Fishery Reports

Beaver Fishery Lingfield, Surrey

Snipe Lake has seen plenty of fish banked so far this month with Mirrors caught to 27lbs 4ozs, Commons caught to 26lbs 7ozs and both the Grass Carp have been banked, the Small Grassie went 17lbs 9ozs and the Big Grassie went 32lbs 12ozs. Westlake has again produced some cracking sessions and cats have been banked from 9lbs up to 65lbs with lots of 30's, 40's and 50's too. Jeff's Lake has been a little up and down as it usually is this time of year with a lot of bait going in over the school holidays. Anglers have had some good days though with lots of F1's, Bream and carp caught to just over 8lbs. Daughter's Lake has seen the Grass Carp wake up a bit and there have been a few of the bigger ones being banked in the upper 20's and low 30's to a new lake record of 31lbs 9ozs banked by Liam Baldwin, Common Carp have been banked to 20lbs and Mirror Carp up to 20lbs also. **Eden Pond** has surprisingly in the heat fished guite well

with Carp caught to 8lbs, Tench banked to 6lbs and Bream to 4lbs as well as silvers banked too. Maze Lake has, like usual has been a bit tricky in the heat but the anglers who have banked fish have reported to us that Mirrors and Commons have been banked to 9lbs, Bream have been caught to 5lbs and F1's to 3lbs. Majors Lake has seen quite a few anglers getting amongst the fish whether it be Bream to 6lbs 6ozs, Ghost Carp to 13lbs, Common Carp to 19lbs and Mirror Carp to 22lbs.

We issue a catch and fishery report on Facebook every Thursday and Sunday afternoons to go into further details of the anglers, their catches and all news regarding maintenance around the fishery.



Last month I headed off to Wiltshire to fish the beautiful Hampshire Avon at Britford on my London Anglers Association member's ticket. I have been a member of the LAA on and off over the years since my school days and I have seen the list of venues in their handbook decrease very much especially in the last twenty years or so. However with that said they still have some excellent river venues to fish on the Avon, Thames and Ouse plus sections of the Suffolk Stour. However as far as Britford is concerned it has been at least four seasons since I last fished there and I planned for this trip to fish the section called Harnham Island where you can see the Salisbury Cathedral Spire standing proud above the town. The Spire at 404ft is the tallest in the United Kingdom but although that is a fascinating fact and blesses many anglers catch shots in the background, it does not put off the Pike especially when I am playing very big Dace.

Early start on road to hell

My day started with a 3.15am alarm call and just after 4am I was on the M25 making my way to Britford for a near two hour journey. I arrived at the car park along New Bridge Road and then with gear made my way across the field towards the river and through a gate which led over one of the carriers onto the island itself. I knew the swim I wanted to start my day off, and it was vacant, in fact I was the only angler there and my plan was to fish over two days and do some filming along the way. Using my 15ft Drennan Floatmaster rod, fixed spool reel spooled with 4lbs mainline I was running a Korum Avon 4G stick through its paces nicely as the flow was ideal and the river, although clear as it always is being a chalk stream river, did have a slight tinge of colour. Everything looked and felt perfect, the sky was overcast and it was drizzling with light rain, and a slight breeze blowing upstream. After about twenty minutes I had my first indication on the float and the next cast it buried and the first minnow of the day made its way into my grasp. A minnow first cast on double white maggot is the norm so there was no need for concern. Feeding a steady flow of maggots, casters and hemp in between each cast I was striking into what turned out to be a little plump roach of about six ounces. Splendid in all its colours. I was hoping a steady stream of roach would follow and the next run through produced a dace of about the same size. This is going to be a good day I thought to myself, as I placed the dace back into the

river and watched it swim away. Time to get the filming gear out, I thought, but in eager anticipation I made another cast and watched the float glide further downstream before disappearing out of sight. I lifted into a nice bend in the rod followed by a couple of thumps, it was a dace, a very good dace, as I saw it twist and turn in the clear current slowly making its way towards me with each turn of the handle. As I was watching the dace and thinking about getting my landing net primed to accept it, the fish disappeared and my rod locked up, I applied some pressure and saw my line and float glide across the current over to the far bank. Damn, I know what this bloody thing is! I pulled back a bit harder on the rod tip, and then saw it turn with my prized catch in its jaws. A pike of about eight pounds had taken a liking to my big dace, specimen dace at that and then just as I was going to net it, the jaws opened up and spat out this chewed up dace. It was a fine looking specimen but the damage had been done and its chances of survival looked grim.

No more please Mr Pike

Sadly for me this set the tone for the next couple of hours with lean spells of no bites, except for minnows of course, and every time I got the dace back on the feed again with regular feeding the pike would smash into my catch time and time again. Anything under six ounces they would leave along but dace of specimen size was clearly on their menu and I was assisting them. I did manage to land a small bream which I think is the first bream I have caught out of the Hampshire Avon to the best of my memory, but any dace of note was being smashed. I took the decision of enough is enough and moved swim only to have the same thing happen again, and when the third move resulted in another pike show I decided to call it a day and packed up ending my trip full

stop. I left Salisbury around midday very disappointed but vowed to return in a few weeks time for another bash in the hope that the pike will be less active. I have been keeping my eye on the catch reports and have been reading anglers are still having pike problems on the stretch and it seems they are just moving around with the dace and roach shoals which is probably what I would do if I was a hungry pike.

Slow start to my river sessions

In the past I normally give the rivers a few weeks before I attempt to fish them but due to lack of recent river action in what I call the best times to fish (autumn and winter) due mainly to heavy rainfall I have got on the rivers to try and make up for lost time but sadly with low levels and lack of flow the river season has been very slow especially as I have been fishing in the main some low stock river sections. But that said I love the early morning starts, misty mornings and hearing the sounds of running water over those low sections of river that pass over rocky and stoney sections almost forming weir like sounds. I can't think of a better way to spend a morning in the hope of landing a big chub whilst watching kingfishers working the river, damsel flies fluttering around and of late a real mix of butterflies, some of which I have never seen the like before.

Future fish filming projects




I will be back for those Hampshire Avon Perch in Winter

When I am not fishing I am thinking about fishing, it is what I was do and enjoy and I make no apologies for that. My Fishing Tail Films project is a reflection of what I like to do and although the channel is not at the point of where I want it to be just yet, I will get there and have set myself a target of trying to reach 2000 subscribers by the end of this year. I feel it is important to set goals and it gives me something to aim for, so all the time I am looking at different venues and fish species to present in front of the cameras in the hope of making it as interesting to the viewers as possible. I recently contacted an angling association that controls some sections of the River Wye, a beautiful river which in the main is set in wonderful scenic settings and the fishing can be good as well with chub and barbel the main targets for coarse anglers. I enquired about a particular section I was interested in and if they would allow me to make a film of my fishing travels for my small YouTube channel etc etc. The plan because of the distance to travel was going to be a two day fish filming trip which is something I do quite often when travelling some distance. Fishing cost was £25 a day, which is fine with me as it is very limited fishing and they only allow X amount of anglers on a day and that is perfectly fine with me but this is where my interest ended because in the next sentence of the


replied email it stated that filming is not allowed as we do all the promotion videos ourselves unless you are willing to pay the estate £1,000 a day to do some filming. I nearly dropped my phone when reading the filming costs and when I had digested what I had read, I politely replied ending my interest stating that the cost is way out of my league for a small channel to film. The reply back was 'well that is the league we are in...'





Diary of a Match Angler

Summer League Final



The match was held at Gedges Fishery, on lakes 2 and 5 due to a great turn out of 20 anglers. Both lakes contain a mixture of species, bream, tench, carp, barbel, roach, rudd, ide, and perch. I ended up drawing peg 40 which is on the front bank of lake 5. From past experience fishing the lake I knew I was in the right area and was feeling confident. I set up two rigs one for fishing next to a bed of Lilly pads and one at 13m. The rig fishing next to the Lilly pads I was using a 0.5g chianti style float this was tied on 0.18 supplex with a bulk of 8 no.9's and two no.10 droppers. Then down to the business end I was fishing 0.12 supplex fluorocarbon hook length with a super LWG in a size 14. The reason I was fishing a heavy rig in about 4 and a half foot of water is because of the small Rudd that were intercepting my bait on the way down. On my 13m line i was fishing in around 6 and half foot of water, and because I wasn't getting pestered by small fish I could fish a 0.4g round bodied float with a bulk of 8 no.9 and two no.10 droppers again. This was again tied on 0.18 supplex with a 0.12 bottom with a super LWG in a size 14 again.

The match began and I started by feeding micros, hemp, chopped worm, dead

reds and some sweet groundbait, loose to cloud up the bottom. I fed this through a bait dropper so I knew that my bait was on the bottom otherwise it would have been intercepted on the

drop. (I fed the same twice on this line) I then fed on my 13m line three balls of groundbait consisting of the same particles I fed on my short line, now my lines had settled it was time to go on my short line and see what was waiting. I started on a 4mm expander and had a Rudd straight way so I sacked it in and went on to corn, however I was having a lot of small indications from small ide. As I was about to ship back out, I saw my peg start to fizz up so instead of corn I tried a worm head topped with a single dead red maggot, it made it to the bottom and after a short wait the float sailed under with a tench of around a pound on the end. I fed again and did the same thing, put on a worm head topped with a maggot however this time it was intercepted by a small Rudd, so it was back to corn. Once again I was getting small ide but saw some fizzing again.



I kept my piece of corn on and wasn't long again before the float sailed under with a tench a little bigger than the first. I could still see the odd bubble coming up, so I went in again and had a small skimmer, I hoped that they had moved in, but I was wrong! The Rudd really became active and were now taking my corn on the drop, so I decided to bulk all my stotz together hoping it would sort the problem out and get my bait to the bottom but it didn't work. So what I did was



slop my groundbait up so it would fall straight to the bottom and make a cloud. I then decided it was time to go on my long line with a piece of corn but I could not get a touch. With the last hour to go I saw some more bubbling coming up from over the slop, so a piece of corn went on the hook and had another tench of around three pounds. Then It was back to catching the odd ide. I finished the match with 8lbs and oz's placing 8th which was less than I hoped for, Although it was enough to give me 3rd place overall in the Summer league. Something that I'm very pleased about, as I have only been participating in the matches for just over a year now. I managed 86lbs 10ozs over the summer league period which gave me 82 points.

With bait left over from my Sunday match I took the opportunity to get in a couple of practice sessions at a couple of local fisheries.



SESSION ONE

The set up I was using was a drennan acolyte 9ft commercial feeder rod matched with a daiwa ninja 2500 size reel. Down to the business end, I was using the ics feeder range from Preston innovation, I was using there 20g banjo feeder. This was then down to a ready made guru engage 9lb hook length with a size 10 QM1 hook with a bayonet. I was then loading the feeder with Dynamite F1 micros and fishing a yellow wafter.

I started by feeding three guru bait up feeder fulls of Dynamite swim stim F1 sweet ground bait and Dynamite swim stim F1 sweet micros, along with some self prepared hemp. It took no time at all before the peg started to fizz up, I wasted absolutely no time and picked up my method feeder rod and made the first put in of the evening, by the time my feeder had made its way to the bottom, I tightened up and the rod bent double with a very angry and hard fighting tench. After a hard fighting battle from the tench I quickly got it weighed at 5lb 8ozs. I slipped it back, and second chuck, the tip went again, this time with a decent size Rudd. After that I was having small Rudd and the odd quality roach up until it was time to go.



SESSION TWO

I was targeting the rudd today, hoping for a specimen.

As I was travelling light on my moped, the tackle I took was a drennan acolyte pro whip 400 as it's telescopic and packs down nicely, along with my net, mat and bait.


Bait choice for the session was some Dynamite swim stim F1 sweet ground bait as it works amazingly well for all species, I also took some Dynamite sweetcorn, self prepare hemp and some maggots.

As I was fishing with the whip I was able to fish a pole rig, the rig I was using was a 0.4g chianti style float with 8 no. 9's in a bulk, this is then tied to 0.18 supplex down to 0.12 supplex fluorocarbon with a super LWG in a size 14.

I started by feeding some loose ground bait through a bait dropper, before loose feeding maggots over the top. Straight away there was lots of swirls as the Rudd moved in. I hooked a piece of corn on, flicked the rig out and had a decent

rudd take it on the drop. This pattern was repeated, with a few bigger fish amongst them. Nowhere near specimen size, but good size to be catching on the whip. I was having one every put in and it was very enjoyable fishing. Eventually the 'mini frenzy' died off and the bait actually reached the bottom. I though that maybe a pike had entered my swim as it took a while for any more action. The float finally sailed under and I hook into something that tried to lunge off and bent the whip double, I still thought pike might be responsible. I played the fish as carefully as I could as the whip is a flick tip, meaning no elastic. I managed to keep it under control and got it to the waters surface. Incredibly, it was a big tench that I bundled into my landing net. At 6lbs 2ozs tench, I was amazed how well the whip, and the end tackle, had handled it.

With the tench safely weighed and photographed I got it back and carried on fishing, I was getting a lot of small Rudd again, with the odd bigger one amongst them. I hooked a larger roach and as I was about to net it, a little jack came out of nowhere and took it, fortunately it let go, meaning I could still land it. After the attack I called it a day as the swim went absolutely dead and I could not get another bite. Although I was more than pleased with the results of a few hours fishing.

Jim's Journey

During the warmer weather I have noticed quite a few people surface fishing. Seeing their results, it was a technique that I wanted to learn more about and add to my armoury. So with my Dad, and the most basic of tackle, we set out

to Iden Wood Fishery to try our luck.

We arrived at the fishery just as the owner, Andy Ashdown, was opening the gates, which was a great opportunity to get some advice. Andy explained that although surface fishing can be effective across all of the lakes on the complex, he recommended Orchard Lake as it was a little more secluded and less pressured. This seemed a good option to us, and having paid our ticket money, we set off down the track to the lakes.

Orchard Lake is the last of the five lakes on the fishery and nestled away, a short walk through the woodland past the venues Specimen Lake. At around 1.5 acres, it is reed lined with an undulating bank and contains a mix of species.



Immediately we could see a number of fish cruising

in and around a particularly prominent reed bed that covered much of the central area of the lake.

With the lake to ourselves, it was an ideal opportunity to introduce some freebies before setting up our rods. We had bought along a variety of baits. Dad was going 'old skool' with crusty bread and chum mixer, while I had had a bag of Dynamite Baits Sweet Tiger floating pellets to try.

Starting with the mixers, the response was instant, and almost immediately a number of fish started taking in earnest. We couldn't set up fast enough!

On Dad's advice, I simply tied a size 8 hook onto the end of my mainline to allow me to freeline. The reason for this was two fold, 1) there was no need to cast very far, and 2) if a fish made it to the reeds there was less chance of snagging up than with a controller float on the line. Although Dad was there to fish, he was more interested in seeing me catch and offering me advice on how to surface fish, and was quite happy for me to take the first cast. For a hookbait, I simply tore of a chunk of crust off the bread and threaded it on the hook.

My first cast looped over a reed right on the edge of where the reed bed started and I was tempted to reel it in and try again, but as Dad pointed out, the reed helped keep the line off the water and spooking the fish, as well as preventing it from drifting out of position. We fed a few more mixers and the carp really started competing. The reed supporting my bait twitched before a mouth came up and engulfed the bread. The fight was quite hair raising on a short line, and I was quite glad that I'd hooked one of the smaller fish in

front of us to start with. Managing to keep it out of the reeds, I was soon able to bundle a nice looking mirror carp into my landing net. Not quite a double at 9lbs 9ozs, we treated the hook hold and took a couple of shots before returning it.


The disturbance had pushed the other carp back into the reeds, so it was a case of regaining their confidence with steady feeding. There is definitely an art to feeding floaters, too few and the fish won't respond, too many and you run the risk of loosing the fish from the swim as they follow the freebies in the drift. Half a dozen at a time seemed to be the best compromise between drawing the fish out of the reeds into open water, rather than blanket feeding the area, which meant that the fish could stay in cover and pick off baits as they drifted into them.


Once a few fish had started to take again, I cast out another piece of bread but it was obvious that the carp were suspicious of it. A number of times, carp would

make a beeline for it, only to turn away at the last second.

Dad suggested swapping to a banded mixer as it matched what we were feeding. It was simple enough to stretch a silicone band around a bait, using a banding tool, and thread it onto the hook. Without the weight of the bread, casting was a little more difficult, but I decided to persevere without anything else on the

Takes were far harder to spot with the smaller hookbait, and that combined with the fish still been a little spooky, meant that i had trouble timing my strike, resulting in a number of missed opportunities. Just as the frustration almost got too much I managed to connect with my second fish of the day. Smaller than the first, but no less welcome, this one was a common. Once again we went through the process of introducing freebies to entice the fish to feed, although this time they were notably slower. Having caught a couple, I was happy to let Dad have a go, and with some perseverance he managed a nice low double mirror. By now it was mid morning and we decided to take a little break from fishing and have a cup of tea and a sandwich.

By the time that we got back to fishing, the breeze had got up a bit, causing quite a ripple on the water. The fish were showing very little interest in the mixers by this point, so I decided that it was time to break out my floating pellets. A number of bait companies have started making these, I had gone for the Sweet Tiger variety from Dynamite Baits. On first glance they looked very similar to our bulk standard mixer, and we thought that they would probably get a similar response. How wrong we were! I don't know what is in them but they obviously contain something that appeals to carp and causes an enthusiastic feeding response. Fish that were idling around in the reeds taking the odd bait, were suddenly grabbing every bait they could.

Earlier I mentioned that overfeeding could drag the fish out the increased drift leading to a more open area of the

fed heavily to encourage the carp to a swim where it was easier to fish for them. I rebaited my hook bait version of the pellet and cast out. Straight away I was into another fish, and then another. Whether it was the specialised bait, me timing my strikes better, the drift breaking up the the fish confidence, or perhaps a combination of all three, the fish just kept coming. The ripple died for me to spot a larger, darker shape homing in on the freebies. I quickly reeled in and cast to pausing, the carp came straight up, grabbed the bait and carried on. I set the hook


huge eruption in the water, as the fish realised its mistake. It did it's best to make it out of the swim and back to the reeds, and at a couple of points I had to clamp down hard to stop it taking line, but eventually it began to tire and I was able to bring it close enough to net. A lovely dark mirror of 15lbs 5ozs, the biggest fish of the day and one that made me feel that I was getting the hang of surface fishing. Dad also managed a couple more before we had to leave, so it was a great session all round. As we were loading

up our gear, we saw Andy again and it was really interesting to hear how his involvement with the Freshwater Informer stretches right back to it's very beginnings 28 years ago, as well as the other lakes on the fishery. I look forward to getting back to try them.



On recent trips I have found carp near the surface, but swimming too fast to be looking for food. They were not spooked, just not feeding. By now they should have been looking to eat? I could get some to stop in my swim, by feeding floaters sparingly and less often, even changing sizes. They would then take a pellet or two before continuing to who knows where? On returning a short while later they would circle around the baited area take another pellet or two, before disappearing completely!

Often these fish were accompanied by one or two others. Which makes me wonder if this is somehow connected with their incomplete spawning, earlier in the spring? By now I had assumed that urge would have passed. I've spoken to friends who are fishing other waters, using conventional carp methods, and they too have experienced mixed results. To quote one, "it's been the worst spring/summer I've ever known, it wouldn't surprise me if not all the fish have spawned yet".

The fishing

So having got all my excuses in early, let me recount a typical frustrating sequence of events. I enjoy fishing different waters as often as possible, as the fishes behaviour differs from one lake to another, even on the same fishery. Their response to floating baits can vary too. Adapting my approach to each situation has seen me 'fine tune' my tactics and improve my results.

First thing I do on arrival, whenever possible, is to scope out the lake by walking around. I'm looking for signs of fish, before choosing a swim. Once I'm happy there are enough fish present, I start feeding a few 11mm floaters, and watch for a reaction. I'll continue trickle feeding, hoping the noise will alert and attract some carp to the swim. All the time I'm trying not to be seen, using any bank-side cover available to hide behind. At this stage I'm not fishing, leaving the water undisturbed. I want to get the fish feeding confidently and ideally competing with others, before disturbing the water by casting. However, black headed gulls see this as an opportunity for some free food and often begin swooping down taking my floaters. I have to start casting now to scare them off. If not gulls, then ducks, moorhens or geese also find this free food irresistible! So now my covert plan is well and truly blown! It's not always this bad, but factor in the changeable weather, which I'm sure is a major cause for the carp's fickle behaviour, and you can see why my surface fishing hasn't been as successful this season.

No two days are the same!

Having illustrated what can go wrong, let me recount two days, in the same week on Kettles Lake at Elphicks fishery [TN12 8EL] as an example. I arrived early on a Wednesday morning. I prefer mid-week sessions on commercial waters whenever possible as they are less



busy. It was mild, overcast with almost no wind, perfect conditions! I catapulted two pouches of 11mm floaters into my chosen swim and then set about tackling up. Landing net first, before I assembled my rod and then decide what fly to use? I watch the water, wanting to see how the carp are reacting to my loose feed. A few fish are mouthing the pellets, but are very cautious. I pult a few more pellets in twos and threes, to see if the sound attracts them? Certainly they are aware more food has arrived. Immediately fish appear after each new delivery of bait. I chose a Fulling Mill Disco fly in tan, as it mimics the Skretting's pellets I'm using closely. The Disco sits very low in the water's surface, which makes it a good choice when the fish are coming from directly below the fly, and gently sipping at it. I strike and miss several fish over the next couple of hours. Finally I hook and lose three fish! Two of these were foul hooked. This can be a problem when you have too many fish in a small area. On calm days it's worth spreading your feed a little wider to avoid this happening. With a little breeze, the ripple will spread the bait for you.

Finally around mid-day it happens, the fish switch from being just curious to ravenous feeding, and now take the floaters with gusto! I struggle to see the Disco, with violent swirls as carp eagerly compete for the bait! Sometimes two fish try taking the same pellet, and spook each other. I change my fly to a more buoyant Fulling Mill Close Copy Biscuit, its colour is much closer to the Skretting's pellet than the Bonio fly. This makes a huge difference, as I start catching a carp every fifteen minutes, and this continues for the next three

The action finally slows, but I still manage to catch a few more. I have to adapt my presentation and bait application, to keep the fish coming. They're more cautious again, but by gradually dropping my loose feed closer and closer to me, I can target individual fish that I can clearly see swimming just subsurface. An accurate cast just ahead of them, in their path induces further takes. I've now changed to smaller Hopper Popper fly in black. These sit partially through the surface, with their foam head just peaking through the film. The fish will take these, even though they look nothing like the pellets!



The secret is getting the fly right in front of the carp, in their field of vision, which is very narrow now they are swimming so close to the surface.

The day comes to an end too soon, but I'm exhausted. I've spent the best part of twelve hours non-stop fishing. I've only sat down on my bucket to change flies or retie a leader. This is a typical day fly fishing. I'm always watching the water and fish, trying to work out how to catch the next one. Twenty two fish, including seventeen doubles a very successful day, my best this season.

Two days later....

As you can imagine I was keen to have another day on Kettles lake. The forecast was for rain in the morning with a gentle breeze, gradually brightening up in the afternoon with the wind picking up too. Not ideal conditions but I couldn't resist the chance of some more surface action. Being a Friday I knew the lake would be busier than my previous visit. To my surprise an end swim was vacant, so I dropped in it immediately. This gave me a large expanse of untouchable water to my left. The breeze was coming from my left too, which meant I could use it to drift my loose feed out into open water, towards the island. I hoped this would draw fish into my swim, if they weren't already there? It didn't take too long for the first visitors to arrive. Having now tackled up and re-fed the swim twice more, I decided to go for a walk and look at another lake. This stopped me from getting too excited and starting fishing

On my return my swim didn't appear to have many fish in it, but those present seemed settled and happy to feed, something I've struggled to achieve all season! I tied on a prototype 'pellet popper' fly I'd just tied. I was keen to see what the carp thought of it? First impressions were very good as I caught three

doubles, two being grass carp, before my lunch break. I expected the carp would start eagerly feeding in the afternoon, as they had on Wednesday, but this wasn't the case. In fact the opposite happened, they disappeared! Maybe the bright sunlight was the cause? Whatever the reason my swim had died! Rather than overfeed the swim in a desperate effort to liven things up, I went for another walk, deciding to "starve them out". I hoped when I returned and started trickle feeding again they would return. Unfortunately this tactic didn't work. So I moved swims, to where I'd found several fish, in an area away from other anglers and their lines.

I was more exposed to the strengthening wind in my new swim, but with plenty of fish to go at I felt confident this was a good move. What's more, as soon as I introduced loose feed they started feeding without hesitation. This was all I needed to see, after two blank hours, I was 'in the game again'. I had reverted to the Disco fly, with it's florescent sight tag. I needed something I could see in the glare and ripple. I quickly caught two double figure mirrors, which added to my confidence, and hoped that more would follow. That didn't happen, as the strengthening wind started dragging my fly across the ripple in a most unnatural way. No carp was going to be fooled by

this presentation. As the sun slowly dipped in the late afternoon, it created a patch of silver water in front of me. This glare made it impossible to see the carp or my fly. I was now resigned to the fact that my chances of catching any more fish was unlikely. My only option was to feed much closer to the margin, this reduced the glare and allowed me to see the fish before they broke the surface. I also fed some smaller floaters to hold fish in the area longer. This ploy accounted for one more fish!

All in all, I'd had an interesting but frustrating day! I shouldn't be so hard on myself, six doubles is a good day. However after my previous trip, I had hoped for more of the same. I know that's greedy, but it's that drive and desire to improve that keeps me going.



I knew Liam well from his school days, he had taken part in a Fishing for Schools course that I had run at the school. Luke is his younger brother that I had never met but had heard a lot about from his mum. Luke is the new fishing boy on the block, who had out fished his dad, an accomplished Fisherman himself, catching huge tarpon, sailfish, and a bull shark on a recent holiday in Florida, the stuff dreams are made of for a young angler. A talented family of anglers.

When I first met Liam in his school days, I noticed how competent Liam was on all types of Freshwater fishing and what set him apart from the other Students was how keen he was to learn more about fishing. Each year we used to run an inter schools match for the schools on the Kent, Fishing for School's programme and Liam and this team won the match, quite convincingly. Whilst coaching Liam one day, he mentioned what he got up to on his summer holidays in Florida, where he had caught sailfish and bull shark. On the next fishing session, he brought in some photos of his catches, which really blew my mind. 

The Golden Years of Coarse Fishing

Legends of the 60's - No.6



Trevor Housby

Few anglers of the 20th century could emulate the achievements of the great Trevor Housby in Big Game fishing, sea angling, trout fishing and coarse fishing. During his short life he achieved so much, wrote and edited over 30 great books, published hundreds of articles mainly in Anglers Mail and Fishing magazine and invented the proverbial Dog nobbler trout fishing lure! He lived most of his life in Hampshire, on the edge of the New Forest at a village called Sway, near where so many of our great angling writers lived, like Chris Ball, Chris Yates, Len Arbery, Dave Steuart, Peter Rolfe, Andy Little and Jack Hargreaves.

Nothing could have been more extreme than where I first encountered him during my long school holidays in the summer of 1957, when roach fishing off the 'railings' at Keston Ponds in those halcyon days when the sun shone all day and the fish gave themselves up in vast numbers to young boys keen as mustard and popped them into our yellow keepnets tied to the roadside rail!

The roach and small perch fishing off the road dam at Keston with float fished maggot, hemp or chrysalis was prolific, and dozens of young boys like me, still at school arrived by bike and fished in line, with our yellow keepnets and Effgeeco tackle boxes at the ready to

fish for the Red finned roach, which smelt like cucumber and looked like pure gold. Nothing was much over a pound in weight, but our nets were bulging and many a Hayes and Bromley lad learnt their fishing here. Ken Rowley, was there, Steve Edwards, Chris Haswell, Dennis Darkin, John Kane and Ron Blackmore, and I believe our own Bob Morris joined us too. Carp were never mentioned, the best we could hope for was a 2lbs Tench, or crucian carp, but we knew big commons were in there, because Henry Williamson had told us so in his books of 1922, "long lean wild commons, with scales as big as (old) pennies". Henry was the author of 'Tarka the Otter' and 'Salar the Salmon', famous books in their day. Anyway, I digress. One day in August 1957 a van pulled up behind us on the railings and out got a largish young man carrying the biggest landing net we young boys had ever seen. He proceeded to open the rear doors, where on the floor were about a dozen wet hessian sacks all jumping up and down! What on earth could be in these? we all thought to ourselves. We young boys of average age of 12 had never seen a live carp on the bank, and Bob Reynolds catches just published in the Angling Times were fresh in our minds, so it must have been mid August in 1957, because a very young Steve Edwards was barely 8 years old. The wet sacks were carefully lifted out of the van and placed in the waters edge, where they immediately sprung to life. In these sacks were carp, mostly mirrors and leathers between 8lbs and 13lbs, and we had never seen the like of them before!

I can remember it clearly to this day, as it had such an effect on me. They had all been caught the night before at Summerhill Estate Lake near Tonbridge by Trevor and Dennis Darkin, where the fish were so prolific that someone decided to give them a cull, and move them around a bit. A lot of this went on in those days, much to the displeasure of the old Kent River Board!. I have letters from Trevor Housby telling me of the 10 fish sessions that they had down there in the 1950s, Leney fish stocked after the war, as were so many lakes in the south of England. Chris Ball

had all the ledgers, as to where they were all put in. Soon, I believe, to be published in book form by the new custodians of these historic documents.

About a dozen carp were released into Keston Ponds (Caesars Pool) that day, and more followed, so I believe, and they have thrived ever since in the alkali rich water of pH 7.7, on my last test 10 years ago! Many were original Donald Leney strain stock from Tonbridge and another Surrey water and the anglers were Dennis Darkin, Trevor and Bill Bellini from Bromley, We young boys were enthralled with them, and the carp, and we changed our tactics soon afterwards discarding the roach of the railings swim for floating crusts and worms around the Lilly pads, stalking these dark blue shapes at dawn and dusk. Three years passed before I encountered Trevor Housby again. By then I had caught several of these carp from Keston in my summer holidays from school. None were double figure, but they were now Keston carp non the less. Trevor lived up in central London at that time in WC1 with his girlfriend Carol, and I bumped into him in Peaks tackle shop in Greys Inn Road one day when he was taking to Bernard Venables about game fishing. He was pleased to hear that the carp he had put into Keston 3 years earlier were still thriving and being caught by local anglers like Ken Rowley and me.

Some time later I joined the Homesdale A.C. down at Dunton Green near Sevenoaks and met up with him roach fishing on Longford Lake during the early 1960s. The roach fishing was outstanding down there at the time, and many a 2lber was taken on hemp and float from the margins. It must have been June 1964, as I had just passed my driving test and I fished at Homesdale pit and Spicers pit next door where Hilton, Quinlan and Roger Smith were just starting off their carping quests at one of the first syndicate carp lakes in the country. £10 a season it was down there, payable to Fred Spice in High Street, Sundridge, Kent. The Bromley pits over the other side of the main railway line were also famous for Tench and the huge beds of Swan mussels that I used to collect for my Catfish Fishing up in Bedfordshire, years later. Trevor fished with Ron Barnett and Carol Carter in those days, later to team up with Carol and Gerry

Preston, both were good carp anglers, but Trevor was not a specialist carp angler despite having fished at Wadhurst Lake during the 1950s with Fred J.Taylor, Gerry Berth Jones and latterly Kevin Clifford. I once fished at Wadhurst as a guest of someone, having walked down that long hill

to the lakeside to witness the vast hordes of small wild carp spawning in the margin reeds. Between the wars huge catches of small wild common carp were made down there, with catches of 50 or more fish not uncommon.


Many years elapsed before I saw Trevor again, save a few phone calls enquiring about my Trout Fishing at the new Bewl Reservoir near Lamberhurst. He had moved down to Hampshire on the edge of the New Forest, to Sway where he opened a small tackle shop and became a professional Lobster Fisherman around the Isle of Wight. He was also keen on Trout fishing on the new waters like Dever Springs and Damerham, where he once caught a brace of 10lbs Browns, and fished the Test as well. He invented the Dog Nobbler trout lure, a divisive lure so well used on our reservoirs by people like me, but it was his interest in sea fishing and big

game fishing that took over his life in later years, about 1970 I would say. He lived near Jack Hargreaves, and they drank at the Fleur de Lys pub at Pilley, actually just down the road from where Chris Ball used to live10 years ago. Chris once took me there. Jack and Trevor were regulars out of the Isle of Wight, and off the shore, shark and reef fishing.

A prolific writer of articles for many periodicals and 32 books in total on sea fishing, coarse and trout, his book 'Dream Fishing' tells of his time big game fishing all over the world. He wrote regularly in the 4 main magazines of the time Fishing, Angling,

Anglers world and Creel. Big Game fishing took over his life in the 1980s, fishing all over the world for Marlin, Shark and Tuna. He broke records for many of the huge fish he caught. In 1979 he teamed up with Roger Daltry fishing off Walkers Cay in the Bahamas in a Tuna competition, but it was off Fayal in the Azores that he really hit the big time in Sept 1985 catching record Blue Marlin, trolling huge lures off the back of the boat Rabao, catching fish of 705lbs, 760lbs and 855lbs, landed on to the back of the boat. Bone fish, Barracuda and Wahoo also received his attention in the Bahamas and in Madeira he fished for shark off the same old boat 'The Altair' that Bernard Venables had used 25 years earlier.

Today, Trevor's son Russ runs a charter big game fishing business on the tropical island paradise of Vanuatu, 1000 miles east of the Great Barrier Reef, where his boat the MV Nambas can be seen on you tube videos if you look for The Captain Fishing Charters. Trevor Housbys first book, 'The Art of Angling' published in 1965 features his early coarse fishing career in and around Kent, with Ron Barnett and Carol, and I bumped into them fishing several times in my youth when I was just starting out. Little did I know at the time that this

giant of a man would one day become a giant in the world of angling and angling writers, oh to have had his drive and energy! These were ground-breaking times in Kentish fishing, and I was there to witness it all, aged just 18 and new to the exciting world of carp fishing. All 60 years ago now, where has the time gone? I never concentrated on my fishing, preferring a more varied life, "been there, done that" has been my philosophy, travelling the world, Reservoir trout fishing, garden building and following sports, but in those keen coarse fishing days of the 1960s I bumped into them all, and it is these ground-breaking anglers, far more accomplished than I, that I write about each month, they all had great stories to tell.



eing an all-round sort of angler, I often try to justify belonging to many different clubs (about a dozen currently) on the basis that I need to have a variety of venues at my disposal - even if I only get around to fishing less than ten percent of the waters available. Despite this I have rather reluctantly dropped a few of these, particularly some that involve a long drive as it is very unlikely that I am ever going to get to visit them.

Some I know that I could rejoin at any time, but others are more difficult to get into and I tend to hang on to these for this reason.

A few years back I was in the habit of fishing rivers like the Severn, Wye, Ouse, and Kennet etc on a regular basis during autumn and winter months but hardly ever go these days for a variety of reasons. I still manage the odd trip to these places but normally stick to the more accessible areas and day ticket venues when I do. My brother-in-law Martin has recently moved to the Shrewsbury area and is within striking distance of the River Severn and so I am very much looking forward to paying him a visit soon and having a session or two up there. The Bewdley to Bridgenorth section of the upper river was one of our favourite winter venues a few years back but I don't recall ever fishing any further upstream despite having relatives living there at the time.

The barbel fishing was quite spectacular, at this stage, and I can recall many sessions in the company of my pals Clive and Peter where we were all experiencing more action than we had ever had before on the barbel front. No Monsters but plenty of fish in the five-to-nine-pound range kept us well occupied on many occasions. Following on from this we switched our attentions to the lower sections of the river, Worcester area, in search of bigger fish and did well over several years, taking many double- figure fish up to fourteen pound plus. The social aspect of these trips was almost as important as the fishing, and I recall many days when starting much before lunchtime was difficult - courtesy of the previous night's festivities. I just could not afford to regularly do the sort of two/three-day trips now – as the costs of staying overnight at a pub or even a B & B have escalated beyond my budget, but I look back on these times with great affection and really value the chances that I do occasionally get to replicate these old adventures.

On the fishing front currently, I have been a bit restricted due to our house renovation work but have managed to keep at in on the tench trail and have been getting one or two along with the odd intervention from carp of various sizes. Time restrictions have meant that I have neglected the Medway in recent weeks but as things are starting to get back to some semblance of normality now, I am looking forward to getting back at it before the pike fishing starts again very soon. Talking of which, I really can't believe that I will be getting out the Pike rods again in a few weeks' time. This whole spring and summer period seems to have passed so quickly with the disruption of the building work and moving in /out and keeping tabs on it all.





It certainly 'does your head in' as a friend of mine used to say. Everything is up and running again now and I apologise to anyone who has had trouble getting hold of me during the last few months. Phone and internet connections are finally working, and I am starting to get sorted out with the workshop again. I have heard it said that moving house is one of the most stressful things that we ever do and I can add to that and confirm that moving out and then back in several months later is just as bad, if not worse – in some ways.


As usual I have been clocking the wildlife during recent trips and enjoying my sightings of various species both common and not so. The lack of certain species of insect is something of great concern to me, as I believe it is a contributory factor

behind the lack of Swallows, Martins Swifts etc in our area (and generally) in recent years. Grasshoppers seem to be largely extinct in many areas now and I can only imagine that this is down to intensive farming and pesticide use. Insect populations do fluctuate naturally on a yearly basis, but the overall lack of insects is something that I believe should be of urgent national / international concern. It is the season of dragonflies, and it has been a joy to see so many and of varying types recently. On the other side of the coin is our local population of leaf-cutter bees. These fascinating creatures annually populate our bee house in the garden. They cut circular leaf doors to seal their grubs into the chambers where they grow over winter and immerge the following year. I have spent much time watching this activity (pictured) but unfortunately, they are conspicuous by their absence this summer! Another insect not around in our garden this summer is the usually numerous Gatekeeper butterfly. These can normally be spotted basking on stumps and posts during mid-summer. I have seen them in other areas while out fishing but it is the first year that they have been absent in our garden.

It is great to see that the whole issue of the environment and its welfare is being taken far more seriously and steps are finally being taken to take the polluters and abusers to task but I believe we have a long way to go if we are to halt and hopefully even eventually reverse this tragic downturn in wildlife populations and diversity.
