Beaver Fishery

Lingfield, Surrey

Snipe Lake has continued to be very tricky over the last few weeks with only a handful of anglers trying their luck. The lake has only seen two fish banked, with Scott Harvey landing a 20lbs stockie mirror and Nick Constantine banking a **PB** 33lbs 3ozs common. It continues to confuse us all as we watch the fish kicking up the silt, bosh out during the day and nights and bang around the remaining sets of lily pads.

Westlake has continued to fish well with the





majority of anglers banking some nice cats. Just a few examples are **Les Norton** on his first visit to us banking a **PB** 47lbs 2ozs, Chris Streeter banked 6 cats to 54lbs 2ozs, Martin Smith banking over 11 cats to 49lbs 8ozs over a few sessions, Vic Collier banked 3 to 32lbs 7ozs on his day session, Les Franklin banked two at 35lbs 8ozs and 62lbs while Oliver Windham banked 6 more cats to a new PB of 40lbs which also won him Fish of the Month.

Jeff's Lake has been a bit more productive for some and a struggle for others, a few reports given to us are Mark Bunker who banked 6 bream, 11 F1's and 2 little mirrors, Ian Thomsett did an afternoon and banked 12 F1's and a few bream, John Howe has done a couple of short sessions and banked a total of 25 bream and 3 F1's, Christian Culicovschi banked 13 mirrors and commons and 8 bream and **Ian Chescoe** banked 9 carp to 7lbs 8ozs.

Daughter's Lake has, like Snipe Lake been a tad tricky but a few fish have been banked, Jordan Simpson banked a 14lbs common, Callum Hutchins banked an 11lbs common and a 15lbs 6ozs mirror, Richard Marshal banked a 21lbs fully scaled mirror, Bob Standen had two mirrors at 14lbs and 15lbs 2ozs while his brother **Mick** banked a 14lbs 2ozs mirror.

Eden Pond has only seen a couple of anglers on there but Wally Warricker has had a couple of good days banking 3 tench to 5lbs and one carp on his first session then banked 6 tench to 5lbs, 3 bream and 4 carp on the next session.

Maze Lake has only seen a few fish banked as there have not been a lot of anglers on there but the lake was host to the usual Steve and Josh Wood's and a couple of friends little knock up and the winner banked a nice bag of carp weighing 31lbs 6ozs.

Majors Lake has seen some nice fish banked of most species. A few notable mentions are young Joseph Cooper who

banked a few pike to 7-8lbs, Craig Shirley banking carp at 12lbs, 12lbs 2ozs and 14lbs and 6 bream, **terry Edwards** amongst the carp albeit of the low double sizes to 12lbs 3ozs, Jack Notridge banking two carp to 14lbs, brothers Mick and Bob Standen tried their luck on Majors and Mick banked 10lbs mirror and a bream while Bob banked a 8lbs 12ozs mirror, a 13lbs 8ozs common and then a 17lbs common, Dennis Wheeler had 5 bream to 5lbs 10ozs and a 12lbs 5ozs mirror, Adrian Buck had a common of 8lbs and a 19lbs mirror, Sam Hopkins banked 3 bream to 5lbs 8ozs and a mirror of 18lbs 8ozs and Karl Wallis banked some decent bream to 8lbs 9ozs and he was lucky enough to meet the mirror called 'Orange Spot' at Karl's scales span round to a new PB of 29lbs 12ozs.



My mind goes blank, so I sat down for a couple of hours before writing this column in preparation of some fishing festive ideas that I hope will help you decide what to ask for or buy for an angling friend or family member. It is also the time of the year when fishing shops offer some great discounted deals so shop around and pick up a great bargain.

No 1 Korum Self Take Station £9.99

If you fish late into the evening or through the night and you land a specimen catch then this brilliant little gadget will help you take that special catch shot. The self take station provides a bright, adjustable light connected to a mobile phone holder. It can be used with a camera tripod or with the adaptor can be screwed on to a bankstick has the adaptor has ¼" to 3/8" threads. It has a 4 way brightness level which is powered by AA batteries (not included) a perfect stocking filler.

No 2 End Peg by Peter May £14.99


If you like to read on the subject of fishing then I can recommend Peter May's book END PEG

- The Highs and Lows of Match Fishing. The book focuses on twelve important days in the life
of a match angler capturing some funny moments that match fishing creates encased in the
backdrop of glorious

countryside and riverside wildlife. The author Peter May

has been an angler all of his life and cannot remember a time when he did not fish but he can recall many times during his school and working life when he should not

have been fishing. All royalties of this book go to Alzheimer's Research UK so if you decide to purchase this book you will be supporting a great cause. I picked up my copy on Amazon at a slightly cheaper price.



No 3 Black Bottom Floats

In last month's column I mentioned some excellent handmade Perch bobbers and Sarkander waggler floats that I have been using to good effect by the excellent Andy Cowdery of Black Bottom Floats. Andy has his own YouTube channel and disappears into his 'Pleasure Shed' to makes videos on how to make the floats he sells via his eBay shop

https://www.ebay.co.uk/usr/andy.bbf The videos are very educational as well as a good chill out watch and you will love the quality of the floats which are finished to perfection.

No 4 Stainless Steel Flask

Every angler that ventures out on cold wintry days should have a hot flask of tea or coffee in his rucksack. There are some very good ones on the market in the price bracket of £15 to £25 and being stainless they will never smash when dropped unlike the old style glass insulated flasks. I used to go through flasks like they were out of fashion until the stainless steel variety

came along and saved the day.

No 5 🚔 Pewter Badges

I must admit I am a bit of a sucker for fishing badges and I have many available to buy in brass in various colours with the fishing tail films logo on them, however I also have a collection myself of Pewter badges in the species that I like to fish for. They range from £4 to £8 and make a great little keepsake to wear on a hat, beanie or jacket. One of my favourite Pewter badges is of a centre pin reel plus I have a soft spot for my perch and roach badges. As yet I have not found a crucian carp badge but will keep on looking.



No 6 Hip Flask

If the angler in your family likes a little swig of whiskey or rum then a small Hip flask containing said liquids on a cold winter days fishing is the perfect way to keep a little colour in the cheeks when the easterly wind is blowing. Priced around the £25 to £40 mark a little engraving down the side marks the special occasion of the present and brings more happy memories to the gift.

No 7 Beanie Hat

You cannot go wrong with the next item on my festive shopping list and that is the Beanie Hat, I love a beanie hat for the cold and windy days and they say you lose so much heat through your body via the head so with a warm beanie on top does keep those ears from freezing and when you are trying to concentrate on your next bite, you need to be warm. There are so many shapes, colours and materials to choose from but they range from £10 up to £20.

No 8 Korum Blox Loaded Tackle Box

Korum do make some great tackle for the specialist angler and in there Blox range of tackle items they have a couple of options of what they call the 'Loaded Blox Tackle Box' which has a selection of inserted baiting needles, compartments for bits and bobs tackle items like floats, hook packets, weights, plummets etc etc. The Box fits neatly into a rucksack and I use one of these boxes to store all my perch terminal tackle items, it is very neat and compact. Price wise you can pick up one of these excellent boxes for around £22 if you search around.

No 9 Korum KBI 3 Bite Alarm Presentation Set £79.99

This 3 Bite alarm set is superb value for the angler looking to sit behind a set of alarms whilst targeting species such as specimen perch, roach, crucians, tench and bream plus of course some mid-range carping. The code model K0360021 is packed with an impressive specification such as three high-output alarms and a wireless receiver, ensuring you never miss an opportunity when the fish decide to bite. Adjustable volume on each alarm, with the added benefit of a vibrating function on the receiver. Adding to the versatility of this set, each alarm features a 5mm LED with a 10-second latch. The Korum KBI Bite Alarm Presentation Set is powered by a 9V battery for the alarms and 3 AAA batteries for the receiver, which are not included in the set. This convenient power solution keeps your alarms and receiver functioning optimally, ensuring you're always ready for action. The set also includes 3 x bright green bite indicators. The alarms use 9V batteries which are not included. Being the time of year I have seen this excellent set sell for £63.99 so shop around when you are looking to spend your Christmas present money. If 3 alarms is too much then don't worry as Korum also sell a 2 bite alarm set up with the same specification for a RRP of £59.99 but again shop around as these can be purchased at discounted prices.

No 10 Free Subscription to Fishing Tail Films

The final item on my list is FREE for all to enjoy, as many of you know I have my own YouTube channel that is called Fishing Tail Films and by subscribing to the channel and giving the videos a Like helps me to promote my love of this great activity all year round. The channel already hosts well over 100 videos as I go in search of catching species such as perch, roach, tench, bream, carp, crucian, chub, grayling, dace and the humble gudgeon. I love my fishing and the surroundings I fish in and many of my films try to capture why many of us like to fish. With a gentle soundtrack I also offer a few tips on the way in terms of tackle and baits. All you need is an email address to subscribe to the channel and join me on my fishing travels.

I hope if you are out fishing over the festive period like I will be, that you have a great time and that 2025 brings all us anglers a fantastic year ahead. I wish all my colleagues at FWI a Merry Christmas and to all our readers a Healthy and Prosperous New Year.

fishing tail films

Greenacres Farm Fishery Biddenden, Kent

Everyone please read our rules online before booking up and any enquiries don't hesitate to ring up and ask or drop us a text look forward to seeing you on the bank!

Speci 1 Fishing has started to slow down now that the colder months have arrived. The carp are still showing over small baited areas or fishing pva bags close to the islands or inner margins. Perch fishing on here has been rewarding to anglers that are willing to fish for them with some just shy of 3lbs. These fish have all been caught on float fishing tactics by using worm or maggot on the hook and constantly sprinkling maggots over the top on every cast with a catapult to keep the rudd and roach in the swim which will then attract the big perch to feed.

Speci 2 The carp in this lake have been coming out by fishing to margin spots with solid pva bags or a little pva mesh bag and using fruity or sweet boilies like cell. Catfishing is more dominant fish in this lake and do push out the carp feeding in your area, as they will eat anything. But if you wish to just target the catfish then the best method is to use high attractant boilies or pellet like krill boilies or marine halibut pellet over a large bed of pellet that's soaked in a fishy attractant. The catfish have started to slow down now that the colder weather has arrived but this only helps out when targeting the carp.

Heron People have been having a cracking time on here catching large mixed bags of silvers and carp on both float and method feeding tactics. Baits that seem to be working is maggots, castors and worms over a ball of groundbait when float fishing and feeder fishing seems to be banded 10mm pellets. Still fishing really well even though the colder weather is here.

Kingfisher This lake is the one to be on any time of the year especially during the winter as it produces lovely mixed bags of fish and keeps you going all day. Fish can literally be caught on the top two sections of your pole on any bait that you wish to use.

Bluebell Tench have slowed down but the carp are still being caught out of this pond and the key is to bait up little and often with a pole pot or with a catapult and add a ball of groundbait every now and again just to keep their heads down grubbing around.

Don't forget to dip your nets, slings and unhooking mats/cradles or you will be asked to leave. CCTV IS IN OPERATION! Winter Opening Times: 7am - 4pm.







On the bank with the FWI

It's often said that those they can do, whilst those that can't talk about it/

Well once in a while the Freshwater Informer team take a break from merely talking, and writing about, other anglers captures, and actually get out on the bank themselves to try and demonstrate that they've still got what it takes to call themselves fishermen!

First up was 'Fearless' Freddy
Beaney who, in-between a hectic
match schedule, managed to get
his winter predator season
underway with a couple of
beautifully marked pike from his
local River Medway. It is really
encouraging to see that Freddy is
among a growing number of
anglers, including our own Bob
Morris, who prefer to target pike
using single, rather than treble,
hooks.





The vast majority of people who have made the switch to singles report that their hooking rate is in no way negativity affected, and that dealing with fish on the bank is far easier for both the angler and their quarry. A sentiment borne out by Freddy's recent success using this approach.


Next up is **Alex Coutts**, who took a leisurely, if somewhat precarious, stroll along the River Rother in flood conditions. A couple of hours spent running float fished lob worms through some of the slightly less aggressive areas of the river resulted in a nice brace of good sized chub.



True, he thought that the first one was a snag, and the second a pike, but he is easily confused and doesn't get out much – so we won't hold it against him!

Without a doubt, top FWI rod for this month was **Glen Relf**, who was out on the trail of specimen sized Perch. A relative newcomer to the species, Glen only really started targeting them at the tail end of last winter, when he managed to land his first two pounder.





This winters campaign is already off to a flier as he managed to break his PB not once, but twice during a day session at Mousehole Fishery, nr Nettleshead. Presenting a popped up prawn section, in conjunction with a free running lead set-up, Glen focused his attention on a deep area of the margins whilst feeding a steady supply of maggots over the top to create plenty of bait fish activity.

The tactic certainly paid off when his quiver tip slammed around to signal the take from the first of his new PB's at a very respectable 2lbs 11ozs. Repeating the process saw Glen push the bar even higher, and claim FWI bragging rights for the month, when a second bite resulted in his first three pounder, weighing in at 3lbs 1oz, and second personal best of the day.



Diary of a Match Angler

Matc Tricklebrook Fishery

TRICKLEBROOK FISHERY

After a week of non-stop preparation, making rigs, hook lengths etc I was ready to go. I got to the fishery just gone 7am, got the barrow loaded, dipped my nets and went for a walk around the lake as they were putting the pegs in. From speaking to a few anglers I know during the week they informed me that the venue has been fishing particularly hard and depended on the draw. After going around pegging the lake and getting some useful information off of the other anglers it was time for the draw. I was one of the first to put my hand into the bag of mystery and pick out peg 14 which was located up the spit, fishing into the right hand side. As I got to the peg I realised that it was the same peg that won the last match with 130lb so I was feeling confident. I quickly got myself set up, so let's go through the rigs I used on the day.

RIGS Pellet rig x2. As I was fishing in around two and a half foot of water I choose to fish a 0.3g slim line frenzee style float which was tied to 0.20 drennan supplex mainline with one N0.9 dropper and a bulk of 6 N0.9's 3" apart, then down to a 0.16 drennan supplex hook length with a super LWG in a size 14's. The bait i was using with this rig was expanders in 4/6mm, corn and maggots.

PLUMBING UP I decided to fish micros through a medium size guru cad pot at 13m which was just short of a over hanging tree which plumbed up to be around two and a half foot deep, I then realised that it was the same depth all over the same part of the lake I was fishing except the edge. This meant that I could fish the same rig on different lines which made it quick and efficient. Then down my edge was around 18 inches deep.

HOW THE MATCH WENT With the rigs and plumbing up done, it was time for the all in. The whistle went at 9:30am and I began on my 13m line fishing a 4mm expander over a medium size cad pot full of micros, after

around 2 minutes I noticed a few bubbles coming up around the float and shortly after I had a lovely clean bite and fish on. With the first fish landed, I repeated the process again and pretty much the same thing happened. I started to get into a little rhythm and was catching steadily then it would slow down before another spell of fish feeding. By 12:30pm the action had slowed, however I wasn't too concerned as I could still see fizzing coming up on my spot but it did give me the opportunity to feed my edge spot. I potted in two pot fulls of Dynamite F1 sweet ground bait and left it for an hour to settle. I stuck out on my 13m line as I knew there were fish out there but couldn't get a bite on expander, I changed to two dead reds and had an instant reaction. I had another little run on this before I over fed and the swim looked like a Jacuzzi! A change was needed, so instead of two dead reds, I put on a grain of corn which stands out and managed to nick a few more. With an hour past it was time to try the edge with a piece of corn and potted in ground bait through a cad pot and had a instant reaction. However this was the only fish I had from the down the edge, and so I spent the last half hour fishing long and adding the odd fish to my total. At 2:30pm the whistle went and I was feeling particularly confident. Being the last to be weighed I knew what weight I had to beat which was 40lbs, so I emptied my net and the scales read 50lbs 7ozs which meant I managed to win my section and the overall match. The result also put me top of the table in the Sunday league points, let's hope I can hold onto it!



HAWKHURST FISH FARM

Match day, Sunday just gone. As I done so much prep for the Tricklebrook match it meant that I didn't have too much to do for my next outing at

Hawkhurst Fish Farm. I made up a few more rigs and got the bait ready then I was ready to go. I arrived at the fishery for just gone 7am, loaded up the barrow and spent a while just looking at the lake, trying to spot moving fish and I did. I then went for a little walk around the lake again to see anything topping and if I could see if they were showing in particular area but it wasn't the case, as they were showing all over the lake, but as usual, as soon as the whistle went they all disappeared with only the odd one showing. Before that, I had drawn out permanent peg 4 which was located right in the middle of the left bank. I wasn't too happy with the draw, however anything can happen. As I began setting up I was informed by one of our angles that the peg I had drawn had produced a weight of 180-200lb recently, so obviously this got my hopes up of having a great day. I quickly finished setting up and was time for plumbing up and the rigs.

PLUMBING UP I set up a line at 13.5m for fishing pellets and plumed up to around 5 – 5 and a half foot, I then plumbed up a short line at a top kit and three which was a couple of inches deeper than my long line surprisingly and finally an edge line which plumed up to around 4ft so a deep edge.

RIGS Pellet line at 13.5m. As I was fishing in around 5 and a half foot of water I chose to fish a 0.3g slim line frenzee float which was tied to 0.20 drennan supplex with one dropper and a bulk of 6 no.9's, then for the hook length it was 0.16 drennan supplex with a super LWG in a size 14's, also it was a 6" hook length.

I was also using two no.8 back shots to stabilise the rig and hit more bites, I was also using blue drennan power pull elastic as I find you don't bump as many fish as it's nice and soft with plenty of stretch and very confident of landing the fish, it's also long lasting and just brilliant.

EDGE RIG - I was fishing a 0.4g round body frenzee float, when fishing down the edge in a good depth of water, I like to fish pretty heavy. I do this because as the bigger fish tend to come in the edge they often miss your rig and run the risk of getting foul hooked. Fishing a little heavier helps reduce this problem. I fish a 0.4g round body Ed frenzee float tied to 0.20 drennan supplex with a bulk of 9 no.9's but I like to just have a gap between the stotz so they are not crammed up together, down to a 0.16 drennan hook length with a super LWG in a size 12 as I was fishing baits like corn, 6mm expander, etc. I was also using a drennan purple power pull elastic which is a little heavier than the blue because I was expecting better stamp fish.

PASTE RIG - Very simple, a Johnny paste float from Gortini pole floats in a size 4x14's with an inline drennan olivet free running up and my 0.20 drennan supplex mainline, with a 6" 0.16 drennan supplex hook length with a LWG in a size 12. With an orange drennan power pull elastic.

BAIT CHOICES

GROUNDBAIT - My go to ground bait at the moment has to be the Dynamite F1 sweet, as I find the fish just can't resist it. The way I prepare the ground bait is at a ratio of two parts ground bait to one part water and leave it for around 30-45 mins, I then add a tiny bit more water and then push it through a 4mm riddle. It's going to be heavy so you will probably have to push it through the riddle by hand but then you are left with a lovely ground bait that is going to sink straight to the bottom. I prepared the night before a session or match.

MICROS - I then like to use the Dynamite F1 sweet micros not only to match the ground bait but because of how easy they are to prepare and again I've found the fish love them. I simply pore in the chosen amount I think I'm going to use, cover them in water for 2 mins, drain the water off and within 15 minutes they are perfect and ready to go. With them being so easy and quick to prepare I like to do them on the bank as they are fresh and ready.

EXPANDERS - Again very simple to prepare. I like to use a old flask. I tip my chosen amount of expander all

I like to use a old flask, I tip my chosen amount of expander all different sizes, I then cover them in ice cold water and put in a few ice cubes and place them in the fridge over night, the reason for this is because you are then left with a firm pellet that is going to last longer on the hook and easier to hook.

I also had some live maggots, Sonubaits F1 sweet corn which I really like, not only the smell, but the quality of the grains of corn. You can hook them really well. Hard pellets, meat, bread, paste and hemp completed my options.

HOW THE MATCH WENT

The whistle went at 9:30 and immediately went straight down the edge, I started by potting in a medium size cad pot full of micros and sitting over the top with a 6mm expander and within around 2 minutes the float shot under, I couldn't believe it however it wasn't the stamp I was really after, however I off the mark and feeling confident. I repeated the process again and it went even quicker, this time being a bit bigger, and I managed to get two more again back to back. I then repeated the process and the float was left motionless, it was like someone had just turned off a switch as I went from having a fish a chuck and thinking I had some sort of rhythm to suddenly nothing. With this I fed another pot full of micros and went out on the 13.5m line fishing the exact same way and had one fish pretty much straight away and within 5-10 mins later I had another and at this point I was convinced I was leading the match however after that last fish I couldn't seem to get a bite. I was

trying everything back down the edge back out long on the short line but absolutely nothing was happening but everyone was in the same boat it seemed the whole lake had just switched off for some reason. I was putting in small volumes of micros and ground bait in different areas of water I had in front of me hoping to maybe get a fish on one of the lines and keep rotating however It just did not happen. I did have a couple of missed bites so I shallowed up a bit, but nothing happened. I could see people starting to catch the odd fish here and there but it was very tricky. At around 12:30 I fed my edge with a pot full of groundbait and the other with micros and left them to settle for about an hour. In the mean time nothing to report. I had nothing until the last 15 mins when I lost two fish in quick succession.

At 2:30pm the match came to an end, and what a challenging day it had been. I ended up weighing 21lbs 10ozs which placed me 9th out 21 anglers. The match was won with 44lbs 2ozs from peg 1. Second had 41lbs 6ozs from peg 2, and third place weighed in 30lbs 9ozs from peg 11.

On reflection I should have set up a shallow rig or maybe taken a feeder rod, but its easy to be wise after the event. Although there is always next time.



Jim's Journey

A Cosy Retreat at Colts Hill Glamping Pods: Fishing at Tricklebrook Fishery

As the chill of autumn set in, we decided to switch things up for our latest fishing adventure, opting for the comfort of a Colts Hill Glamping Pod at Tricklebrook Fishery. These timber pods, located on the banks of the New Specimen Lake, offer cosy accommodations for 2-4 people and even feature a log-fired hot tub. A midweek break was just what we needed, especially as Dad was keen to use up some holiday leave.

Upon arrival, we were warmly welcomed by hosts Andy and Katey, who showed us to Kingfisher Pod (Pod 6). This pod is perfectly positioned opposite an island with reed-lined margins—an idyllic spot for fishing. With the swim choice made for us due to the pod's location, we approached our setup a little differently this time. While I observed the water for signs of activity, Dad prepared our nets and weigh mats at the dipping tank—a must to prevent the spread of KHV, which has been a concern in some areas.







swim, targeting the island

and a nearby bay where I'd spotted some movement along the margins. Dad took the right-hand side, casting a mesh bag of crushed OG fish and pellets to the end of the island, steering clear of autumn leaves. While setting my rods, I noticed a patch of recurring bubbles in open water, which seemed too good an

to keep you occupi

opportunity to pass up.

Once our rods were positioned, we scattered a small amount of bait and tidied up our swim and pod. Fishing somewhere new always comes with

uncertainties, but sticking to my tried-and-tested approach paid off. Within no time, my right-hand rod burst into life and I landed a spirited double figure carp. A great way to start our session.

Perch fishing success

We also tried our hand at perch fishing, having stocked up on maggots and Dendrobaenas from the Fish On tackle shop en route. Using a simple float setup, I caught several small perch, while Dad opted for a ledgering approach. Over the course of a few hours, we landed more than ten perch weighing over 1lb 8ozs, including my new PB of 1lb 9ozs - a milestone I was thrilled to achieve!

A comfortable evening

As the light faded, we prepared our carp rods for the night and enjoyed a delicious Indian takeaway delivered to the pod. The cosy warmth of the pod made a big difference on a chilly evening, giving us a chance to relax and recharge. With everything tidied up and a quick shower, I settled in, hopeful that the alarms would soon sound.

Morning glory

The night passed quietly, but at 7am, my open-water rod screamed into action.

After a strong fight and a few dramatic runs, I landed an incredible looking heavily scaled mirror of 21lbs 10ozs carp - another "twenty" to my growing tally, and a superb example of the quality of fish on offer at Tricklebrook. Over the past five months, I've managed to catch over 20 carp exceeding 20lbs - a streak



that Dad reminds me is exceptional. By comparison, he's had more smaller carp this year but fewer big ones, which goes to show how much luck plays a role in which fish picks up your bait. With all the weighing and pictures taken I returned the fish back to its watery home.

Tips for a Successful Visit

- 1. **Plan Your Gear:** Although the pods come equipped with essentials like beds and cooking facilities, bring your own towels and personal fishing gear.
- 2. **Disinfect Your Equipment:** Use the on-site dipping tank to clean your nets, weigh mats, and slings to protect the fishery from potential infections.
- 3. **Pack for Variety:** While carp fishing is the main attraction, bring tackle for perch fishing you might land a PB!
- 4. **Book Midweek for Tranquillity:** Midweek stays are quieter and give you more time to focus on your fishing.










Return to Mequinenza

In the early 2000's James Gardner and I were regular visitors to Meguinenza and the river Ebro. Our first trip there was in the company of Luke Moffatt, our catfish guru and mentor. Each spring after that initial trip, we travelled to fish for the huge catfish that inhabited the river. We weren't alone either as specimen hunters from all over Europe were attracted to the area too. Several angling companies set up guiding business's in Mequinenza, and that's how we met Gary Allen, my friend and angling legend.

NOVEMBER 2024

This trip to Spain was a birthday and Christmas present for my son Adam. We rarely fish together, so this was going to be guite different. As we prepared to leave home the tragic floods that hit Valencia were all over the news. So it was with some trepidation that we drove through torrential rain, up the motorway to Meguinenza from Barcelona.

As we drove into the village the memories came flooding back. I hadn't been here in over ten years. My son Adam and I had arranged to meet Gary for a beer or two, and to discuss our angling prospects. This trip was going to be something different for me, we were going carp fishing! The initial idea was to fish from a boat, something that Gary has perfected, and something I was keen to learn. However with so much rain the previous week, the water was being run off, which scotched that idea immediately.

Where to start?

Gary's quests the previous week had been carp fishing too, which gave us some up to date information. With the rivers flow fluctuating daily, they had to adapt to the extreme conditions, while enduring extreme weather.


Despite everything they did succeed in catching some good carp, which was encouraging.

First thing we needed to do was to get a fishing licence, and a fishing permit. Fortunately these were readily available in the local tackle shop. It was like stepping back in time as we entered the small shop, it was stuffed to the rafters with all manner of lures, and all the very latest carp tackle! Which only goes to show how popular the river is, and that it's not just catfish that anglers are now fishing for!

to fish with two rods, so Gary's would to be shared between Adam and myself. We were using 12ft 3lb test curve rods, paired with 'baitrunner' reels, loaded with 15lb




your batteries are dead!

line. Our end tackle was a simple but effective 'blow back' rig, tied with a 'line aligner' on long shank size 8 hook. Two 16mm bottom baits were placed on the hair, with a small PVA bag containing a few 'juiced up' baits which completed our set up. By the way, it's 'days only' fishing on the river, and this is strictly enforced, so you need to be well organised at setting up and packing away efficiently.

DAY 1

Gary took us downriver to the 'cliff' swim. Our position, perched on top of the high bank gave us a 'birds eye' view of the river. Gary had seen carp showing here a few days previously, so this was why we were here. We could clearly see the after effects of the previous weeks rain. It was no surprise the river was running hard and dirty, with branches, bamboo canes, and weed floating downstream. Directly opposite us, where the Cinca and Segre, two smaller rivers merge with the mighty Ebro, we could see a 'tide line', that fortunately was hugging the far bank.

We spent at least half an hour getting everything ready, while watching the river for any signs of carp. Much to our relief we did see a few, which fortunately where within our casting range. Two rods were positioned downstream along the marginal shelf, just off the rocky shore, two more were staggered across the flow, while the last two were cast upstream, again at staggered distances. This gave us a good spread, we felt confident that any carp swimming our side of the river would find one of our baits. Every few hours we had to re-cast, after our rods were wiped out by the



accumulated weed. We fed a few free baits via a throwing stick after each re-cast, hoping to draw a bite. The day slipped by without a fish, but the time had passed quickly. We swapped fishy stories about adventures past and present.

DAY 2

An early start, Gary was keen to secure the 'hot swim' from the previous week, where his clients had fished. Most importantly, the swim



had seen regular amounts of bait throughout the previous week, so there was a chance some fish would still be in the area? Pre-baiting, or feeding large amounts of bait is not allowed, but the regulations do change frequently, so be aware if you fancy fishing here.

The swim was actually a boat mooring which made it a comfortable spot to fish. Gary's and my rods were cast upstream. Gary cast his into a small sheltered bay, just off the main current. Mine were cast up and across the flow, while Adam's were cast downstream, across the current at staggered distances and allowed to swing into position on the drop-off.

The upstream rods needed re-casting regularly, as the build up of weed was a problem, dragging my rigs out of position. The up-side was, each time I re-cast, I was introducing fresh PVA bags of 'juiced up' baits. We hoped any marauding carp would be attracted to this scent trail. Adam was first into action with two screaming runs that produced two hard fighting 'wild' commons, the best weighing 27lbs. These fish lead a hard life, where 'only the fittest survive'. They have to fight the current constantly, and

survive the attentions of catfish. By the way, the Ebro catfish have grown a lot bigger since I last fished here, fish in excess of 200lbs swim in these waters! As the day progressed more carp fell to Adam's rods, which only goes to show he's a far better carp angler than me. I did manage a consolation fish before the day ended, which saved my blushes!

DAY 3

We had to return to the boat mooring, after the previous days success. The pathway which lead to the mooring was in fact a bridge, under this we saw large shoals of bleak, that were occasionally harassed by small zander. Behind the pathway, out of the main flow was a narrow bay that ran parallel to the shore.

We had noticed several 'carp shows' behind the pathway, the previous day.



So Gary cast his two rods into the far margin, just



short of the tree-line. My rods were again cast upstream, but with more space, I positioned them directly upstream, in an effort to reduce the weed problem. Adam's rods were again cast downstream, one across the flow, the other parallel to the drop off. Unsurprisingly Gary's rods drew most of the bites. Adam and I took it in turn to share the fish. We landed several carp, some of which were sporting battle scares from close encounters with catfish, or cormorants. However a couple were 'scale perfect' specimens which Gary was sure weren't born in the river. He believes these are left over live baits, that had been released, years ago when live baiting was allowed. These carp, bought from fish farms are a completely different shape, and look like they are going to grow very large in the future.

Fishing for Schools

Method Feeder fished short on corn

The venue we use for our Monday Rowhill school fishing group is Shorne country park, Gravesend, which is run by the T.W.A.P.S angling club. As this angling course involves doing an angling qualification this venue has the amenities needed, two good fishing lakes and an indoor facility to do our paperwork towards the course. Shorne is a good place to teach juniors how to fish as it has a wide range of fish species and, apart from winter conditions, is always good for catching fish. There are two lakes at the venue, the Long lake, and the Steps lake. Although the Long lake is heavily weeded and the Steps lake looks a picture, I personally prefer fishing on the Long lake, there is something special about fishing a weeded lake and wondering what fish live amongst the weeds. Although I call them lakes, they are more like ponds, both being under 0.7 of an acre.

When coaching on the Long lake a good method, especially when teaching youngsters, is a Whip as there are a lot of silver fish and small Tench and crucians in the lake. So, whip fishing is an ideal choice, but this lake is the sort of water that does spring a surprise specimen from time to time. One thing I do customise when using a whip is to elasticate the top section of the whip, which gives

you more chance if you do hook a bigger fish. One big advantage of the Whip over rod and reel when teaching young people, is by having no reel when whip fishing. This eliminates all the tangles associated with youngsters when they first start fishing, and it is a good way of teaching basic float fishing. To get youngsters interested in fishing I normally sell an elasticated Whip with a Float rig for a tenner, so for a starter kit, it is a cheap way of getting into fishing.

On the recent school break I decided to have a session on my own to see if I could catch a carp. At this time of the year, its not a fish we would normally be fishing for, as normally we would be fishing for silver fish, although we have caught the odd carp by mistake when whip fishing for silvers. A good reason while we normally fish for silvers with my school groups is the sessions are short so I would prefer the students to catch a few silvers, learning the skills of unhooking etc, than waiting all the session sitting behind a rod waiting for a bite. The Long lake, being small and really weeded, most anglers would say the best method would be to float fish, but on this occasion, I wanted to try something different, and the aim was to catch a carp, regardless of the size.

Some years ago, if I remember rightly the club did a survey on the lake and found out there was too many fish in the lake. The

more carp there are, the more competition there is for food. This leads to there being less food for each carp, which leads to slower growth and smaller average size. With this evidence the club removed some of the bigger carp in the lake. Nowadays it is thought the bigger carp go up to 10lb.

I opted to ledger using a heavy feeder rod and 10lb main line, using a small method feeder with Krill micro pellets around it, with corn on a hair rigged quick stop. On its day corn is a terrific bait at this venue. On the day I fished it, I had the lake to myself and opted for a margin swim that I knew. It was quite weeded but had a nice clear, deep, spot which would be easy to cast too. My method of fishing looked really unorthodox, I was going to fish 10ft from the bank , method feeder style, on a small heavily weeded lake. But what gave me confidence that I had a chance of catching, was the conditions on the day, overcast, mild and importantly the lake water clarity had some colour. A week before the lake water clarity was clear, which is the kiss of death for fishing. The first thing I did when getting to my peg was to feed some 6ml pellets into the swim, which I could easily do underarm.

On my first cast I aimed to get the method feeder as tight to the weed as I could. It helped that the corn hook bait was pushed into the pellets around the method feeder as it had no chance of getting the hook bait stuck in the weed on cast. It was then just a matter of time waiting to see whether the quiver tip in front of me, would spring into life. After around 20 minutes I had an unmissable bite that saw the quiver tip arch over. The fish did try to run into the weed but, being the weed is mainly a soft floating weed, I soon got control of the fish, and the first fish was in the net. Then after that I had a flurry of more carp. The tactics were after each fish caught, to feed another handful of pellets and, because my swim had two clear spots in the weed, I alternated casts into each spot as I felt I could pick off the fish from both spots instead of too much disturbance in one area.

I finished a short session with four mirror carp and one fish that looked like a crucian but had fantails. Nothing big, but on the day, I had found a way to catch a carp. I had to get my skates on, because since the clocks went back, the country park now shut at 4.30pm.

On the first session back at school, fishing on the Long lake at Shorne, one of the students chose to try the same tactic. The method feeder fished short with corn and on a short 90-minute session, managed to catch a carp as well. After a dogged fight on the same session as we were packing up, a lad fishing the waggler in another swim using maggot, hooked something that was not a silver fish and after a good fight a nice crucian carp nestled in his landing net and a nice way to finish the session.

I have found the best way to attach a kernel of corn, hair rigged style, is to push the quick stop through the roundish top of the corn, in the middle, then push down through to the other end of corn, and you'll find the quick stop fits snuggly into the opening of the corn. In this way I have confidence that the corn will stay on in any conditions. Also, in the winter months when you only need a few grains of corn for a day's feeder fishing, I don't like to open a new tin of corn every time I go fishing, as most of it gets wasted. Once a week at home, I like a bowl of chicken and noodle soup, I am not a lover of the sweet corn, so I tend to transfer the corn (around 15 pieces of corn) and flavoured as well, into a small container, put it in the fridge and then use the corn throughout the week for my fishing.

I can particularly recommend the Tackle Box in Dartford who sponsor our work at Fishing 4 Schools and are always happy to help young anglers

Fishing 4 Schools - The Year in Review by Bob Gobles

It's been a while since writing articles for the Informer but I'm quessing many I know will remember the Fishing 4 Schools tips that appeared in the magazine some time back.

It is late November as I write and not too cold outside, remembering times past when ice and snow abound and continued well past Christmas for many weeks. The talk these days is of climate change, the planet warming up etc, but I'm not totally convinced. Can we believe politicians? Is it scare mongering?

Maybe you have ideas, but the jury is out with me, I will leave that one with you. The fishing of late has improved immensely especially trout fishing. With the cooling



water, trout will be eager to feed and provide good sport. I would suggest using lure patterns, like Cats whisker, Viva, Taddies, Blobs, Booby and Minkie, but any fish imitating pattern with lots of movement. All our Trout fisheries will be fishing well and of course my home fishery Bewl Water, which has come alive after a warm summer and the fish laying deep to keep cool. But there have been fish caught but not in great numbers. The any method guys have been doing the business with Spinner and especially Float and baits, catching well throughout, but now it's the fly guys that will catch as well.



This time of year should provide good fishing from the banks, but be aware it is muddy with the water level guite a way down due to the ongoing work on the dam wall, but hopefully finishing soon. Remember to wear wellies or waders and warm clothing and a

hot drink, but of course there are boats to hire.



The fishing for schools' team have had another brilliant year. Although the sessions have finished for the winter period, we have now more coaches that have come on-board to cover the demand with schools, with all aspects be it Coarse, Fly and some sea fishing. The coarse fishing has been excellent with all the venues that offer us the sessions for a little cost and the students have had a ball catching. If you ask the teachers on their behaviour, they are over the moon.

Also, what a delight they have been to teach, we as

coaches often ask the students what they like most from fishing, and typical answers come back as follows; with a quote from one student... "It calms me down, take time to enjoy the environment watching a float, anticipating it to go under. It feels good with my mental health, also the quietness and wildlife are awesome".



Not forgetting the mental health groups that also come on board. All of the students also have a go at Fly fishing for the Carp. They can't believe what they are seeing when a carp comes up to the surface feeding on a scattering of small dog biscuits, slurping and sucking.

The rods are set up with a dog biscuit imitation



made from deer hair and trimmed and fashioned around a strong short, shanked hook (Barbless) the size of a 10 or 8, you can get the carp to come in close with a little stealth. All you need to do is roll cast the imitation into the feeding mayhem and hold on. The take is explosive and if not careful can break you off. The students can't believe the sheer power of these running fish and sometimes it can take 20 minutes to net the rubber lipped monster, they love it and always want more. Roll on Next year, I believe applications have now been filled and I hope your school is in the running, if not there is always next year. Don't forget that these courses are free to schools, but donations are always appreciated.

The Golden Years of Coarse Fishing by Bob Rolph

Legends of the 60's - No.9 Jack Hilton (The Master) 1927-1997

As I approach the conclusion of my series of articles in the Freshwater Informer, after over 5 years of memoirs from the 1960s. I thought that I should go out on a high, by recalling the fishing life of one of the greats of our sport, Jack Hilton, who only took up serious big fish angling in 1958 when he was in his 30's.

His main hobby during his 20's was motor cycle scrambling, and earlier fishing the River Lea for anything that came along, like roach, dace, chub and small barbel. He was an army parachutist at one time, before he took to serious 'specimen hunting'.

Growing up in Hertfordshire near to Cheshunt Reservoir and Hoddesden, and to numerous fellow mentors who were to shape his short fishing life of less than 20 years. For 15 years he hardly picked up a rod after his mid teens, until reading the books of Dick Walker and BB, rekindled his interest in fishing when he was 31 years of age. He met Roy Wicks, Kenny Ewington and a young Frank Guttfield in 1958 and they started to fish for wild common carp at a lake called 'The Chalk Pit', where they had numerous fish of 5-8lbs on potato and bread baits. Fishing with Frank he also took his first big carp of 16 and 17lbs from another local water, and a 20lbs carp from Withy Pool in Bedfordshire in 1960. But it wasn't carp that Jack first became hooked on, it was in fact Tench, when in 1958 to 1962 he and Frank fished at Southill Park lake in Bedfordshire for the bags of quality fish that this former estate lake was famous for.

Southill Park was laid out in 1777 by the famous landscape gardener Capability

Brown, and the 37 acre lake was formed as part of the estate, and was once owned by the Whitbread Family. It was a day ticket water during the 1960s, the bailiff came round on his bike to

collect the 2/6 each morning (12p today). It was full of weed, quite shallow, but full of Tench and Rudd. I fished it 3 times in 1965 from the curved concrete Dam on one side of the lake. I caught good sized tench, but it was Jack and Frank Guttfield that immortalised the place as

disturbed grubs and worms etc.





'Twitcherlot Pool' in the 1964 book 'In Search of Big Fish', using cockles and mussels as bait. Franks 1962 season was recorded in this book as a diary, and it became a best seller. All the greats of the time fished here, and 5lbs Tench were commonplace. In those days a 5lbs Tench was the fish to aim for, equivalent to a 10lbs fish today! Jack fished with Frank here, and for Pike at Owls Pit in Essex, long before he started out on the carp trail, it's all recorded in the classic 1964 book. They started the Herts Specimen Group with Pete Frost, Bill Keal, and Alec Lewis and were joined by an Irishman called Bill Quinlan, with whom Jack struck up a lifelong friendship. Come 1964 and they were in Kent, carp fishing at one of the first syndicate pits at Sundridge near Sevenoaks, where the lake was still being worked by day, and the carp were formally stocked by a local man called Fred Spice who

July 31st 1964 (one month after passing my driving test, 12 lessons £12)! I was there too, fishing next to Jack and Bill, and a very young prodigy of theirs Roger Smith. Spicers carp lake as it became known was on a local council rubbish dump and depot, and lorry's came and went all day, and gravel digging took place from 8am to 4pm. But in the evening and at night, all was quiet and the carp angler appeared as if by magic to set up his pitch on the stark sides of this freshly dug sand and gravel pit. No bivvies in those day, we hadn't invented them yet, just a lean too tent over a couple of forked sticks, a pump up brass Primus stove, a few stores and a bag of potatoes, worms and a few loaves.

lived nearby. The carp moved into the freshly dug margins at night to feed on the

My green A35 Van was down there most Saturday nights during the summer of 1964, but Jack and Bill were present far more regularly than me, and they began to catch carp to 15lbs at night, and tried to show me the ropes. I had only just started serious carp fishing at Snodland lakes, and was keen to learn from the 'Master' as Roger Smith used to call him, over a freshly brewed cup of tea made for us all by Jack Hilton.

I never stuck with it at Spicers, my £10 season ticket was not very productive, and I moved over on to Barbel fishing on the Avon, where again I met up with Jack and Bill fishing the Pipe Bridge Swim on the Royalty fishery at Christchurch. Whatever Jack touched it turned to gold, be it double figure Avon Barbel, 2lbs plus Stour Roach, 5lbs Southill Tench, 20lbs owls pit Pike, 7lbs Chub, and soon to come, Carp to die for!!

My next encounter with Jack Hilton was again in Kent, at Dartford, where my old mate Grahame Igglesden and I fished along side him at Brooklands Lake, nicknamed Goodwood at the time, by Jack, in the early mornings of 1965 and 66. Carp fishing was becoming big in Kent during the mid 1960s at places like Horton Kirby, Sutton, Darenth, Snodland, Faversham and Dartford, and groups like my Kent group, Bob Morris and his mates from Dartford, and the Herts Group were fishing midweek nights at all the famous local waters. Gerry Savage was the man at Brooklands, but it was Jack, Bill and Roger Smith who revolutionised carp fishing at Dartford's D.D.A.P.S. Water .

Officially there was no night fishing on this old, but well stocked 'Double' pit, with that causeway in between, but no one took much notice of this 60 years ago, and we all fished till midnight

or after 3am, parking on the cinder track and coming in off Powder Mill Lane. We never actually did 'all nighters', so that was OK in our book, as we all had jobs to go to during the day. Jack, Bill and Roger started their 'Goodwood' campaign in 1965 in short visits from north

London before or after their landscape gardening work during the day. They both worked for Jack in his business, so they worked together and fished together for years in his Redmire Landscapes firm, then fished together for carp at night, mainly off the causeway swims on both sides, before leaving about 7 am to get through London in the Blackwall tunnel. No bridge in those days! Jacks 15cwt Thames van contained all the rods already made up in the back, and they appeared every morning about 3am to unload and start their short stints, fishing with bread and potato baits. I was there too, so I saw it all going on the comings and goings every day throughout the summer months. The carp they caught were astonishing for the time. 56 doubles to over 20lbs, by July 1967, they fished 5 times a week, before Grahame and I could get a look in, then we only managed a handful of carp, fishing the same area.

All the members of my Kent Group fished there too over the years, Ron Blackmore, Ken Rowley, Keith Dickens, Ron Gould, Steve Edwards and John Kane, but it was a very young Grahame Igglesden who finally got into the mind of Jack Hilton, to see how it was all done. No one could touch Jack at Brooklands, not even Gerry Savage, and Grahame began to pick up tips from Jack and started catching fish, good sized mirror carp fishing next to Jack. Jack took him under his wing and invited him to join his proposed syndicate to fish at Redmire Pool in 1967.

Grahame and I had recently returned from Redmire Pool, where we saw that all the huge carp had not perished in the winter ice of 1963, as most had feared, and Grahame and Jack hatched a plan to visit Redmire in 1967 and fish for those monsters that we saw, then in Sept Jack caught the biggest carp of the season in the pouring rain.

During 1966 and 67 after our 'rediscovery' of Redmire Pool on April 17th 1965, the editor of Creel magazine, John Nixon took over the running of the fishery, and invited the members of the 16 or so 'specimen groups' around the country to fish there for £1 per day or £5 for the week. Max 4 anglers per day, as now. I took advantage of this offer, and so did Jack Hilton, Grahame Igglesden, Roger Smith and Mike Mintram. The 4 of them had the 3rd week of September 1967 down there, and Jack caught the 8th largest carp ever caught, and the largest of the year. An incredible common carp of 35lbs in the pouring rain. It came from the very same spot 'Greenbanks' where I had spied it from the tree tops 2 years previously feeding in the shallows. This massive fish, the largest of that season, started a chain reaction in carp fishing circles and among the ever-growing army of budding carp anglers, culminating on June 16th 1980 when Chris Yates broke the record down there with a mirror carp of 51lbs 8ozs. This fish had been caught many times before at lesser weights, by Roger Bowskill, Tom Mintram, Eddie Price and Bob Jones. Grahame photographed Jack's 35lbs common, and it became legendary.

Jack Hilton continued to fish Redmire Pool and Ashlea Pool during the late 1960s and early 1970s later running the syndicate with a rod of iron from 1968-1975. He landed over 20 carp of over 20lbs including a monster fish of 40lbs and 3 over 30. He was the first to catch such fish in a single season, and was revered in the angling press of the time. Bill Quinlan also had big fish down there, but neither Grahame, Roger, Mike or myself were fortunate or skilful enough to capture a double figure fish ourselves. Jack's name was synonymous with Redmire Pool and he wrote about his exploits there in the Angling Newspapers of the time, and in his book Quest for Carp. He even named his house and landscape gardening company after Redmire, and once spent over 16 weeks at a time at the now infamous lake trying to catch the record carp. He was convinced that there was a 70lber in there, and believed that he had seen it. He was the first person to catch 4 carp over 30lbs in the 1970s.

Jack was a very quiet, thinking angler, developing much in the way of rods and tackle for the specimen hunter. In May 1962 he teamed up with Don Niesh

(Dons of Edmonton) to produce a range of the new hollow fibre glass 11 foot carp rods called the 10/10 Goddess range marketed by D.A.M. and Alan Brown of Hitchin. He also produced a range of carp hooks based on a loop eyed salmon hook, cut and soldered on the shaft, and built numerous famous landing nets and poles. We were using these salmon hooks for catfish in 1968, cut and modified with solder, and also the Dons 'Golden Goddess' trout rod blanks for our fishing on the midlands reservoirs at that time. All built at home with fittings from Alan Brown, Walkers of Hythe or Oliver's of Knebworth .

Jack continued carp fishing right through the early 1970s from his new house in Suffolk where he also loved the River Waveney for its Roach, Chub and Barbel. He would often just walk the river at times reflecting on his life and whether fishing was the correct thing to be doing. He became very religious, and in 1976 suddenly gave up all fishing, studying the bible and becoming a


Jehovah's Witness, questioning the general ethics of catching and returning fish. Jehovah means God or Jesus, and Jack found solace from it all and studied the bible avidly in the 20 years before he sadly died in 1997 aged 70, from Leukaemia. It's hard to believe that this legendary figure of our sport is nearing his centenary in 3 years time. He always was the elder statesman of his groups, in 1967 at Redmire, Grahame, Mike and Roger were just teenagers when Jack was their 'Master' at 40 years of age. Roger Smith always called him that, as they were all in awe of him. His only book 'Quest for Carp' 1972, is a lasting legacy to a master angler and human being. His son Keith who frequently accompanied his father on trips to Redmire when he was a young boy, has now taken up the mantle and catches carp

to order just like his father, and mentor, did.


Jack's landing net pole has every carp he ever caught engraved on it, and lovingly varnished, and can be viewed at some events that Keith attends. Chris Ball used to have many of Jack's rods, where they went at auction I do not know, but these items of tackle are pivotal in the history of carp fishing in this country and must never be lost.

Catch up

I had an unusual incident the other day while out piking. I had waited a couple of hours with my deadbaits out when my buzzer sounded a couple of bleeps alerting me to some sort of activity. My float which was out at about 40yd was moving towards me quite quickly. This was strange because a substantial sized running weight was incorporated into the end tackle which meant that whatever direction the pike moved off in the float should have submerged. Anyway, it was time to react, and this took

the form of rapidly winding down on the fish to while walking backwards to increase the speed. I felt

nothing on contact and worse still the trace had been cut through/broken in the middle and a squiggly frayed section at the end showed me that it had been pulled through or over something sharp. There was no possibility of the 30lb bs trace being faulty as I had only made and tested it the day before and it was my standard type, extra long with a swivel at on end and a link at the other! After spending a while analysing exactly what had happened, I was left with only two possibilities. First, and most likely, some sort of tangle had occurred on the cast, this was probably made more likely by a strong crosswind that day. In this scenario the pike would pick up the mackerel head bait along with the trace and the heavy lead would then ensure that it was pulled through its jaws resulting in the trace breaking and as I knew that there were no snags of any sort present in this area, this seemed the only likely cause. I then thought of another possible reason; a fish trailing broken off tackle, possibly including a wire trace, had crossed my line and tangled up with own my terminal tackle. This would have caused the unusual take! The good thing was that my running lead would not be



left attached to a fish and my single barbless size 2 hook would almost certainly be easy for the pike to get rid of. I am always trying to learn lessons from my experiences and this incident reminded me that we should always try our best to cut down on the likelihood of tangles when Piking. It is often difficult to come up with answers or even to assess the reasons for the problems but there are certain things I am now sure of in the piking arena. I have found that one of the main causes of tangles on casting is the wrong ratio of weight difference between lead and bait. I tend to use relatively small baits because of my single hook approach and therefore heavy bombs 3oz plus can be a




potential problem. I am not really a fan of long-range piking and try to avoid it when possible as the problems of tangling are magnified, particularly if deep water is involved and it is definitely the case that fishing into a strong head or crosswind is bad news. Having bait and lead weight of similar size (weight) means that they will keep away from each other during flight and this is a great help when using leger/float leger tactics. Another bad move is to let your tackle sink (flutter) to the bottom on a slack line; this greatly increases the risk, and I now always check the line at this point ad make the bait/tackle swing down on a tight line. This stops the bait encountering the line above the lead, thus avoiding tangles. Where heavier weights are necessary, I have two main tactics to help. First is to PVA a stone to the hook or bottom of wire trace to increase it weight and the other involves freezing several small baits together but only attaching the middle one to the hook. This not only gives protection against tangles but puts a couple of freebies into your swim. It does of course mean that you always need to take your baits to the water in a freezer bag. I will let you know more about this last method in a future episode, as I have found it particularly effective. Many Pike anglers use radio-controlled bait-boats for their long-range work, and I must say that this is extremely effective and does cut out many of the tangling problems. However, I do not have one of these and have no intention of getting one – but that's a different issue.



Although I have not done as much fishing as I would like recently for various reasons, I have been out at least once a week and managed to get a few pike mainly low doubles. I have felt the urge to get back on the river after my trip to the Severn last month. The mild autumn weather is usually good for barbel, and chub and I am determined to give it a go, even though it has now got considerably colder. I did get one blank evening in on the Medway and really enjoyed it, so will be looking forward to the next session, probably this week. I am already making plans for the new year.


