Well, I made a slight 'boo boo' as we were actually fishing on Lake Eva! Dave (owner of Claygate Lakes) saw my letter today and suggested I needed to go to Specsavers!!!

Anyhow, this photo shows a nice common of 5lbs 11ozs, the best of the bag that went 43lbs. Although they don't look very big Barry, they are very broad across the back! I was fishing Lake Sophie out in the middle and after plumbing the bottom, I decided to fish the waggler rod for a change, so I put out some corn to get the fish on the feed. There are



times when there is not a lot of action to start off with and this was the story for me the whole morning! I went back to the trusty old 10 footer, 8lbs Maxima line, ½ oz Stonze and size 12 Gripz hook with a running link. On this trip, I had taken a variety of baits for a change and they included luncheon meat, prawns, peas and I also used some pellet. Just half a dozen F1s later and I changed to the far bank with sliced bread on a pop up rig. This resulted in my bag for the day. It was slow to start but a much better end to my session." 

Last month's FOM Competition winner was a very well deserving member who fishes regularly on Specimen Lake. This particular session stood out to us as he fished during challenging conditions but was pleasantly surprised with this awesome mix of carp. With that in mind, a big well done to Ricky Young for winning yourself 24 hours free fishing!

MAIN LAKE: Rob Pizzy sent in a catch report saying "What a weekend at HFF on main lake. Four friends fishing a pairs competition in torrential rain along with 26 fish banked and 13 lost... What a fabulous place to fish along with great staff as always nothing is ever a problem,

thanks Rob. A session that will never be forgotten by us indeed." Between them, they banked a 64lb catfish, Mirrors up to 28lb and lots of Commons as well! Mark, Rob and Paul had "another great session", with all 3 of them catching a 20lb+ carp. Mike caught 5 fish up to 22lb on a day ticket. Jake Beaney fished a 36 hour session and lost 5 carp but managed to land an impressive 68lb 4oz Catfish! A big well done to Chris who fished 72 hours on Main Lake (it was his first time at the fishery). He blanked for the first 24 hours and felt like he was missing bites, so changed his tactics and was well rewarded with 14 carp and a baby cat! Morgan and Lee had a quality 36 hour session on Main Lake, with a 24lb Common and 42lb Catfish for Morgan, and a 20lb Common. A big well done to Sam for landing a new PB; an awesome 50lb 4oz Catfish caught using Atlantic heat boilies. Mike caught a lovely 25lb Mirror, and a stunning 23lb zip linear. Well done to Anthony for landing a 30lb Catfish and 21lb Common from Main Lake back bank. Jez Lambert had a great session on Main Lake, netting 16 carp up to 26lb 6oz. Tony had an awesome 36 hour session on Main Lake, banking 7 catfish between 44lb and 61lb 8oz, and 3 carp weighing 11lb, 22lb and 23lb!

IF YOU CAN SEE IT, THEY CAN SENSE IT!

In the 1970s, I was taught by the wisest of anglers about the fact that fish have incredibly heightened senses and that by understanding this, and reflecting it within my own angling, I would catch far more consistently. This meant that to 'fool' the fish we had to fish as unobtrusively as possible by cutting down the 'man made' elements of our terminal tackle, which included the diameter of line and the size of hooks and weights. It was totally accepted that any of the 'man made' elements could be sensed by our quarry as a possible danger and they could change their feeding habits, warn the shoal or just spook off your bait and out of your swim.

If you study the basic biology of fish you will quickly understand that they are incredibly sensitive to their natural surroundings, a place where we are visitors at best. For example, they have chemoreceptors which give them a hugely heightened sense to taste and smell, as well as a linear line through which they acutely sense vibration and even a complex system, in carp, through their swim bladder, allowing them to 'hear'!

So, shouldn't we question why this has changed within the modern scene, and ask whether such a change has ultimately been for the better? Just consider how clunky, obtrusive and cumbersome much of the current terminal set ups that are promoted have become: thick lines

and leaders, lumps of plastic and metals alongside massive leads and feeders. The total opposite of the historically proven, and it seems to have gradually crept up on us and we now all too easily accept. Is it because these set ups are advertised to be 'camouflaged' and the assumed result being that fish cannot 'see' these obtrusive objects and can, therefore, be easily tricked? This mantra has been promoted as a fact, but what if we stand back and question that there is the very real chance that this is far from the truth and there is a plethora of researched facts to prove it to be totally wrong? A huge statement, and very possibly deemed controversial by some, when so many anglers now accept that by painting a lead green a fish can no longer detect it! Just think, if what I am saying has real bearing, we should really be revisiting with fresh eyes and, by accepting the reality of the situation and making changes, it can only improve our catch rates. Let's take the largest pieces of our terminal tackle: lead weights and method feeders. Manufacturers obviously appreciate the fact there is an issue here because they endeavour to camouflage such tackle items with a coat of 'camo' paint or plastic. But in truth, especially once you appreciate the real sensory ability of fish, this in fact does nothing to change that the object



Can you see me?

From what I have written so far, would it not be the case if that I could remove the man-made element with something that does the same job as a lead or feeder, I can only be better off and be fishing far more effectively? Enter the Stonze weights - a natural stone weight which has several benefits over a lead or feeder and still does the job needed i.e. to cast and hold your bait in place or transport a method ball from point A to point B. Suddenly, I am fishing with a weight that is part of the fish's natural background, something you can never say about a man-made lead or feeder!



The Stonze

Now some have looked to guestion Stonze, which can only be the right approach to discover the truth, so let me answer their most common questions:

Q: A Stonze is larger than a lead.

A: Physically it is, but the largest stone will always be more natural than the smallest lead, and a Stonze is far smaller than a man-made method feeder.

Q: They can't cast.

A: Until you cast one that is but an assumption because they really do cast, and the right shape will cast accurately over a great distance.

Q: A 3oz lead weighs more than a 3oz Stonze.

A: That was honestly put to us anyone should know that 3oz weighs 3oz, whether lead or stone!

Q: They're expensive.

A: To be honest, they are incredible value for money when you consider they are hand-made, have a host of unique benefits and are both a method feeder as well as a general weight. If you buy a lead and a method feeder you won't get much change out of a fiver when a Stonze is just £1.50.

Hand on heart, this 'natural' approach has revolutionised my angling and certainly helped me to catch more and bigger fish. Should I

be surprised? Not really, because I have replaced the most obtrusive with the most unobtrusive. By questioning everything and assuming nothing I have ended up with a massive edge; a weight that is an advantage in my angling, as well as not being made from a toxic chemical i.e. lead - it really is a win-win! I honestly believe once used you will quickly appreciate what a genuine tactical advantage the Stonze will give you, especially against the pressured and wary fish we target nowadays.



Wrap your method mix around the Stonze



GROUNDBAIT CLINIC BY ANDY PHELPS

"My plan was to fish on Lake Windsor on the Cottington Complex and have a nice day fishing the pole catching a few skimmers on worm. Easy enough you may think, I mixed up my groundbait which consisted of Van den Eynde Marine green shellfish, expander gold and some bloodmeal and chopped up worms, then plumbed up the depths of my chosen swim.

I cupped in two balls on two lines, one to the left under a tree and the other straight out at 13 meters. Almost immediately there were bubbles everywhere, which was a good sign that the bream and skimmers were feeding. I shipped out my rig which was a 4x14 Middy Carp blue series 1, to the baited area under the trees with a nice head of a worm on the hook. Float went straight under, the result a tiny roach! OK, I thought maybe the roach are intercepting the worm on the way down. Next put in same thing, this carried on for a while, then I decided to use double worm, same result. This was becoming a little frustrating so I stepped up the






hook size to a 14 with double worm and a single dead maggot. I still could not get through the roach; I tried the other swim and it was the same thing. I needed to change

my approach, so I set up another rig with a hair-rigged pellet band to see if this would do the trick. I placed a 6mm hard pellet in the band and shipped out,

the float did not move for about a minute, then the float sank under water. A nice little skimmer of around 1 lbs was the culprit. Next put in I used a Middy Grip Flex pot with some groundbait and some added 6mm pellets and tapped them in. The float did not take long to sail away, a slightly bigger fish started pulling out the Reactacore cerise elastic, this was not a skimmer or a bream, a near double figure carp had decided to take the pellet.

I was not really armed for this battle with a relatively light elastic on the top kit, but after adding extension to the pole and slowly playing the fish I managed to get it in. A nice





At the end of the session I managed to finally catch my quarry, the bream and skimmers, but had a few more unexpected bonuses along the way!"

After a lot of tug of war antics and thinking my gear was going to give in under the pressure, I managed to finally land a near double figure pike! This day was just getting stranger by the minute. A pike on a dumbell! Just the week prior, I had a big perch on a dumbell also, the pike was perfectly hooked in the mouth too, so it definitely wanted the bait.

Gripz Fishing Hooks

After extensive research, where the limitations of both barbed and barbless were scrutinised, there has been an obvious need for improvement thus resulting in this radical design that crosses the boundaries between what we have had and what we now have. Made from high grade Japanese wire, the key improvement has been the introduction of a series of minute horizontal grooves on the inside of the specially designed arrow shaped hook point, where historically the barb would have been. These grooves allow the hook to hold securely in



the fish's mouth when pressure is applied, as the flesh presses into the grooves resulting in a firm hook hold with no slippage.

FISHING FOR SCHOOLS

November Update

"The Annual Fishing 4 Schools Inter-Schools Fishing Match and Art Competition took place at Grove Farm, Hadlow on 24 September.

Fishing for Schools Kent coordinator Warren White was running the event, he said: "The idea is that our students who have completed a F4S angling course this year get to find out how a match works - from drawing their peg number out of the hat at the start of the day, to the experience of fishing, in match conditions, using a keep net and on to the finale of the weighin and all the excitement that goes with it.

"The Thamesview School team were the winners of the F4S Match shield this year. The team was made up of two boys and two girls and they showed real skill and teamwork. They proved worthy winners, with a total catch weight of 6lb 4oz. This was helped with a very big perch, which was the first fish caught by the team.

"In second place came Meadowfield School with 3lb 10oz and in third place was the Malling School with 3lb 6oz.




"Both our runners-up were excellent and were unfortunate in that they booked a number of carp, that were

hooked a number of carp, that were not allowed in the competition as this was a whip and silver fish match only.

"A big thanks to Charlie Rayner for refereeing the match so it went like clockwork and to the schools and coaches who made the effort to get to the fishery after such horrendous weather conditions. Also running on the day was the annual art competition, judged by Brian Bailey fishery manager at the college. This year's subject was Wildlife Scenes from the Riverbank.

Warren said: "The standard and diversity of the artwork was superb and, as I always say about our young people, give them the opportunity and they will show you what they can do. The overall winner was an outstanding painting of a pike about to strike a lure, which would grace any pike fishing advert.

"This combination of fishing, which our students love, and an educational art course, is a shining beacon of what we do at Fishing 4 Schools. I was very proud to be a part of it. Very many thanks to Brian for letting us use his venue"



November is the start of winter proper, with short daylight hours and who knows what the weather will bring! But although it may be cold and frosty, with white stuff crunching underfoot, if you wrap up warmly, it can be a real pleasure to be out in the cold, bright sunlight.

What can beat a very bright blue sky, contrasting with the various species and changing colours of the trees? Most will have lost their leaves and have shut down for winter, but others will remain green, making a very pleasing picture indeed, not forgetting the long shadows created by the sun's low appearance over the horizon.

The rivers and lakes will have had a good flush through with plenty of rain freshening the water and the temperature will be back in single figures with good oxygen levels. This is extremely good for trout, as they are cold-water creatures.

The fish will also be hungry. Insect life will be sparse so the trout's attention will be smaller prey species, like roach, and perch, to get them through the winter.

Flies to use this month include just about anything that looks like something to eat! Flies with lots of movement are particularly good, so try 'mink'



and 'marabou' with lots of swaying and pulsing movement. White, green and black are good colour combinations as well as orange. The key thing is to find the feeding depth. Sometimes it is possible to see trout chasing at the surface with smaller fish scattering and being chased by a pack of trout. I have included a picture of some patterns you could use, a good fly to try is the 'humongous', with its gold



tinsel under a plume of marabou, a silvery body and a spiky hackle palmered around. You can use chain at the head and bead eyes or a single gold or silver bead, can be quite deadly. Fish slow and deep but also be open minded as to the way you retrieve, whatever fly you use and the depth. I call this the 'taking zone'.

If you are not taking fish home for the pot, please be careful when handling them. The picture shows catch and release tools. The head of the tool can also be small or larger than pictured. The larger one is useful if you have a bead of some sort on

the hook. Much like when using a disgorger, it is a matter of sliding the line down the slot and into the fish's mouth. Push down, keeping a tensioned line and the hook is removed quite easy. It is a very efficient and quick way and can be done with the fish in the net so very little handling is necessary.




Please use barbless or debarbed hooks. You can debarb with a pair of flat nosed pliers by

squashing the barb down. There are thousands of barbed fly patterns out there, but manufacturers are seeing the move towards going barbless. I have been using them for many years and they have been the norm in the coarse fishing world as far as I can remember.

By keeping the tension on between you and the fish (controlled tension of course), you will land that fish, even without a barb on your hook.

Please up your leader/tippet strength. Don't play the fish for too long. If possible, keep the fish in the net to unhook it then release, but only once you think its fit enough. You want that fish to swim away strongly to fight another day.

One more important item of tackle is your fly line. They can be very expensive to replace, so looking after them is cost effective in the long run. After your session, clean your line when home. Use a very tepid warm soapy water to clean your line, it will disperse all the mud and grit that has collected on it. Let it dry and use a soft cloth to finish. You can also use a proprietary line cleaner or restorer to revitalise, then you are ready to go again. That's all for now. Keep warm and safe but most of all have fun, Bob G.



Annual Fishing 4 Schools Match at Hadlow's Grove Farm Fisheries by Philip Orrell

The Hadlow College Fisheries team welcomed pupils from schools across Kent to our Grove Farm Fisheries to compete in the annual Kent Fishing4Schools (F4S) match.



The day gives pupils who have completed a F4S Angling course this year the opportunity to experience how a match works - from drawing out of a hat for their peg number, to the experience of fishing in match conditions, using a keep net, and the finale of the weigh-in and all the excitement that goes with it.

Despite squally weather conditions earlier in the day, the teams enjoyed four hours of great coarse fishing. The competition was a whip match with teams of four taking part, two pupils fishing at one time, then swapping over with the other members of the feam

At the close of the competition, each team's mixed catch of perch, tench, roach and rudd was weighed. Thamesview School in Gravesend were the winners of the F4S Match shield. Showing real skill and teamwork, they were worthy winners with a total catch weight of 6lb 4oz, helped by the first fish they caught: a king-sized perch.

In second place was the team from Meadowfield School, who netted 3lb 10oz of fish - and third place was the Malling school with 3lb 6oz. Both schools put in an excellent performance, and were at times unfortunate that they hooked carp, which had to be landed and returned, as only silver fish counted towards the final catch weight.

Following its inaugural success last year, the match also featured the Kent F4S art competition. The theme for this year was Wildlife Scenes From The Riverbank, and the standard and diversity of the artwork was high. The overall winner was an outstanding painting of a pike about to strike a lure. Also in the placings was a vibrant ceramic fish, submitted into the mixed-media category. All the artwork is currently being displayed in the clubhouse at Grove Farm.







Warren White of the Kent F4S team said: "Today's event, a combination of match fishing, which our students love, and the creative art element, was a shining beacon of what we do at Fishing4Schools. I was proud to be part of this event today.

"I'd like to thank Brian Bailey, fishery manager at the college, for the use of the venue and for judging the art competition. It's days like this that can give our students the spark to go on to the college when they leave school.

"Thanks also to the schools and coaches who made the effort to get to the fishery after such horrendous weather conditions. And a final thanks to Charlie Rayner for refereeing the match so it ran like clockwork."

F4S is a national initiative run by The Countryside Alliance Foundation. It runs short courses that offer a different way of learning for pupils, many with special educational needs, who may find academic work difficult but respond well to alternative learning. They integrate aspects of angling – for example weights and measures and fish biology – into the National Curriculum and encourage the youngsters to take up a new outdoor activity.







"Out along the Ouse and Uck valleys, the seasons' have certainly changed from Summer

to Autumn reflected in the harvestina and new cultivations in the fields. The trees have lost their verdant green colours and are now displaying their Autumnal 'uniforms'. This season's blackberries have been prolific, but, have been affected by the very dry weather. The ground has been very dry and lots of small ghyls that feed down through the sandstone of the High Weald to the rivers have been dry for months and the flow of the rivers has been at drought level. This has not been helped by the over abstraction of water for the ever increasing housing estates that are eternally growing up everywhere. How can the authorities allow this to happen? Where are they expecting the water to meet their ever increasing demands to come from? The same demands are put upon the sewage works trying to cope with the increase in waste matter. All of this has an effect on the wildlife in the rivers and in the countryside, along with the ever increasing risk of pollution due to less dilution of the final discharge in to our already low rivers. There can be no doubt that global warming is affecting our weather patterns and our seasonal rainfall is so very different now.

Sitting quietly on the river bank, I watch the slow progress of a river that is crying out for rain. However, at the time of writing, we have received some much needed rain and the forecast for more is looking promising. Let's hope we have a steady supply of water throughout the Autumn and Winter months and that it knows when to stop! Whilst sitting there pondering and watching, I notice overhead some unwelcome visitors that I refer to as 'The Black Death' (cormorants). These birds are no doubt on their way to wreak havoc along a section of river or someone's lake or pond. These birds tend to leave the coastal areas at this time of year when the first gales blow along the Channel and they make their way inland to look for fishing sites, roosting overnight in lakeside and riverside trees.

I watch a series of blackberrry bushes that are overhanging the river and the actions of a blackbird eating the berries. Every now and again, a ripe fruit falls in to the water and I see a fish rise through the water to take the offering. Through polarised glasses, I spot three decent sized chub which are monitoring the blackbird's actions and intercepting the freely provided lunch! A display of

dragonflies can also be seen and a Hobby is also busy picking up the odd fruit. The blackbird is almost 'groundbaiting' for the fish and other wildlife! A fleeting glimpse of a pair of kingfishers always thrills me and overhead a pair of Red Kites are enjoying the thermals. A lone sea trout occasionally makes his presence known!

Further along the bank, I come across a lone angler catching perch on worm. While chatting, he catches a fine specimen in 'tip top' condition that I reckon to be a pound and a half in weight. Let's hope the rains arrive in due course to replenish the rivers with water and oxygen, however, a good deal is certainly required for good effect and any extra abstraction will

make the rainfall void. At the lower end of the river, a seal is showing up on a regular basis in a particular area no doubt feeding on the mullet as I find the remains of one. There are numbers of cormorants sitting on the arms of a pylon tower all around the Lower Ouse Valley and the Delfe ditches are a hive of activity with coots and moorhens. Although I wondered if there was any mink activity, I failed to spot any, thankfully! The tide is beginning to run in and I see some large mullet in a small shoal working their way through the water.

Recently, I had a trip on the Romney, Hythe and Dymchurch Railway with a good friend who also shares my passion for railways. It was a fine pleasant Sunday and a joy travelling through the 'sheep country', however, once again, everywhere was looking dry and in need of a 'drink'. Despite the dry conditions, an abundance of interesting plants grow along the areas of vegetated




shingle at Dungeness. The backdrop of the Power Station and the Point's two lighthouses make this a unique place but the lighthouses are a reminder of the hazardous shingle headland that juts out in to the Channel and the world's busiest shipping lanes. There has been a lighthouse at Dungeness since the 15th century to protect the many ships that use the English Channel.

I noticed that the Environment Agency is to retain the Closed Season on our rivers, which I am in favour of. I believe our rivers need to rest, along with the wildlife that also lives alongside the water. It gives the fish and other animals the opportunity to spawn and breed in relative peace. With my 'River Keeper and Bailiff's hats' on, I feel that the Closed Season must remain in place.

With some recent rainfall occurring, the Automatic Sluices open as soon as the river starts to flow well, but, in my opinion we are back to the old days when water was rushed away seawards taking many fish with it's force. I feel the flow should be slow and steady and not moved in big rushes. The desire these days of getting the water away as quickly as possible is short sighted as I feel the excess should be allowed to flow out on to the flood plains and gradually soak back in to the ground, drain in to the rivers and flow away.

While walking along and despite the dry conditions, I come across some wild mushrooms and pick enough for a breakfast. Overhead some crows are mobbing a pair of buzzards. One of the buzzards is clutching something that he suddenly releases and it falls to the ground. I wandered over to see what it was and found it to be a small rabbit. This buzzard's lunch is now the property of the crows! At long last, more rain has arrived and the river begins to run with dirty water. No doubt much is the run off from cultivation as this is the first heavy rain we have received for some time. With the rain comes the abstraction pumps, bursting in to action pulling water off for purification and public use.



I am annoyed to find that someone has broken some glass bottles and left them on a riverside footpath along with plastic bag rubbish. It's local so I do the right thing and clear it up. It never ceases to amaze me to find 'dog poo' bags tied to branches! Why on earth do people do this? Luckily, I am able to remove the offending bags and their contents and place them in a rubbish bin.

The Hawthorne bushes are full of berries along with the Rowan and Holly. It won't be long before our Winter visitors in the from of Redwings and Field Fares arrive to overwinter and eat the berries. On a fine day in the garden, my Buddleia is popular with the butterflies, namely Painted Ladies and Red Admirals all making the most of the pleasant late season

sunshine. Every year, the Ivy flowers are popular with the bees and wasps busy hopping between the flower heads. Everyone's garden, despite it's size, can be a little haven for wildlife.

Disturbingly, I saw on the television news an item which will upset many sea anglers and local boat men. A huge 'super trawler' is working it's way along the Channel scooping up everything in it's path. It is a glib statement to say it is operating legally catching and processing hundreds of tons of fish each

You would hope that our fishery protection vessels would intervene, but alas, that is not the case. I saw a similar action some years ago off Loch Broom in Scotland when a fleet of Russian Klondikers filled their holds with tons of mackerel. Our seas will not withstand this rampant destruction!"


THE GOLDEN YEARS OF COARSE FISHING by Bob Rolph Keston Ponds, Remembered 1956 to 1980 (Part One)

Keston Ponds, 3 miles south of Bromley, were excavated nearly 250 years ago for gravel in the Georgian period and I first fished the dammed lakes as a boy aged 10 in 1956. That was 63 years ago now, hard to believe how swiftly time flies by! In those days, it was a magical place, deep dark water containing who knew what! Today, we all know roughly what's in there, even all their names, but to a ten years old boy, and hundreds like me, the mysterious waters were "bottomless" and contained untold monsters lurking in the thick water lily beds, or down in the deep water in the middle of the pool.




Subsequent soundings with a pole in the mid 1960s proved this bottomless lake to be a mere 10 ft 6 inches deep and the bottom to be hard gravel with a touch of silt. The Kent Specimen Group did an early morning survey there from a boat one Sunday morning in 1964, and a detailed map was produced showing soundings and bottom type all over the middle lake. My shout to a banksman from the middle of the lake that morning saying "I've found a lovely hard bottom" lives with me to this day! We borrowed the punt from the Rookery Lake just down the road, and the six of us set to work before Sid the ranger came on duty at 8am. It must have been early June and a 4 am start was needed!







The article and map produced was subsequently published in "Angling" magazine in April 1981 entitled 'Caesar's Pool', a legendary Kentish carp water, and the name has stuck to this present day. I got the name from the well where the crystal water, with a high pH of 7.7, trickle into the top pond from beneath the chalk hillside. There is history here. A Roman encampment was established near here in the grounds of the Holwood estate, and this clear drinkable water was obviously a factor in its siting. The settlement called 'Warbank' is the source of the tiny River Ravensbourne which runs down past Bromley and Catford to join the Thames at Deptford. The ponds weren't there in those days of course, but were dug for gravel around 1760 and the resulting dammed lakes used to create a water garden and reservoir for Holwood House 1 mile up the road, where William Pitt the Younger once lived. Water from the lake was pumped up to the house by the corner of the dam, and when I first fished there the old mechanism could still be seen, near the old boathouse. Quite how water was pumped before the days of electricity, I don't know, but pumped it was somehow! The old boathouse and rangers ' hut were both destroyed by fire in the 1970s, but this corner of the dam remained my favourite swim, among the thick water lilly beds.





Carp were present in Keston at least 110 years ago. The eminent writer Henry Williamson (Tarka the Otter), writes of seeing long lean common carp nearly a yard long, with scales as big as pennies, cruising around in open water and on the edge of the lily pads. Fish around the 8 lb mark, probably 'Wildies', were quite prolific here 100 years ago, together with brightly coloured roach, rudd, tench, perch and pike.

Henry Williamson lived in London prior to moving down to Devon's river Torridge in 1921, and presumably visited Keston common in his youth when he spied these fish, together with beautiful red finned roach, which would have given him inspiration for his country books. It is recorded that another very famous name to have wandered the "Keston Bogs" in the mid 1850s looking for botanical specimens, was Charles Darwin, who lived nearby at Downe. He, along with Churchill, Wilberforce and others were frequent visitors to the great Holwood estate, 1 mile from the lakes. It was the "Chequers" of the day. Holwood also has a lake, but that's another story that we boys could tell a tale or two about!

Today, Downe's most famous resident is a Mr Nigel Farrage, - he's a fisherman, but mainly sea I think! Other famous Keston residents during my youth were Annabelle Croft, Derek Underwood, Bill Wyman and the celebrated gardener, John Borthwick

An angler of repute fishing at Keston in those days was Alan Baker from Biggin Hill. Alan had four good doubles around 1974, float fishing between the lillies. Fish of 11 lbs, 14 lbs, 17 lbs and 22 lbs graced his net, two on maggot and two on sweet corn. He was the first to use this new bait on the lake, he tells me. I recall talking to him on the bank around this time in the company of Steve Edwards and Fred Wilton. September 21 st 1974 was his red letter day, 13 years after mine, on Aug 25th 1961 when I caught my first of a dozen mirrors from Keston, but only of 8 lbs 14 ozs, a big fish for a 15 year old boy in those early days!

Dennis Darkin and Charlie Stone were the resident experts there in the late 1950s, with many a fish in the 8-10 lb class, mirrors, leathers and commons. Between the wars the eminent writer Henry Williamson saw wild commons with scales as big as penny coins, cruising in the open water, but there is no written evidence that he actually caught any!

Today, Dennis and I still meet regularly where we live near Canterbury, and talk about those days of 60 years ago, when a double figure carp was a fish to be proud of, and could even feature in the old Angling Times!! (a proper newspaper then!).

The mirrors and leathers that we know today were a more recent introduction, by Dennis Darkin, Trevor Housby, Bill Bellini, Charlie Stone and others during the late 1950s. Many fish from Kent and Surrey lakes, in the 8-13 lb size, were introduced at this time, about 1957. How do I know you might ask, cos I saw them going in! . Summerhill Park lake at Tonbridge was over run with carp, and these five eminent carp anglers of the time, took it upon themselves to distribute carp around Kent in wet hessian sacks, with great success I may add. The old Kent River Board had not at this time started its extensive programme of stocking with 80,000 fingerling carp, at places like Horton Kirby, Dartford, Snodland and Faversham. The Keston stocking proved to be a great success, and supplemented a very small stocking of small Leney carp from the Haslemere trout farm before the war. I also personally put in about 12 Leney strain mirror carp from Redmire Pool in 1969, when thousands of small half inch fry were being lost over the dam outfall during a massive storm in July 1966. Ron Blackmore and I brought back hundreds in a dustbin full of weed and put them in my garden pond, only for 12 of them to outgrow my pond, so I took them up to Keston and released them, 12 beautiful mirrors of about 8 inches long!

I caught my first Keston carp on August 25th 1961, a mirror of 8 lbs 14ozs on worm at dawn from the old diving board swim. The following Friday, I was back again for a brace of 4 lb tench and a common of 5 lbs 6 ozs. Great fish in those days, they were even in the Angling Times, would you believe! No one bothers much with fish under 30 lbs in weight these days, such a shame!"

"Warm, sunny and generally mild conditions over the early autumn period this year have largely posponed my planned start to the winter's pike campaign. It is true that I have managed a couple of short blank attempts on local still waters, but, my intention to combine my river sessions with a bit of piking have been hindered by coloured water courtessy of the recent 'much needed' rain. Muddy water always seems to put the pike off the feed, I find!



Most of my success of late has been on the tench and carp front with the float fished baits outscoring the feeder, in contrast to my early season efforts. Although no monster tench have graced my net, I have had as many as half a dozen in a session with a good many being in the five to six pound bracket and several carp, up to mid twenties, thrown in for good measure.



One of the interesting features of float fishing is that there is always the chance of a decent fish of other species - particularly if you are prepared to scale down and adapt your tactics slightly. Obviously with tench and carp around, it is not wise to go too light, but, it is possible to find some pretty thin lines (either braid or nylon) these days without dropping below a breaking strain of about ten pound. Just such an opportunity presented itself a couple of weeks back during a tench session. The swim seemed to be alive with fish bubbling and moving the float from side to side, but no positive bites were forthcoming, although I had taken a couple of nice tench on the feeder rod at about forty yard range. The movement on the float was almost certainly from fish bumping the line, but, the action was different to previous sessions - less positive somehow. I suspected skimmers or roach and decided to scale down to a size twelve hook of


the Gripz variety - mentioned in the last episide. As well as

groundbait, I had put in a few handfuls of small boilies and pellets



and I suspected that the cuprits were struggling to pick these up. Changing to a thin braided bottom of about a foot long and moving the shot down to about four inches from the hook altered the sensitivity of the set up and started to produce a few more positive bites on the 12 mm boilies. These were however, still dificult to hit and I decided to swap the half inch hair rigged presentation for a side hooked bait.

The first bite on this set up saw the float twitch a couple of times, lift slightly, then quickly shoot away. I hooked this fish and was in no doubt straight away that it was a decent roach. It put up a spirited scrap, but, was soon ready for the net. It was fine looking fish and I was extremely pleased to have caught it and I weighed it at 1lb 2oz.



Not a monster roach but bearing in mind that the water that I was fishing is only ever fished for carp, with tench and bream being normally regarded as nuisance fish, it made me think that I should perhaps spend a few more sessions targetting them a bit more seriously. I missed a couple more bites but then had to leave - vowing to return and have a crack at them within a week or so. The session had also produced five tench and a six pound bream on the feeder rod, so I regarded it as a right result.

By coincidence, I had also been having some roach action on another water using the feeder with maggots and casters as bait although again the target species were tench. The roach were far more numerous however and I found myself again scaling down to catch a few. These roach shoals seemed to be located at a minimum of about thirty yards - so float tactics were put on hold - particularly as a result of the windy weather. Although I did not get anything larger than 1lb, the roach fishing was extremely consistent with catches of thirty fish or more being common. The tench were thin on the ground here but I did get one or two roach/bream hybrids of around three to four pound. This is very interesting fishing and I shall certainly be persisting with it while the conditions allow and the piking is slow.






On a differint subject: as a memer of the Angling Trust both individually and through affiliated angling clubs, I am always interested to read their magazine 'The Angler' to catch up on the work that they, and their sister organisation 'Fish Legal' are doing on our behalf. Fighting and bringing cases against polluters, helping to tackle the problems associated with predators such as Cormorants and Otters. Standing up for our rights against often ludicrous legislation /pointless beaurocracy and helping to change old fashioned and outdated attidudes (usually from Water authorities of various types, including the EA) toward flood prevention. This is a subject that I feel extremely strongly about as I have witnessed stretches of river being mutilated on a regular basis over the years - all in the mistaken belief that denuding the bankside of vegetation and dredging deep channels will prevent a flood downstream. I can feel another episode of 'Piscatorial Politics' coming on. I was also very pleased to read of the success of a recent volunteer bailliff scheme -working with all of the relevent enforcement agencies to tackle the growing angling and countryside crime, such as poaching of fish and wildlife, theft of tackle etc.

I could write a lot more on this subject but the point that I would like to make here is that we really do need the 'Angling Trust' and I would like to urge all of our readers to Join and Support it!"









Past, present, future and guiding.

Past

This month, I finally announced I would be retiring and closing The Friendly Fisherman in Tunbridge Wells. Running the tackle shop has been a huge part of my working life, it has given me and my family a good living, but it's also given us so much more. All of my friends are anglers and I've met almost all of them through the shop.





Present

As the weather changed and Autumn started to take shape, I finally stopped chasing carp with my fly rod. The task of sorting my lure tackle took some time as I readied myself for pike, perch and zander fishing. My first couple of visits to local waters was more to check out water quality and temperatures. So far it's been rather slow, but as the water cools still further, the predator's appetite will sharpen and this year's coarse fry will soon be on the menu. Bewl Water and Rutland Water will be my priorities this season; I really fancy targeting the pike having neglected them over the past few years while I've been obsessed with zander fishing.



Future

With more time to fish next year, I've been busy planning trips further afield. My good friend Gord Burton, "The Piking Pirate", and I have been talking about fishing Windermere in the Lake District and Loch Ken in Scotland together. 'Gordy' is a legend



and a master of both these waters so he can show me the ropes for a change as I've had the pleasure of showing how to catch zander from the Midland reservoirs. Another plan is to fish in Holland more often with James Gardner, now our Dutch fishing guide Willem Stolk has completed his new house with its riverside mooring. We will be able to stay with Willem and hire a boat so we can explore lots of new areas. Last, but not least, I intend spending more time exploring several "wild waters" in Spain and Portugal either fly fishing for barbel and carp or lure fishing for bass, pike and zander.

Over the last few years, I've drifted into guiding like minded anglers who wish to learn new skills. Whether it's fly fishing for trout, carp or pike or Lure fishing for pike, perch or zander, I'm able to help anglers in their quest. The opportunity to "fast track" their learning and understand how to catch fish more effectively is often what drives anglers my way. 

"Thames estuary fishing is beginning to pick up again, with the winter species starting to show, plenty of whiting and the odd codling being caught, a reasonable amount of thornback are also being caught at the mouth of the estuary, a promising winter could be on the cards! Sadly, the same can't be said further up river, despite all our efforts, we haven't had a fish at all, the amount of rainfall recently may be a partial reason for the lack of fish. A courtesy call to local

fishing buddies has revealed the same just an odd school bass here and there. Just before writing this report, I returned from a short session fishing over low water, using a softer 9ft soft tipped rod and braid for better bite indication. I had a few knocks but nothing to write home about. Hopefully next month will see the usual whiting and the return of the flatties. Dogfish seem to be ever present and there are still hopes of a codling or two after the strong winds and coloured sea conditions. Best baits are lugworm and squid. Deal Pier is still fishing well, although there is some disruption to the lower deck with

repairs. November is the month of many major competitions being held at Deal particularly at the week-ends. The beaches can get a bit crowded and it is always worthwhile checking with the tackle shop on the dates and area to be fished. 

"The fishing has been very good along the Hythe shoreline in the past few months. The calmer weather has seen many mackerel caught on the morning and evening high tides with a number of good size soles being caught. Sadly, we will start to see these late Summer species retreat to deeper calmer water as the seasons change and we enter Autumn. This will see us start to get some good strong South Westerly blows to really stir things up. This is great news for the bass angler, with whiting and pouting now showing in human numbers, short cashs behind the breakers on a retreating tide into darkness or early morning tide should see you pick out a few of the finer fish patrolling the surf. Expect to still catch thornbacks on squid or fish baits for the finer fish patrolling the surf. but the main species will be dogfish, whiting, pouting, bass and eels all falling to worm baits tipped with fish, squid or shellfish and the odd sole (on a calm night) on worm. You can look to catch all along the coast from Dymchurch to Sandgate on most tides with the evening tides still producing some of the better fish. Keep an eye out for the stronger SW blows and look for the window of calmer weather that follows quickly behind after a big front to try for an early codling. A few odd codling have been picked out, but we should now start to see a few more of this very sought after species being caught from the shore. This is also the best time to get down on the beach after a big blow to look for and collect any shellfish, crabs, worms that have been pulled up from the sand. It's great fresh free bait to use straight away or freeze down when bait can become more difficult to get in the colder months. Good luck and tight lines." 2 lb 11 oz sole in an over 50 's match at White Horses on black lug and countless bass have been landed in between and during the gales. Ash Littlejohn had one of around 7 lb plus at a mark in the bay at low water on mackerel bait. Plenty of different species other than bass including plaice, dabs, dogfish, eels, flounders, whiting, rays and big soles. Peter Fountain and a few other anglers beached (unicorns) codling up to 4lb. Pete Cornwall also had a great catch from Langney Point. Low tide up is the best time to fish with lug and ragworm best baits but bluey, mackerel and squid for larger specimens. News just in of a conger eel from Pevensey of 12 lbs 2oz. The conger was caught by Damian and the pics are on the Anglers Den website. Local matches saw back to back wins by Ian Hopper. Gerald Sargeant and his brother Colin

continue to get results. Bait is available to order from Tony's Tackle, ring Tony Kirrage on 01323 731388 for top quality black lug, ragworm, squid and fish baits. If anyone is interested in continental fishing, we are now running casting tuition by appointment, free of charge, so why not gain a few extra yards? Eastbourne pier is now open for anglers. Prices are £50 to join plus £9 a rod. Please pick up your rubbish after fishing. Tight lines, Tony Kirrage

A really wet and very windy few weeks has kept the boats on the beach with hardly anyone going afloat. This is a real shame as we have missed some of the best weeks of the year fishing wise.

On the beach some good soles still coming up along with a few small size congers up to 4lb with a couple of much larger (double figure ones) heard of. This is very unusual but quite a bonus. Very few codling have been reported despite being very good conditions for them. Some good bass have been caught but not in large numbers, quite a few small ones about though. On calmer days the usual horde of whiting appear.

Prospects for November, last call for the summer species with the black bream going soon. If we don't see any codling this month they are not likely to appear much at all. Rays and pollack in the boats.

If the water is very coloured soles during the day, along with dogfish, bass and flatties. Whiting in abundance if it is not too rough. With them seems to be a good few congers so it might be worth a large dead bait in darkness, especially around any rocks. Could also get a big bass this way!

"Fishing has been challenging this month. The wind seems to be never letting up with some severe gales, but, when we do get out, there are good numbers of hounds to be had, not the doubles like the Spring run, but still very good sport on light tackle. It seems most anglers now are going over to very light tackle and fixed spool reels. I am a Zziplex man, but have gone over to Tubertini rods. What amazing action and fight, highly recommended. Bass are starting to get bigger, but can be elusive for days and then you will find a few. Always worth a live bait with a whiting now that the whiting are just showing themselves in numbers. Some anglers curse them, but I find them good fun over the slack water and always good for a fish pie. We try to put back the majority of fish, especially if we know they are the larger FEMALE fish, but I still think its nice to take a feed of fish. The great debate at this time of year is whether the cod are going to turn up? I have had two codling already and that was more than the whole of last year, so who knows, it certainly would do the charter business no harm. Skate are

constant and always put a bend in the rod and we are getting more. People are asking to go for them at this time of year as they have been missing in the big numbers earlier this year. Let's hope the herrings will hold off and give us anglers a chance to catch some quality fish. When they do turn up and the water is clear have a go with Sakubi feathers, great fun!"

WHEN THE COD ROD DON'T NOD!

"Once upon a time, we could almost set our watches by the arrival of the cod in the Southern North Sea. Late September, early October was a great time of year for the Thames Estuary charter fleet as the arrival of the cod and whiting briefly blended with the last of the summer species. An angler never knew what would take his bait next. I have caught bass, smoothounds, thornback rays, nice sized tope and codling all in one day. Not anymore! Now even in November and December it is considered encouraging to catch half a dozen 'micro' codling at the height of what would traditionally have been the best time of the year for cod.

It is quite a feat of human achievement to virtually wipe out a species from an area. We

endeavoured to do it with rabbits by inflicting them with the man made disease myxomatosis, however rabbit populations always recover. Cod are victims of two man made diseases, one being climate change and to a greater degree the intense greed of commercial fishermen being the other. Most UK citizens would expect that the cod they eat with their chips is UK caught, why wouldn't they when fish and chips are a quintessentially British dish. This is not the case, a high percentage of cod served up in UK fish and chip shops is sourced from Scandinavian

Cod in the Southern North Sea have fallen by such a staggering amount that recreational sea anglers now refer to them as 'unicorns'. We UK sea anglers are eternal optimists, one photo of a small coding on social media sees anglers flooding to the beaches in the vain hope of being one of the lucky few to land one. We spend money on tackle, fuel and bait in our thousands each winter, taking pilgrimages to once phenomenally good cod beaches like the hallowed stones of Dungeness only to be rewarded with catching pin whiting and dog fish. Most dedicated sea anglers over the age of say 40, will remember the excellent cod fishing that we once had in the Southern North Sea. The charter fleet at Bradwell-on-Sea in Essex, where I grew up, once aimed at an average forty cod a day per boat. Nowadays, anglers get very excited about half a dozen small coding being caught in one day. I have been lucky enough to have had many days of good cod fishing and lots of times have caught over thirty cod in one day. I would hazard a guess that if all the cod caught last winter between the charter boats working in the Thames were counted they would not even equate to one decent day's cod fishing say 20 years ago.

A guick glance through the pages of Google shows that in 2017 38 thousand tons of cod were landed by the UK fleet, down 52 percent from 1996. I have heard it argued that sea anglers are partly responsible for the decline in cod numbers. I agree that a dead fish is a dead fish, however it is caught, but when compared with the tonnage caught by commercial fishermen the argument just does not stand up. Other statements often spouted by some are "it's not cold enough for the cod to come in!" or "these things go in cycles, next year will be better!" In years gone by we would at times from the boat cast red gill lures across some of the shallow water wrecks that litter the sea bed of the Thames Estuary, we were targeting bass. However, we often caught cod from these shallow wrecks. This was always in the summer and being shallow the water would have been warm. Ok, it could be argued that these cod were non - migratory resident fish that did not move very far, but they were cod all the same. So my point is that

although climate change may account for many of the 'bricks in the wall' of cod numbers decline, I am not so sure that it is so much to blame as the commercial impact. If I am wrong and cold weather is all that is needed for a decent cod season, then last year's 'Beast from the East' should have seen cod crawling up our beaches, did you see any? I didn't!

When cod fishing in our area was good, some years would be better than others. Bad years, compared to what we have now, would be an excellent year now. I remember several bad years. I also

remember several cod bans. These bad years would always be followed by mass spawning from the remaining cod. This spawning would result in thousands of micro codling of six to eight inches being caught the following year. These would quickly pile on the weight and the following season would be about a pound and half. They would continue putting on weight and in the Spring might be up to two pounds. The following season they would be less in number but bigger in size. This situation would basically just repeat itself year after year. If the decline we are in now is just a cycle then it is a blooming long one!

Cod are a very fast growing species of fish. A cod weighing ten pounds can be as young as five years old, so with that in mind, why on earth is the minimum landing size on these fish only 35cm? To me this is utter madness!

Despite being legal to land, small cod hold little value to commercial fisherman when compared to the price larger cod fetch at market. I have been told that if a commercial fishermen hauls his gear to find it full of small worthless codling they are dumped overboard dead. He then shoots his gear again in the hope of better sized, more valuable cod on the next tow. This processes could in theory kill many codling before they have even had a chance to reproduce. I think that our cod stocks here in the Southern North Sea have hit such a low that it is

now almost impossible for the fishery to recover, and we anglers wonder why we have no winter sport! All I can now say is that I really hope you guys enjoy fishing for thornback rays and dogfish, as that is basically all that's available from the beaches, unless pin whiting and dabs count as sport nowadays.

Despite all the doom and gloom in the above lines, there IS sport to be had in the colder months. In next month's article, I shall outlining some species that are still available to anglers through the winter."

This is the time of year when the sea feels warmer than the air...and we hope for some bigger cod. We have had plenty of codling about in October and now we hope they get bigger as fish move in to fatten up prior to the spawning season. The weather this Autumn has been our friend with plenty of south westerly winds to encourage the fish inshore for the freebies that have washed in. It looks as if this trend could continue into November...so if you want to get a nice plump cod...you know what to do.

BEACH REPORT

This has been the best October for codling in years considering how few anglers are fishing for them. The brilliant mackerel fishing was cut short by the south westerly winds on the beach. But there are plenty of mackerel offshore.

Here are a couple of the October reports coming into my site...

I bet Colin was by himself...

I had this report in yesterday from Colin Hemsworth...

"Hi Tony, I fished Dengemarsh Friday and Saturday arrived to very windy, borderline fishable conditions. I set up two rods with pulley pennel rigs loaded with lug and pendulum cast as far as I could through the wind. Had to keep my eye on the lines constantly to stop them getting tangled and avoid getting buried. First fish out was a whiting and then next cast a 2.5 lb codling. Totals for the end of the session were 3 bass all around 30-40cm, 6 whiting, 3 dogfish and 4 codling all around the 2-2.5lb range. Looks like the mountain of bait I ordered did the trick, thanks for the lug and will be down soon. Colin"

I saw Steve Savage in the shop yesterday morning, we were just chatting and he showed me a photo on his phone that he took of Bert down the beach on the 1st of September...a very nice bass...and... a codling! I'm not sure who caught what...but it is a nice photo.

"Nice herring caught at Dungeness on Saturday the 21st September 39.5 cm"

Right family but it's a shad...I expect an Allis Shad, beautiful fish, but protected!



Eight in two weeks...

I had this exciting report in from Colin Hemsworth this morning...

"Hi Tony, I fished near the station Saturday morning through to Sunday afternoon, set up two rods loaded with lug on pulley rigs. With the gentle winds casting was fairly easy going and could manage to get some large bait out a bit further. Saturday was very quiet, I had a few whiting in the daylight and dogfish as it got dark...after a kip started fishing again Sunday morning and 2nd cast produced a 4lb codling on straight lug, I had three more up to 2lb over the next 2 hours then it all went guiet. Nothing for the rest of the day until the last cast, I felt a bit of weight pulling in and as the fish was in the surf...ping!! And the hook came loose, I swear I saw the outline of a rather plump cod rolling back into the sea but I'm just telling myself it was just a dogfish and trying to make myself feel better! Thanks for the great lug and will be down soon. Colin"






HASTINGS & ST LEONARDS AA OPEN BEACH MATCH


