whaling station was near here, and waste from that site filtered into the sea, 10 miles east of Funchal near the island of Porto Santo. I was there last December, looking out to sea from the Airport lounge, where this epic encounter took place 65 years ago, only 1 mile off shore. Bernard Venables, that quietly spoken very refined gentleman caught a 6-gilled shark estimated at 1700lbs in weight, it was on the front page of the Angling Times on Friday February 13th 1959. I remember it well, I still have the copy of the paper!

Bernard was fishing from the boat 'Altaire' only about a mile off shore at great depth, over 100 fathoms down, using local volcanic rock to get the bait down to where he knew the huge shark lived. He fought the great beast for over 4 hours, before it was taken back to Funchal to be photographed and weighed more accurately. The catch was the largest fish ever caught in the northern hemisphere at the time and was the talk of the town for many days in the capital Funchal the capital of Madeira.

Little is left today of the old big game fishing harbour, as large cruise ships now take up space where once a dozen or more charter boats went out each day to do battle with Shark, Marlin and Sailfish. The old harbour wall has been re-developed with a modern cruise terminal. My wife and I are frequent visitors to this wonderful island.


Bernard was a promoter for the Portuguese, Irish, Zambia and Moroccan tourist boards and his expeditions along the Zambezi river and with the whalers of the Azores are well documented in his many books and articles. His Autobiography 'A Stream of Life' published in 2002 is well worth a read, as is the new book of his articles called 'A prospect of Angling' edited by his old friend Peter Rogers of Bexleyheath and published in 2001 by the Little Egret Press, containing 370 pages and 85 drawings from his angling articles over the years.

BV will be remembered as one of the 4 great pioneers of angling during the 1960s who were never short of a word to say in the journals of the time. Walker, Taylor, Venables, and Peter Stone from Wolvercote near Oxford. All names I grew up with who have all vastly influenced my angling life, and whose 50 books and thousands of articles between them also influenced the direction Angling has gone today.

Bernard was a wordsmith of angling knowledge and description, almost Shakespearean in his prose, using ten words to describe a scene when just the one would have sufficed for the rest of us! He regularly attended angling shows, events and conferences in his early retirement

years, and I well remember talking to his at the Alexandra Palace Show in 1970, when he was resident on the Angling Times Stand. That was also the time when I first met Roger Standen, up from Bexhill for the day, little did we know that 25 years later he would first publish our Freshwater Informer magazine, and that it would endure to this day!

Bernard Venables lived almost the entirety of the Twentieth Century, for 94 years in fact, and could be described as the Grandfather of modern angling. His 22 books a lasting legacy to an era long since gone, when our rivers teamed with fish, and pollution, abstraction, chicken manure, and plastic were never the main conversation on the riverbank. He was invested with the MBE in 1995 by Prince Charles for services to Angling and outlived Izzac Walton by just one year, to whom I feel he should be compared. From grayling fishing on the Kennet, to giant shark off Madeira, BV was a legendary English Gentleman we should never forget. Bob Rolph



amalgamated with Brian Harris's Angling Magazine.

Sandwich Lakes Sandwich, Kent

The recent weeks have been as diverse as the weather with some anglers catching (please excuse the pun) the lakes perfectly leading to great results on all of the lakes around the complex. The matches have all been well attended and again the main match lakes Damson and Victoria have fished well. Bags of F1s and carp being landing up in the water on pole and waggler tactics.

Meadow Lake has produced numbers of large Bream and is now becoming a destination for some of the match guys when fishing on the complex. Meat and pellet seems to be the way



Medway Man Bob Morris

s I said last time, I had been really looking forward to getting out on the river at the start of this season having missed out on this traditional event over the last couple of years. With the wet spring and recent showery weather, I was expecting the conditions to be ideal. They were, with just a nice flow and a hint of colour and so had hoped to start with a bang. As it turned out, in my true piscatorial style, it was more of a crash!

Having arrived at my chosen pitch an hour or so before sunset, and found all to be perfect, I took a few pictures and then went about the happy task of tackling up. This was a bit more involved than it could have been as I had not found the time to set up rods, rigs etc. However, this took little effort, and I was soon ready to swing the first bait of the new season out into place amongst a couple of handfuls of free offerings. The traditional brew was called for to herald in the new season, so I lit the stove and reclined in my chair while the bats started to emerge and scour the water margins for insects. A Tawny Owl flew across in front of me, looking extremely large in the dusk light. A few dark looking clouds had materialised at this stage and although I was confident that it was not going to be a wet night, and as usual had not brought my brolly, I decided to put on my waterproof trousers and coat just to be prepared. As it turned out it was slightly more than a brief shower and the swim became rather slippery to put it mildly!

Having had a good many wet sessions of late I had learnt to be extra careful with my movements and restrict them to a minimum where possible. With first tea of the season consumed and first cast approaching I could not help wondering how long I would have to wait for the first bite. Opening nights have been unpredictable on the river fishing front and I can remember some real stinkers where nothing had happened at all until well after dawn and a couple where I fell asleep within twenty minutes and woke to a completely blank dawn. In fairness this had only happened on new stretches or completely new rivers. Tonight I felt that I would really crack it, and as it happened I almost did. Unfortunately, it was my rib cage that took the hit, rather that the fish. Having placed my bait perfectly in position and settled back to await events, a sharp tap on the rod tip within a couple of minutes had me thinking it was probably caused by a bat. Having picked up the rod however it was immediately pulled round to my right and a short but hectic scrap with a decent chub saw me land my first fish of the 2024 campaign. I was extremely pleased with myself as I returned this fish to the river and may have become careless. They do say that pride cometh before the fall...

In the darkness, as I moved up the bank to my chair I slipped and ended up crashing to earth, where a sharp protrusion of

wood contacted my ribs! Initially I thought that the cracking sound was my ribs rather than the wood as I lay there in the margins (fortunately dry at this point) I felt sick and could see stars of the coloured variety. It took me a while to recover and climb back to my chair. After a while I decided that another brew and a recast was called for and a call to the emergency services was put on hold, even though breathing was still rather painful. Several more bites followed with a two more good sized chub landed and another lost and I considered this to be a successful start to the season, although the trip back to the car carrying my gear was a rather painful experience. I made my mind up to be even more careful next time and even to use my rope and peg more often, despite thinking that it probably would not have helped me on this occasion.

The second session, a couple of days later turned out to be similar except it was a dry evening and a lot less hazardous on the bankside, which was fortunate as I was still suffering the effects of the fall. I chose the same swim again and was not disappointed with

the action. Several good bites before midnight produced a couple of splendid Chub with the best one at just over the six-pound mark. This was particularly pleasing as I have fished the Medway for many years, and this is only my third from the river. Despite not being obsessed with the size of fish these days, it is always great to land a big one and certainly a good start to my summer's efforts here. These initial sessions have boosted my enthusiasm to do more river fishing this year and I have a few ideas to test out on the tactics front which I will hopefully be able to reveal in future tales from the riverside.

It was great to be out on flowing water again and to witness the riverside wildlife going about

its daily activities. During these opening sessions, these sightings have included Kingfishers, Buzzards, Owls, Sparrowhawks and the other day the unusual sight of a pair of Ravens landing in the riverside trees. As good as all of this is, I have not given up my day job as they say, and I am happy to report that my tench fishing campaign is still going well on several different waters with a healthy amount of action for most of the time.

With any luck things will continue in this vein although I know that with fishing in general this is always going to be a big ask.
