It was certainly a very busy year for everyone which saw numerous 'ups and downs' face one and all. Thankfully we managed to overcome whatever adversity was put in our path and here we are 'bright eyed and bushy tailed' ready to do it all again!

Remember that he is watching us throughout the year and possibly put some new scales in a few anglers' stockings! Liquidised bread and punch on the hook is another method that seems to have been consigned to memory or has it?

What does 2022 hold for the angler? Certainly the current Covid events are not helping confidence, however, our hobby is one of the few pastimes that can be enjoyed safely and provide much needed mental and physical well being. There can be no doubt that a day on the bank or beach is great therapy and for a few hours the 'troubles' of the world are forgotten as you become totally engrossed in your fishing! There are few pastimes which can offer such pleasure and provide an individual with a feeling of utter contentment. As we progress through the first few weeks of the new year we notice the buds on the trees and foliage begin to emerge, the behaviour of the animals and birds begins to change and then the sunshine begins to provide some warmth over us. Only being outside and at one with Nature can an individual find such pleasure which is very often so difficult to put in to words, but an angler will totally understand.







Fishery Reports

Greenacres Farm Fishery Biddenden, Kent

Speci 1

This lake has been proving challenging at times with the weather being so up and down, but for those that are up for a challenge have been rewarded with a couple of fish. Solid pva bags over a small bed of particle has seemed to be the winning ways of getting a few fish out. **Andy Humphreys** did this and was rewarded with 7 takes landing 4 of them in a 48hr session on his birthday, so happy birthday again mate from all at Greenacres and well done. There are also some lovely perch to be had on small lures/shads or even float fishing with prawns, worms or maggots.



Speci 2

The catfish have slowed right up now the temperatures have dropped, one or two are still coming out to some lucky anglers but very hit and miss.

Catfish are being taken on soft baits like luncheon meat and worms over small baited areas of mixed sized marine halibut pellets. Carp are being caught the same way, but with a solid pva bag with a wafter or a pop up over the top.



A lovely mixed coarse lake that has been very popular with the

regulars catching a lovely mixed bag of fish with the odd chance of catching a good size carp up to 15lbs, average carp being caught are between 6-7lbs. Large bags of skimmers being caught on this lake since the colder weather has settled in.



Kingfisher

This is an overstocked match lake and great fun with a guarantee of catching, brilliant for families or anyone wanting to teach their kids how to fish. Stay away from boilies in here and use natural baits like, maggots, corn, pellets, worms on light float fishing setup.

Bluebell

A little tench pond tucked out of the way. This pond is showing a good number of tench being caught on float or feeder tactics using worm, maggot, paste or sweetcorn on the hook. The carp in here are also stunning fish that can be caught up to 10lbs with the odd roach, rudd and gudgeon.

RULES

- Please dip all nets, slings, cradles and unhooking mats located in top two car parks before entering any lake or you will be asked to leave.
- No one under the age of 16 to be left unattended at all times, this also means to and from the toilet.
- No one under the age of 18 is allowed to night fish without a responsible ADULT.
- No takeaways after 6pm

Kingfisher is also great for any club that is looking for a decent match lake where everyone catches and winning weights can be very close to call, so start booking your dates with us now for next year!

Ben and I hope you all had a happy and safe Christmas and are looking forward to 2022 being a better year. As of writing this report we do not know how this new variant of Covid-19 is going to play out but with the majority of people getting double jabbed and boosted, hopefully we should see a safer and healthier year ahead.

Ben and I, with the backing of the fishery owners, are very pleased to be able to continue our extensive stocking programme on the fishery at the end of 2021. We took delivery of 220 x 8 to 10 inch tench which were put into **Eden Pond**, **Moat Pond** and **Majors Lake**, then we introduced 30 more new C4 mirror carp weighing 10lbs to 12lbs into Majors Lake from Chilston Fish Farm. Then, also from Chilston Fish Farm, we introduced 5 x C4 carp weighing between 12lbs 8ozs to 14lbs 8ozs into **Daughters Lake**. But the stocking did not finish there as we also introduced 10 stunning C6 mirror carp into **Snipe Lake** weighing between 20lbs to 22lbs 8ozs. These carp are the biggest we have ever stocked into Snipe Lake. We are sure that you will agree that these fish will make a great addition to the lakes that they were introduced into. As usual at this time of year Ben and I undertake a large amount of maintenance work on and around the fishery. At the time of writing this report we have cut back all the marginal growth and thinned out the reeds between swims, repaired and wood chipped swims where needed, cut back a lot of over-hanging tree branches above and around where anglers cast and removed any snags that were in the water, removed all overhanging brambles and any snags

overhanging brambles and any snags on and around the islands and dealt with repairing some pot holes around the fishery. This work will be done on every lake and pond on the complex to ensure that you all have a

comfortable time when visiting us. We started this winter work in November and we plan to complete all maintenance work on the fishery before March. Please note that all lakes are open whilst we carry out the winter maintenance.

We both hope that you all have had a safe and healthy Christmas and New Year, look after each other and Ben and I look forward to seeing you all on the banks very soon.











Oak Tree is a 1 acre lake formed around an impressive oak tree. This really is a beautiful lake, Oak Tree has only 4 double swims, one on each corner of the lake with an island in the middle. Depths range from 5ft to 8ft. Currently there are 47 catfish to 50lb, 20 carp to 22lb and a small number of pike, however, more carp will be stocked over the course of the 2021/22 winter.

OLD BALLAST PIT Still a few carp showing to mid double figures. Venue bailiff Kristy, is still getting a few nice fish during the week days. Some pike have shown to around 12lbs.

NEW LAGOON Venue regular **Steve Ellis** had some nice bream to just over 6lbs on a recent trip as well as some roach to 1lb and a couple of tench to 3lbs. Generally the fishing has slowed a bit with the recent extra cold water coming in.

BARDEN LAKE Reports of a few pike to low doubles on deadbaits. Apart from that, no notable carp captures to report.

HAYSDEN LAKE Most fish being caught are

close in under the bushes or near the platforms, not surprising considering there have been reports of over 100 cormorants being present.

Regular correspondent Robin Piper has put pen to paper and sent in a letter for the first issue of 2022!

Dear Barry, So here we are with another Winter on our doorstep and it has now been three years since I first started fishing at Claygate lakes. When I began fishing there I was told by another angler from a well known Kent venue that I would enjoy the fishing at Claygate as there was a good head of fish in one of the lakes known as Sophie, or as most people call it the 'Snake lake'. With this information to hand this was where I was

going to have a go. However, looking at the other match and pleasure lake known as Lake Eva

I had a change of heart. I set up my 10' leger rod with a running half ounce Pallatrax Stonze weight and a size 12 barbless hook baited with small pieces of luncheon meat. I also loose fed some pieces of meat to see how things would develop. Within a few minutes the tip of the rod went round and I had a short battle with, much to my surprise, a nice 6lbs mirror carp. I thought that this was going to be a good session so I felt that it was right to have chosen this lake. I turned round to grab my flask for some tea and I was just in time to watch my rod and reel jump off the rests and disappear in to the water! I guessed that was the last I would see of my £75 set up! I went to speak to the bailiff who told me not to worry and he shortly

came back in the small punt. "Show me where you lost your gear", he asked. I pointed from my swim and stood there looking rather sad! Anyhow, he pulled

out a rake and began to drag it along the bottom and then out came the butt of my rod! "Grab it!", he cried, which I did! The rod arched over as the fish shot under a tree and yes it was still attached! However, I failed to land this carp as the roots gave this monster plenty of time to tangle me up and the line soon parted. The bailiff had a quick glimpse of the fish which he reckoned to be a good double. I was more than pleased to have my rod and reel returned, but disappointed that the fish was lost. However, I made up for that with another fine carp a little later and finished the day with 54lbs in the net! Another session on Lake Sophie using the tail end of prawns I picked up a lovely perch of 3lbs along with a number of smaller ones and after a wait managed to catch a couple of those nice bream, one at 7lbs 8ozs and one at 5lbs 4ozs along with some tench to 1lb 8ozs so all in all a good day! I hoped to repeat my success the following week, but the fish just weren't



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


After extensive research, where the limitations of both barbed and barbless were scrutinised, there has been an obvious need for improvement thus resulting in this radical design that crosses the boundaries between what we have had and what we now have. Made from high grade Japanese wire, the key improvement has been the introduction of a series of minute horizontal grooves on the inside of the specially designed arrow shaped hook point, where historically the barb would have been. These grooves allow the hook to hold securely in the fish's mouth when pressure is applied, as the flesh presses into the grooves resulting in a firm hook hold with no slippage. What are you waiting for? Grab your rods and head down to your favourite water and remember to take your phone or camera!

This month's piece is not directly about the fishing of the past, but it directly affects the fishing of the future. Living as I have done in Spain and Australia for periods over the last 40 years, I have witnessed at first hand the terrible problem that we face from pollution and climate change or global warming. I am actually writing this piece in Spain (Nov 1st 2021) and the COP 26 conference is in full swing, albeit without the leaders of the two main coal burning polluters ,China and Russia. I have seen the vast coal trucks on the docks in Norfolk Virginia, thousands of them, and the coal fields in Newcastle NSW and heard of the huge coal usage in Brazil and South Africa. The burning of coal / fossil fuels is the main problem today, but some seem still to deny that it is a problem. In the Amazon vast swathes of forest are being cleared for crops and grazing and the smoke from these fires can be seen for hundreds of miles. White dolphins used to follow the ships up river to Manus, but today this phenomenon is rare and the animal noises from the deforested banks is greatly reduced. I've been to Brazil so I've seen it for myself. At last agreement has been reached to limit the deforestation so that CO2 can again begin to be absorbed by the trees and foliage.

In Spain, on the Mediterranean costas the sea level IS rising. About 6 inches I would say judging by the rock we used to sit on after our daily walks along the beach at La Mata. Most days the weather is great, 30 degrees plus and blazing sun, but now every so often a massive storm comes in from the mountains or off the sea, and washes away huge sections of the beach, bringing in loads of sea weed, which the local council do clear every morning, before raking the beach! Dead fish get washed up as far as the beach side bars now and coastal erosion is becoming a major problem, just like the East Coast of Suffolk and Norfolk.

You would think that idyllic islands in the Pacific and Indian oceans, like Bora Bora, Tahiti, the Maldives and Seychelles would be immune to the ravages of modern life, but this is not so. The rubbish washed up on windward parts of the beaches is nothing short of disgusting, all drifted in on the tides and wind from China, India and Japan mainly. Plastic bottles, flip flops, rope, nets, buoys and all manner of flotsam and jetsam

gets trapped behind the high water line and mixes with the fallen coconuts and foliage at the back of the beaches. In the Maldives, where the rising sea levels are expected to flood many of the islands in the next 30 years, the rubbish problem is acute. Some Islands are so small that all the rubbish from the hotels gets put in a landfill site just behind the main restaurants and it is not a pretty sight! Barges take rubbish to a main tip in Male, the capital, where almost half of one island is taken up as a rubbish dump and burns all day! I know, I've seen it!

At sea, even 1000 miles from land, the plastic bottles and discarded fishing gear you see is a disgrace. Sightings of Dolphin, Whale, Porpoises, Turtles and flying fish are not what they were 25 years ago when I went on my first cruise. There is often a floating scum like the protein foam you get on weir pools, forming vast wind lanes and it is in these wind lanes that the rubbish collects. The worst floating rafts of rubbish can be seen in India, Cambodia, Vietnam and Indonesia, where the coastal estuaries have it going up and

down the rivers with the tide, and trapped under the floating houses of the locals in the fishing harbours. There seems little point in Britain banning plastic bags and bottles etc when the rest of the world does nothing about it. In Spain plastic bags are still given out with everything you buy, even a bag!

Up in the vast Chilean fjords the glaciers are receding at an alarming rate. Our ship travelled one mile into an ice flow where once there was solid ice, and we witnessed the blue glacier ice breaking off in huge pieces and floating away to melt and raise the sea level a few millimetres more!

On the other hand, the cleanest place I've ever been to is Perth, W. Australia, but of course the whole of Australia is wonderful, as is New Zealand. Oh to be young again, I would jump at the chance of going there to live permanently. Seven of my friends did so in the 1970s under the £10 Pom emigration scheme. Fred J Taylor and

Ian Howcroft to name but two. They went to the northern suburbs of Perth, and Ian never looked back!

The floods, fires, winds and rains that the world gets now is all down to climate change, there can be no doubt about that now, our summers' are different and the winters are getting shorter and warmer. I well remember the winter of 1963 when it froze for 3 months and fishing was impossible, last winter we had a bit of snow, but nothing compared to 60 years ago. I was out in it fishing through a hole in the ice on the River Medway, and I caught fish, a few lovely roach on worm, I was keen in those days! Today the smaller rivers have suffered from pollution, abstraction and silting, ones like the Wensum, Waveney and Windrush where once I caught good roach in the 1960s with members of the Oxford and Norfolk specimen hunters groups. Some rivers have, however, improved of late, like the Trent, Avon, Thames and Severn, with big chub and barbel coming out to those who know where to fish.

Another sure sign that Global Warming is real is the rapid decline in the growth of live corals around the world over the past 30 years or so. As mentioned, my travels have taken me to all corners of the world over that time where I have witnessed at first hand the terrible damage caused to coral reefs by the warming of the oceans by just half a degree. The storm we had very recently, Storm Arwen, was another example of the types of extreme weather that can be expected over the coming century. Never before have I seen such snow, even 'up north' in November and the winds rivalled the great storm we had 'down south' in 1987, when trees and power lines were blown over like matchsticks.

I have snorkelled on and visited many tropical islands in the Pacific, Indian Ocean and Caribbean and the decline in colourful live corals is plain to see. Where once we swam over beds of brain coral and all the

Some sort of agreement must be reached at this important meeting in Glasgow, otherwise there is very little help for the world in general and my great grandchildren in particular. It's all very well having lovely hot sunny summers with no rain to fill the reservoirs, then having it all in one fell swoop in the Autumn, we are becoming like India with the monsoon season. Hydrogen cars, that's what we want, I've been saying this for years, and then today in the Daily Mail there is only a double page spread all about it by Lord Bamford of JCB! No, not the bailiff of Redmire, Les!! The petrol companies blocked the development of hydrogen as a fuel for cars 30 years ago, but now they seem to have accepted it. They can get the H out of H2O and fuel all sorts of motors, the technology is there, none of this electric nonsense!!! However, if they were to develop hydrogen cars then we would need much more water and sites from which to extract it. So, build more reservoirs like the long planned Broad Oak reservoir near Canterbury, and fill it with trout, and we will all be happy!



other brightly coloured corals, with fish so numerous you thought you were in an aquarium, nowadays, vast swathes of the sea bed is adorned with areas of white powder and dead bleached corals. This can recover over decades, but with sea temperatures likely to increase, and sea levels rise, the future of this tropical phenomenon is doomed. In the Maldives, piles of dead corals litter the beaches, and blend in with the plastic bottles and other rubbish. It is illegal to even take away samples of dead coral, and on the Great Barrier Reef off Queensland, large areas are out of bounds now for even swimming over. I swam on the reef 30 years ago, out from Townsville, and will never forget the sights I saw just 10 feet beneath me. Such colour in hundreds of different corals and fishes, it really is just like the David Attenborough films on BBC2!

I do despair over what my five great grandchildren will be able to witness in 30 years time, the world is destroying itself fast. I won't be here to see it, but unless something is done pretty damned fast to reduce this decline, there is no future for our nature and wildlife.

I gave up serious fishing to travel the world many years ago, and have seen many of the wonders of the world, in fact I'm off to the Arctic circle in March, to the North Cape on the tip of Norway. After a break of two years due to Covid we hope to see new phenomena from our small cruise ship, one that hopefully cannot be eroded, the Aurora Borealis, the Northern Lights!

ith yet another restricted and unusual festive season under our belt I am now really hoping that things start to improve for us all and that we finally manage to get ahead of the virus and all it's variants. As I write this however things are not looking too promising on that score, but, being a 'piscatorial pragmatist' with leanings toward the optimistic end of the spectrum. I would like to wish you all

Fishing wise, I have been continuing my pike quest with some success. Although I have not had any monsters, I am happy with my results and have caught from most of the venues that I have fished - including some new ones. The only exception to this is Bough Beech reservoir (one of my favourite places to fish) where I have blanked about half a dozen times with only one take sofar. This was to be expected, however, as the water experienced a large loss of fish a couple of years back due to an outbreak of the parasite 'Argulus' which can be fatal for pike. It is hard to say how many pike were lost, but, as an indication I can tell you that we had less than half the number of takes last season than we had in previous years. Having said that I still really enjoy

I am particularly pleased to have succeeded on several new waters and a certain level of consistency has been achieved, so I must be doing something right. An issue that has cropped up again though is that of repeat captures. I know that in carp and specimen circles the targeting of individual, often named fish, is very much an accepted part of the game (although not one that I subscribe to) it is a fact that the more times a fish is caught the more likely it is to come to harm in some way. This is not meant as a criticism, just a fact. It is also more relevant in the world of piking as the fish are far more vulnerable to damage and we have all heard it said that 'pike waters thrive on neglect'. This is indeed true and the repeated capture of pike - particularly on treble hook rigs - is undoubtedly the reason why many good waters frequently go into sharp decline. When it comes to pike my attitude now is that I will change swim/area or even ultimately venue in order to avoid this happening, even if I feel that I have not caught the bigger fish - I can always try again in the future. It is true that you can sometimes get what is referred to as a 'mug fish' that gets caught more often than others, but I believe that this can be because they are just more recogniseable than others and maybe other repeat captures go unnoticed for this reason. Smaller fish also get caught frequently, but we seldom notice this, as we don't study them as closely. My results over many years tend to indicate that these 'same-fish' captures suggest that the fish population is a lot less than we would like to believe - particularly when it comes to the bigger specimens.

Oh no, not you again!


girlfriends' decided to examine the contents of my rucksack and then run off with my unhooking mat - Cheeky Cow!

of the list of priorities for the government and every controlling authority - perhaps second only to Covid 19. The current Environment bill, although a step in the right direction, still allows the water companies to discharge effluent into our rivers and coastal waters. This is happening regularly and not just at times of heavy rainfall and flooding, as has been claimed. There is plenty of hard (video) evidence to prove that sewage is being discharged during low water conditions. Can we please, at least, start

to enforce the existing laws on this subject?

If you have not seen this video from Youtube (Riveside) a couple of months back I urge you all to watch it. www.youtube.com/watch?v=51DOVAUNANA It certainly shocked me. It proves pollution on a massive scale, particularly on one of our most picturesque and popular rivers - The Wye - with little action being taken by the relevant (and drastically underfunded) bodies to tackle it. The Wye is suffering regular and catastrophic pollution, not just from sewage discharge, but also from the activities of the farming industry - with Poultry farms being singled out as a major, and largely unregulated, problem.

This issue is becoming a National Disaster. Please help to fight this by supporting the Angling Trust and joining other groups such as riveraction.com I realise that this pollution problem is extremely complex and will be astronomically expensive to rectify, but successive governments have shied away from it for decades and huge cuts to the budgets of departments such as the EA have put efforts to enforce even 'existing legislation' into reverse. We really do have to prioritise this massive problem, as a society, and also accept that 'WE' will all have to pay for it.

I have been repeatedly asked recently to reveal the latest news about my long running dispute with the local Dartford Angling Club over my access to one of their waters - which I have used for 30 years without problem. The current position is this: I came to an arrangement/agreement with them several weeks back. This is far from ideal, as it still fails to recognise my 'legal' right of way, that I believe to exist. It did however put a stop to the imminent court action that was due to commence early this month. The truth is that I could not afford to proceed with this action without borrowing money or using crowd funding to help me. I had already spent a substantial amount on solicitor's fees etc.

I won't say any more about this publicly, as I agreed not to and I will adhere to this - unless, of course, I receive further hostility from the club.

Regrettably it seems that the law is just for the rich.



Hello and welcome to the first edition of 2022!

We hope that you all enjoyed a great Christmas and Santa brought you everything you asked for! No doubt many of you received some new fishing tackle, but have you tried it out yet? It must be tested! The weather has been fairly kind to us and we are not up to our chins in snow thankfully, but have you managed to get out and do some fishing during the holidays? It can get a little chilly at times, but warm clothes and hot drinks can soon put that right. The fishing is not easy at this time of year, the water gets cold and the daylight hours are shorter. Very often the last couple of hours in the afternoon can fish better than early morning as the fish often have a short spell of feeding before darkness. Simple methods and baits are what is required, but do remember to loose feed very sparingly as you don't want to overfeed the fish and they then disappear. Half a dozen maggots or casters each cast or every five minutes or so if the fish are feeding confidently is all that is needed. If you do fish regularly at this time of year you will know that you do need to be patient, however that effort can be very rewarding!

Just a word about safety! At this time of year the banks can become muddy and slippery so the utmost care needs to be taken. The last thing you want to do is to fall in to icy water when you are bundled up in your winter clothing. Always make sure you are fishing with someone and that you are watching out for each other. Please don't take chances with your safety, no fish is worth that!

Keep sending in your catch photos and stories as we love to receive them and print them in the magazine. However, do remember that we require your parents / guardians permission to print your pictures.

January update

Rowhill, SEN (Special Educational needs) School at Longfield, although a rare case, have the perfect Fishing model. This is a school that works in partnership with Fishing for Schools. Fishing for Schools fund a course to get the younger students interested in fishing, then in year 9 these students go on taster sessions which could be construction, motor bike mechanics, cooking or Fishing and the

environment. They then get to choose which course they would like to take, which then involves a 2 year vocational course.

Massive credit must go to the Head Master Geoff Bartrum! When I started working with the school 13 years ago he was the head of PE, but now has worked his way up to Head Master. It is important to say that he never knew anything about fishing and never had an interest in fishing, but once he saw the response that the students had to fishing and realised the benefits it had on the students he had the foresight to get fishing on the school curriculum. I would point out that SEN schools do get a healthier budget than mainstream schools, but still, for a head teacher to be bold and fund Fishing, is a brave move in my book, but a good one.

When I first joined the school, myself and another coach started with two lads on the course but today there is so much fishing interest at the school that from September of this year, we have been running two BTEC courses for 12 students in total and such is the interest in fishing within other areas of the school that another one of our coaches is working 5 days a week at the school, teaching Fishing!

For the BTEC course we have two angling coaches, one being myself and the school provides a teaching assistant Amy, who

does all the transportation, helps with course work and also loves to get involved in the fishing. She is great to have around.

On these Fishing qualification courses all the students are different, you will get a student that is naturally gifted at fishing, but not too keen on the paperwork side of the course, vice versa you will get a student that really struggles with fishing at first and won't touch a maggot or handle a spikey finned Perch, but is good with the paperwork. But it is important to say that this programme benefits young people and provides a positive learning experience to those that might struggle at school.

An important part of the qualification is the paperwork the students have to complete, they have to put a portfolio together of their work. We are lucky that our main headquarters at Grove Farm, Hadlow College has a classroom next to the lake, the reward for getting the paperwork done is to be able to go fishing, so it's not surprising that the paperwork is completed in double quick time!

> Although this BTEC fisheries course revolves around fishing matters, it is not only for fisherman.

A few years ago we had a lad who wanted to be a Zoo Keeper and this year we have a lad that is really interested in horticulture, but because we deal with plant management on the Fishery management course and other outdoor environmental topics, Water cycle, Life cycles of Animals etc, this course, for some students, is as close as they are going to get to their chosen subject and future career.

Due to our link with Hadlow College and having our headquarters there, it is a good pathway for the students to go to for higher education when they leave school, whether it be a fishing course or any other animal management course. Saying all that we are seeing more students each year completing our BTEC Fishery courses then after leaving

school going on to Hadlow College for a course involving Fisheries which is great to see!

What have we been up to recently on the BTEC Fishery course?


Normally with the weather conditions being really cold at this time of year we revert to teaching indoor fishing skills and also concentrating on getting the paperwork side of the course completed so that in the warmer months we can do more fishing! However, due to a combination of events this year, one being the weather, it has been extremely mild throughout Autumn and this year's students are really keen to carry on fishing. Not only that given the virus situation we are safer being outdoors then indoors! It was further decided to visit some new stillwater and river venues, where it is always good for a bite at this time of the year.

After speaking to Fishery owner Steven Eastwood, owner of Grovehurst fishery at Horsmonden, who I know, it was agreed I would bring a group of our students to his fishery that would help with some plant control and then get to have a fish. This is always a win win situation as the boys need experience in fishery management and Steve can always do with some help around the fishery. Steve is a fellow qualified angling coach and it's good that we share the same ethos about

encouraging young people to go fishing.

We have also visited Hall Place, Crayford where the students have got some valuable experience in river fishing and importantly get to catch and handle river fish such as chub, dace and minnows, more fish to add to their fish catching list! It has been nice for the students to learn more about their local rivers and the added bonus is most of them are free fishing.

I would add if you are a young person and intend to go river fishing it is always good practice and safer to go Warren White with a friend.



Lure Fishing



Bewl Water

Finally the water temperature dropped early in December and with that the water cleared seeing the fishing unsurprisingly improve. Trout could be seen moving all across the main basin and the fly fishermen were able to enjoy some superb sport once again. I still managed to squeeze the odd trip in elsewhere, but my main focus of attention was Bewl chasing predators! The sudden drop in temperature has seen the perch shoals move into deeper water 30-40ft, in November I'd found them in 20-30ft.

Recently I've been trying to fathom out where the pike have been hiding? Through November I'd been searching shallower water than normal. My thought process was that maybe they were in depths shallower than I'd been fishing. Reservoir pike fishing can mess with your head especially when you're not catching! Reports of twenty pound fish had filtered back to me from the fishery staff. I was eager to learn what depth these fish were being caught from and I was trying to figure out a pattern, but the scant information I received wasn't conclusive.

My pike quest continues ...!

Confused one morning, I headed into a narrow bay with a stream inlet. At the mouth of the bay I cut the engine and quietly paddled my way up to the inlet. I even switched my echo sounder off, just in case the pinging from its transducer might spook the pike in such shallow water. Now that's what you call stealth mode! Slowly and quietly I cast my weedless rigged soft plastic lures into the margins working my way back along the shallows towards the open water. With such clear water I held my breath on each retrieve half expecting a large marauding pike to be following my lure, but no such luck. After two hours I'd nothing to show for all my intense concentration and



effort. Undaunted, I headed for another intimate bay that offered similar features and repeated my stealthy approach, with the same result! It's been said that the definition of madness is to keep repeating the same action expecting a different result! Well that's what reservoir piking can be like when it's not going your way. Later the same day, after my concerted effort, I needed some light relief so headed to a sand bar that's surrounded by deep water. I started drifting towards the drop off that steeply shelves into 60ft of water. At 28ft exactly I found what I was looking for, shoals of perch. I was sure these were perch as they were stacked up in the water vertically off the bottom, my friends and I often refer to these shoals as 'perch Christmas trees'. I was



vertical jigging a vibe-bait and on every pass I caught a couple of nice sized perch before I drifted past the shoal and into deeper water. I then tried anchoring up and casting towards the shoals, but that presentation didn't get the desired result, so back to drifting. I then had a bright idea; yes, I do have them sometimes! I'd start my drift in 25ft, but now I cast downwind of the boat so I could catch a couple of fish before reverting to vertical jigging behind the boat, this doubled the time my lure was in the 'sweet spot'. Brilliant and it worked! On more than one occasion a perch had already taken my lure before I'd taken up the slack line before commencing my retrieve. When you cast ahead of the boat your lure drops faster and interestingly I started catching pike too! In a hectic period of less than two hours I'd caught 30 perch and 4 pike, nothing big, but sweet all the same after such a gruelling morning.

Location

The day I've just described just shows how important fish location is. The best tackle and methods in the world won't catch fish if they're not in front of you! I know that's an obvious statement, but, it's often overlooked,

especially when you're not catching and you start guestioning your approach. This brings me nicely full circle. At the beginning of this Autumn's pike fishing at Bewl I said to my boat partner, Gary Collins, that we needed to fish in water shallower than 15ft. On reflection last season we hadn't fished the shallow margins out to 15ft. I was trying to think where we hadn't fished in an effort to locate the large pike we knew inhabited the reservoir. I'm not for one moment suggesting that there are loads of big fish in Bewl, but conversely I can't believe there aren't more big pike there than we're catching.

Back to the beginning

After failing to see anything encouraging in the skinny water and with the cooling trend I now decided to enjoy some pleasure fishing for perch. I focused around a structure in 25-30ft; the perch were rather finicky with only the odd fish falling to ice jigs and vibe-baits. I rummaged around in my extensive soft plastics box and selected a slim 'flappin tail' shad. I was casting my lure short so that when I retrieved it would lift immediately off the bottom before I lowered my rod tip to feed it back towards the deck. I adopted this hopping motion to avoid snagging the structure and it seemed the perch liked this retrieve too. One after another they hit the shad despite my ultra-thin wire trace. I have to thank Bewl regular Matt Peverall for his recommendation, using 6lb Knot-2-Kinky single strand Titanium wire has been a revelation.

As I continued casting around the feature I had a smash take just as I was lowering the shad towards the bottom. It was immediately obvious I was attached to a pike and I quickly slackened off my drag. A few jarring head shakes told me this fish wasn't at all happy to come off the bottom, a sure fire indication of a big fish! As the fish took so close to the boat I was able to steer it away from the structure. I had the upper hand so let it tire itself out before slowly gaining some line. My perch rod was groaning by now. As I peered down through the clear water I saw my prize slowly appear. It's very difficult to estimate the weight of Bewl pike while they're in the water as



they're so chunky and broad across the back. She lunged twice at the boat side, all large pike over doubles are females, before I slipped the net under her at the first attempt. I left her over the side recovering while I zeroed my scales and got the camera ready. The lure had been completely inhaled and I found it easier to extract it through the gills and cut the line rather than trying to un-hook her conventionally.

What a stunning specimen she was, not long, but very broad with a deep full belly. By standing on the boat's seat I was able to lift the sling clear of the deck. The needle juddered and finally settled at 27lbs. I was so happy to at last make the acquaintance of one of Bewl's special pike. A guick picture of her on the mat didn't really do her justice, but I wasn't prepared to risk damaging her by retaining her any longer than necessary. Fortunately, Gareth Allen, a passing fly angler came to my rescue and he obliged by taking some trophy shots for which I'm very grateful.

Mission accomplished?

I'm not sure really, maybe I'm delusional, but I'm hoping there are still a few surprises in Bewl. If so, I hope to have the pleasure of making their acquaintance!

A very Happy New Year to you all!

As another year begins, I daresay many will be wondering what the fishing will be like in 2022? We did enjoy some good results in 2021, the plaice showed up in good numbers early in the year especially along the Sussex coast, the bass were about almost everywhere, the smoothound fishing was also pretty good and many anglers discovered squid fishing a few weeks ago! However, the mackerel run didn't materialise until very late Summer / early Autumn and then it was a very short appearance. The current sea temperature is around 10 degrees (at the time of writing) which is higher than at this point last year and a little above where we would like it to be given the time of year. This beggars the question of how will this impact on the fishing in the early part of the year? Our seasons are certainly changing and their arrival is becoming later, perhaps this is the 'new normal'? The range of species around our local coastline has also changed and become more diverse than ever before and the tuna are now moving further along the Channel. January and February were always regarded as 'scratching months' when pickings for anglers were fairly lean, but will this be the same as we begin our angling journey in to 2022? Perhaps we can expect more than the odd flatfish and rockling?

"Gravesend and Greenhithe, plenty of flatties and whiting this week, fishing between Asda and the QE2 Bridge is a great spot for the flatties using ragworm or frozen blacks great baits here. It's wise to arrive a little early on the rising tide to assess where the snags are. Midway between Redland and the crossways jetty several snags are now visible.

Gravesend side, near Halfords, if your target is whiting, there are plenty of whiting although most are predominantly pin whiting with the odd reasonable sized ones. Thames Estuary both shore and boat, the codling are still elusive

at the moment, but the odd one is being caught, dabs are numerous and a great species to target, dogfish, whiting and thornback landed by boat. The usual lugworm and squid cocktail bait, either wrapped or tipped, is a great bait for the estuary."



"Fishing all along the bay has been relatively quiet of late with not a huge amount to report from the beach. A few good blows and fairly steady easterly winds bringing in cold air and clearing the water has made for quite difficult conditions to find the better fish during the day, but as day turns to night, the hoardes of whiting will show up all along the beaches and will pretty much take any bait you put out there, many caught are still of a good size with the better fish falling to half a fresh or frozen worm tipped with a slither of squid. During this challenging time of the year and these colder months many anglers do

turn their attention to the delicious tasting Dab. Late afternoon tides into darkness are usually best, fishing 2 or 3 hook flapper rigs with 4-5 day old sticky worms with a bit of 'bling' works best. The rays are not about in the numbers they normally are, but anglers are still finding them, pulley pennel rigs baited with squid or fish baits will help you find them. There have been a few matches held along the Parade and at Dymchurch, the bulk of the catches weighed in have been whiting and big dogfish around the 2lbs mark which are great for making up the weight. There was a match in particular that was held at Dymchurch late December, Dave Wood-Brignall came in first spot with 20 fish for 11lbs followed by Phill

Vincer with 11 fish for 8lbs and Matt Warby with 13 fish for 7lbs, well done gents, it can



Worthing area report courtesy of Prime Angling

"As expected, whiting have shown up in numbers and can be caught at night from most venues in Sussex and in the daytime when the sea has colour in it and can be caught to worm and fish baits. Recent matches have been won with 60 plus fish from Shoreham beach. Small whiting can make ideal live bait for species such as Conger and Bass and always worth trying with a spare rod when fishing Worthing Pier, Brighton Marina or Shoreham Harbour.

Some decent bass still remain inshore with a few fish to 4lbs showing along with reasonable numbers of small schoolies. Slipper limpet has accounted for fish caught where they are to be found washed up from venues such as East Preston and Rustington. The lower reaches of the River Arun and Adur are also likely to hold bass with big fish baits and peeler crab accounting for some good catches. Worth remembering all bass as of 1st December 2021 must be returned alive!

Dogfish have been prolific at Selsey East beach and they have shown up in smaller numbers from Shoreham and most other venues. Conditions have been good for flounders

with catches from the Rivers improving by the week mostly during darkness to worm baits

but some good sized fish can be caught from Shoreham Harbour, Worthing Pier and most beaches when the water is calm and settled. Dabs can be targeted from most sandy beaches in East Sussex with Seaford, Pevensey and Eastbourne noted spots to produce fish with sticky black lug the best bait. Odd small plaice and sole are still showing occasionally. Other species likely to be caught include pouting, rockling, small hounds and silver eels to worm baits.



Despite good conditions recently no reports (at the time of writing) of any of the bigger species such as congers and rays being caught bar a few straps coming out. Codling have been caught by inshore boats but have not ventured to within anglers' casting range

so, at present, masks must be worn in the shop. 
got out. Black bream are still about, but an abundance of sprats and herrings have dispersed the pollack and any cod with few left on the wrecks, making it hard to get any good bags.

On the beaches the whiting have arrived in force and appear to be either good size or the following year class

Prospects for January: In the boats pollack will start to congregate on the deep offshore wrecks late in the month prior to spawning in March. After heavy feeding on the sprats and herring they are usually in prime condition. These will be the main quarry when the weather allows. On the beach dabs will be the prime target with whiting as usual and not so looked forward to appearance of the rocklings! Late winter is often the leanest time on the beach given the absence of codlings. Remember the bass are out of season until March and must be returned!

Welcome 2022, what sort of year will you be? I predict another superb bass season, in fact I think most species will be on the up including my favourite fish, the smoothound, so beautiful! Hoping to see more mackerel which will encourage those fantastic 'Blue fin Tuna' up the Channel.

BEACH REPORT

As the year came to an end fishing has been a bit mixed. I feel that the sea has stayed a bit warmer encouraging those summer species to hang on (it did the same last year). Climate Change is happening, and yes it's affecting our fishing, but it's not all bad, we just have to learn to adapt.





Jonathan giving it ago! I had this report in last night from Jonathan Hughes:

"Hi Tony, hope you are well. I fished at Galloways today. I had one rod set up hoping for a ray, and one did show up, it took a mackerel bait on pulley dropper rig. Also had one mackerel which took the ray bait on the bottom, a first for me. Also had the normal whiting and a seagull which managed to get tangled when it flew into the line. It was safely released and flew away unharmed but not after having a peck at me."

BEST BAITS If you are just recreational fishing at this time of year, I would turn to a substantial lug/squid cocktail, it's worth a go (sadly most likely a dogfish). Dabs just love old lug, frozen lug, they are aggressive feeders, I've had them on a 4/0 hook!

BOAT REPORT Last month so many summer species hanging on, with warm seas (relatively speaking). The biggest challenge as always is getting afloat.

The eels are on the move!

I had this report in yesterday from Jason Adams out on Sea Otter from Dungeness:

"Had a good go for a cod today, but unfortunately no fruits for our labour! We did however have a few eels, 7 in total. Here's Carl with a couple, best one went 24lb. A lovely day to be afloat!"

I nicked a late result, (of sorts)! Well I've got to say for the minor victory achieved at the death, I worked b****y hard for it! With the Kent shores going through their usual December spell of whiting and not much else, myself and Paul Hunter decided to chance our luck at Shoreham Burrels. The whiting would still be there, but at least we would have a chance of the odd Plaice, Strap or Undulate.

I'm on the mark bang on 2pm after stopping off at Lagoon Angling for a few ragworm and a chat. 'Word on the street' is there are a few plaice about and a big undulate was caught earlier in the week! One chap is there already with a chunky 44cms plaice in his cool bag, so I'm feeling quietly confident. It's a nice flat green sea with a touch of cloud, and a negligible offshore wind.




Baits went out, two rods, one with a two hook flapper and

ragworm, the other with a pulley rig alternating mackerel and squid. Paul is going all out for the spotties to start. Ninety minutes in and we've had precisely nothing, not a twitch. We didn't have to wait much longer though, as soon as the sun set the rod tips started rattling to the dance of the whiting. Apart from a couple they are all around the 3/4lb range though so they find their way into Paul's bag, he's making fish fingers with his grand daughter this week so they're perfect.

An hour later the whiting disappeared as quickly as they showed up. I was praying that a few predators had moved in, but all we got was a couple of dogfish and an hour later the whiting were back with a vengeance. It's a smallish tide, but even so it was flooding so slowly I was beginning to question whether I had misread when HW was. However, within the space of

an hour it literally raced 15 metres up the shingle! Although we had a good natter earlier by now we are both fishing hard and concentrating on our rod tips, varying baits and distances to try and snare something worthwhile. Finally, I get a decent pull down which springs back up then pulls down hard again. I lift firmly into the fish and instantly feel a few decent pulls back. Pumping the fish in there's some decent weight. Twenty yards to go and GUTTED! Whatever it was had managed to spit the hook and all I'm left with is a lump of chewed up mackerel. Judging by the bite and the way it was coming in I think it was a ray.

The whiting are feeding hard again now with bites occurring every few minutes, but one more rather large dogfish broke the whiting monotony. High water arrives and after 7 1/2 hours at it my spirit is all but broken so we








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KENT BOAT REPORT

by Jason Parrott

I think there's one word that sums up the fishing in recent days, whiting! I'm sitting here writing this article on the Lady Ann out in the Channel thinking of what to write about. I have done bait presentation, done bait gathering, done life of a charter boat skipper, done the hounds, done the bass, done the skate, done 'we had a poor year on mackerel'! So it is back to the 'tings!

The humble whiting are some peoples' worst nightmare, but for me, when not a lot else is about, I embrace them. There was a charter that went out yesterday with 6 people onboard and they steamed out to a mark about 9 miles from Ramsgate. They set up for skate and fished with nice fresh mackerel

/ herring / bluey / squid baited rigs, ie flowing leger, 16ozs weight on a 70 lbs rig body with a 6ft hook length of Asso 40 lbs line to double 4/0 Koike wide mouth hooks. These usual rigs were fished on 10 rods for 2 hours in a prolific skate spot, but not one skate bite was had! However, they did manage a huge dab and some nice pouting and of course the 'tings so that got me thinking. I always say to the crew we can only fish for what's there so we changed the hook lengths and hooks over to 1/0 Tronix hooks on 20 lbs line and made up a wishbone rig and we went to work. Verne, my right hand man, knew this was coming and made several of his famous 3 hook 'fandango works of art'! I should have taken a picture as I seriously can't explain these rigs easily. However, there were lead ball weights involved, booms, Seaglo beads and all sorts of other ironmongery! It is easier if I say that it resembled a decorated Christmas tree on a rod!

Once Verne's masterpieces were on the seabed it all started. The whiting were on the baited rigs straight away, three at a time on occasions, and a few of the whiting were maybe touching the 1lb mark but there were many bigger than the baits! The lads on board were happier than pigs in muck! They have had some big hits of hounds with me as well as skate and bass and they know if we could have found something we would have done so, they were just happy to have the rods banging away all day. I have no idea of the final tally of how many we had. Wayne and Angie had a species comp and Wayne had pouting, dabs and whiting, but could he catch a dogfish? No, not at all right through the day! A dogfish would have won him a quick pint after fishing, but no. Angie was lacking the dab and pouting even though a few of the others were smashing the species. Wayne even went to slightly cheating tactics when he put the Sabuki feathers on for a herring, but no joy even though the weather was delightful and warm and calm. The tide wasn't playing ball at all, we were laying in to the small breeze most of the day which didn't help. No excuses honestly, none of the 'should have been here yesterday', wrong tide, wrong wind, just the white flag out day! However, it's on these days when you ask are you out here to fish or just to catch monsters? I know we would all like PBs every trip, but this type of fishing is fun on light tackle with the rod tips bouncing and the fish coming in. The coffee was flowing, the banter and biscuits were good so a big thank you to the lads for embracing the small fish, it made a bad day good!

There is some good news though, I was talking to one of my netting friends who had a good sign of skate and a few small codling so there is some hope that we will get back to normal very soon. The sounder is showing some good herring and sprat shoals so the food is there for the fish that feed on them and all day seals are around the boat popping up to say hello and how's the fishing! On the whole, last year (2021) was an amazing one on the Lady Ann, we certainly smashed some PBs and we had some nice bass in numbers and the skate played ball early in the year and I have got to say that we met some wonderful people so a big thank you to skipper Dick who steps in when I'm busy swimming, well not me swimming, but piloting the Channel swims. The new skipper Rob who will be about next year hopefully with Dick will be doing a few days as well. There is a wealth of knowledge between these two skippers who are both ex commercial fisherman for over 30 years, we are very lucky to have them onboard.


