Hello and welcome to the June edition of the Freshwater Informer


Although not carrying the gravitas it once had, with the onset of June many anglers will be preparing themselves for the 'glorious sixteenth'. That magical day when we can get back on our rivers, far away from the madding crowd, in pursuit of chub, barbel and a whole host of other river species.

From a legal perspective the close season hasn't applied to stillwaters since 1995, so we do at least avoid a three month lock down on the majority of lakes in the southeast.

Whilst this is great for Anglers and fisheries alike, it is important to remember that just because there isn't an official close season doesn't mean that fish stocks don't benefit from some peace and quiet during their breeding season. Thankfully the vast majority of venue bailiffs, whether club, syndicate or commercial, keep a very close eye on their waters and will shut a lake as soon as fish show signs of spawning. As frustrating as that can be from an anglers perspective it is worth remembering that spawning fish are not feeding fish and trying to catch them is an effort in futility. Far better to venture elsewhere or take the opportunity to see the stock of a lake up close and personal, as they pursue each other through the margins, oblivious to all around



them. Many an unknown leviathan has been spotted this way, although sometimes the reverse is true. Many years ago I had my sights set on fishing a local reservoir, convinced it held a record sized fish. All things pointed to the fact that there should have potentially been huge carp in there. I made a point of watching a particular area where the fish were known to spawn. Day after day, week after week I looked and eventually they turned up. So consumed with their task at hand that you could stand amongst them as they made their way into the ridiculously shallow spawning bay. I must have seen well over a thousand fish, all commons, and not one looked over low doubles. Talk about disappointment. Any unknown giants remained just that! Since those days, a handful of mirror carp have found their way into the reservoir





Talking of monsters, the regions catfish have woken up in earnest and are flat rodding anglers all over the southeast. In this issue we cover the species in our 'A Simple Approach ' series. Sea monsters also feature, with an amazing account of a beach caught Stingray. The two Bob's look both backwards and forwards in terms of tench fishing and Andy Lush demonstrates that fly fishing is for more than just trout. Warren White looks at the start of a school year with a difference and this months cover stars – The Sussex Fishing Gurus – demonstrate what fishing is really about – good times with good friends. Add to that fishery reports and PB's galore in the reader's catches and you have the Freshwater Informer.

Make hay while the sun shines

With the weather eventually starting to improve **Matthew Colegate** wasted no time in breaking out his surface fishing set up to target the regions big carp off the top.

An opportunistic afternoon session on prairie lake at Elphicks Fishery saw Matthew get off to a flyer with a 27lbs common, 27lbs mirror and topped off by a 30lbs 10ozs mirror, as Matthew picked the fish off at range using a


controller set up with 10lbs line.





Not one to rest on his laurels, Matthew followed this up with a trip to Tricklebrook's old lake where after a quick walk around he spotted a number of fish up towards the shallows, well away from the other anglers present. Steady feeding with dog biscuits soon got the fish feeding confidently within free-lining range and after casting out his banded hookbait on a size 10 hook, he soon had a 21lbs common on the bank before hooking into a new surface caught PB of 34lbs 8ozs.

Speci 1 Fishing has taken off with some fantastic catches being caught over a bed off bait or using solid pva bags. Preferred choice of bait at the minute seems to be frozen 15mm krill boilies from sticky baits, but like I say to everyone that turns up use what ever you feel comfortable with and the fish should show. And don't forget we have some lovely perch in here well over the 3lbs mark with the biggest so far being 5lbs 3ozs.

Speci 2 Catfish are showing up on whatever bait you put in the water at the minute, now that they have woken up. The catfish are coming out during the day, with the majority of them showing at night. Carp are being caught on small baited areas from the margins rather then open water as the catfish are picking up the baits before the carp. Stick to fruity baits or imitation corn for the carp as this seems to keep the catfish at bay for a longer period of time.

Heron This lake is fishing really well for a big bag of mixed fish either on the quiver or float fishing (don't ignore the margins) if you want the bigger carp. Smaller baits work best in here for all species of fish including the carp rather then the 15mm boilies that tend to get used. This lake can also be booked up for matches if you give us a call on: 07933 934942

Kingfisher This is a very good lake if you are starting up fishing for the first time as it is full of fish and keeps you busy all day. Main baits to use on here is pellets, paste, corn, maggots, luncheon meat or maggots/ worms over a bed of groundbait. This lake can also be booked up for matches if you give us a call on: 07933 934942









Bluebell A very unique lake tucked out the way, this lake holds a good head of lovely tench to 6lbs and carp to 10lbs and is very peaceful. A large bag of fish can be caught from this lake at certain times of the year so be prepared.





The Old Ballast Pit The fishing continues to be good with some cracking carp being caught as well as tench to over 7lbs and bream to nearly 10lbs. Lots of good sized roach and rudd being caught and a few small perch. Charley Lucas had a good session recently, catching some lovely looking fish, including a big grass carp.

Longfield Lake The tench fishing has been fantastic on here of late, with multiple catches with fish to over 7lbs. **George Kyles** and his grandson have had some great sessions fishing various areas on the lake. A few carp and plenty of bream around 6lbs being caught.

Haysden Lake Another lake fishing well for tench, most fish being caught close in and all around the 4-5lbs bracket. Feeder tactics have been good for bream to over 5lbs, skimmers and roach. Pole tactics have produced mixed bags to over 30lbs. **Mick Smith** and **Lee Wakeman** continue to do well from the platforms and riverside.

Barden Lake Since the new stock has gone in, multiple catches have been reported which have included some of the older bigger fish. Tench to over 10lbs have been reported as well as bream to over 13lbs. Some decent roach to around 1lb also getting caught.

New Lagoon This popular little water is producing lots of mixed species with tench to nearly 7lbs, carp to nearly 9lbs, roach and rudd to over 1lb, bream to around 6lbs and a few perch to nearly 1lb.

Pippins Farm Not heavily fished but a few reports of tench to 3lbs, small silvers and the odd carp to 4lbs. We have also been trialling our new aeration equipment ready for the warm weather. We are also in the process of installing a state of the art remote oxygen testing system.



Its been nice to see guys setting new PB's! Some lovely carp have been coming out. Well done Matthew Good, he's really been smashing the lake lately. He's always said that he has seen 40lbs+ fish whilst fishing here and managed to beat his **UK PB** twice by catching a 40lber. Then a few weeks later had a red letter day managing a 32lber followed by a 40lbs 9ozs new PB.

What goes around, comes around

Readers of last month's issue may recall a report from Richard Tremain who broke both his Carp and Catfish PB'S with two huge fish in one session. It seems that some of his luck must have rubbed off on his friend **Simon Mitchell**, who despite not catching on that trip went on to have a couple of dream sessions himself and sent in this report:

"I decided to go for a quick over nighter at my syndicate water in Hassocks expecting to get a good nights sleep having just come off nights at work and knowing that I've blanked for the last 10 x 48hr sessions.

Myself and the owner Jez Sussex fished Peg 5. My friend Dan Burke gave me some Carp company mixed baits to try as I hadn't had much luck recently. I put out 3 single hookbaits, 2 creamy white ones and a red one. 9pm that evening I struck into my first mirror weighing in at exactly 20lb. Put the rods back out and went to get some sleep. At 1-45am I got woken up by Jez who had a 28lbs mirror, I then got woken up again at 5-30am when my right hand rod screamed off and I had another 20lbs mirror. I got the rod back out, made a cuppa and chilled out. Was just drifting off when my middle rod went off that was close to the island resulting in what can only be described as the 'Big Linear' weighing in at a whopping 36lbs 6ozs. A new PB for me, I was buzzing!! Such a special fish. This is unheard of to catch 3 carp in one overnight session at the lake. At 12-30 I had another take on the same rod and couldn't believe it when I



It was ridiculous now to have caught so many fish on such a tough lake. I had to be off the lake at 2pm so started packing up around 1-30 when to my shock my right hand rod screamed off again. I had just said that it would be nice to catch a common and then pulled in a 25lbs 10ozs common.

saw the scales go to 31lbs.

Five fish in 18hrs would be a tough act to follow but little did I know what fate would have in store for me on my very next visit. Little more than 4 hours into the trip, the bobbin pulled up to the rod and after a determined fight I had 'Arthur', the biggest known fish in the lake, resting in the landing net. At 41lbs, my second PB in as many sessions. Amazing Fishing!"



Right place - Right time

Whilst out and about on official FWI business, we stopped off at Beachborough Lakes, just in time to see Danny Fry land this immaculate 17lbs 8ozs mirror carp. The A2 Baits backed angler was attending a social at the venue just prior to its closure for spawning and got the take as we walked into his swim.





Chasing shadows

Simon Marc Court had some fantastic sport when he fished a short 3 hour session at Chalk Springs. Armed with a Hardy demon 5-6 weight, with hardy ultralight reel, 5lbs point and using a small red stalking bug, Simon spent some time stalking shadows before picking out this incredibly well marked brown trout of 5lbs 6ozs. A fish which during the fight stripped him down to the backing not once, but twice. Simon also had a rainbow trout of 7lbs 7ozs to round off a great mornings fishing.



Lightning can strike twice!

Alex Evans paid a visit to Chequertree Fishery and was suitably impressed when a magnificent mirror of 29lbs 8ozs picked up his barrel wafter hookbait fished in conjunction with a solid pva bag. He returned the following week with son **Jack** and shared the tactics that had been so successful on his previous visit. Unbelievably, after following his Dad's advice, 11yr old Jack's hookbait was picked up by exactly the same fish and after a strong fight, weighed in at exactly the same weight!

Lost for words - a story with a sting in the tail...

The Sea Angling section of the Freshwater Informer has been absent for sometime now and whilst we can't guarantee it will make a permanent return just yet, we could not pass up the opportunity to include Andrew Cook's superb'blow by blow' account covering the capture of a truly remarkable fish.

With the hounds due to show any day it was off to one of our favourite high water marks to try for a few early ones. After picking Richard up we are on the mark at 1:30pm, the tide hasn't been flooding long so it's into the pub for a quick pint and a burger and chips. We're down on the shingle by 2:30, the Westerly is putting a slight swell on the water and we are looking at a fairly coloured flooding tide. There's a big weather front to the north but it drifts East and away from us fairly quickly.

Usual two rod set up, both armed with short pulley rigs, fishing one at reasonable distance with crab and the other a little closer in loaded with ragworm to start with the aim of seeing if an early Bass can be snared. Quality Bait once more courtesy of Medway Tackle Supplies, many thanks again guys.



Richard Steel - off to a good start



Another nice Thornback for Richard

The first couple of hours go past fairly quietly with only a couple of small 'knocks' but nothing hooked. The wind the shifts to the NW but weakens significantly which flattens the water right out and conditions become ideal.

First blood to Richard, a decent pull down results in a Thornback of 3 – 4lb. At least we know there is a chance of some decent fish tonight. A short while later and it's my turn, I'm talking with Richard to turn round and one of my rods has a big slack line. I reel up to the slack and lift into the fish, there feels like there's some decent weight on the end and it's pulling constantly, a few minutes of cranking and pumping sees another 'Thorny' of around 5lb slides up the shingle.

A quiet half an hour ensues, there must be a lot of very small bass about as we are continually getting tiny rattles with the ragworm getting stripped. Richard then gets another nice pull down which results in his second Ray of the evening and it's 2-1. Once again the ragworm rod dips down a few times and I'm into my second fish, again a Thornback bit much smaller this time. The fish seem to be coming in fits and starts as we once again go through a quiet period. Martin Vincent from the local SAC comes down for a chat which seems to coincide with the fish coming back onto the feed as Richard gets another bite and it's all square on the Ray front at 2-2. This is quickly followed up with another fish for Richard but this time it's a dogfish. The rag is catching everything but we can't seem to get a bite on the crab. The conditions have gone nigh on perfect by now and I hopefully commented that we have an outside chance of an early Stingray tonight.


High water, (19:10) comes and goes and I'm beginning to think that we won't see any early hounds tonight. I'm not too bothered though as at least we are catching halfway decent fish. Another small pull down for me results in a third small Ray of the night. I quickly unhook and return the fish, slide another 8 inches of ragworm round the hook and send it North.

Three minutes later, the sun has literally dipped behind land and fortunately the three of us are standing next to my rods when the recently baited ragworm rod starts to pull down, and simply keeps going, by the time I grab it and lift into the fish it's stripped 10 yards of line from my reel and is moving fast to the East. The speed of movement has me shouting 'this is a hound', it's taken me into the next bay within 10 seconds of seeing the bite! In an attempt to apply a little pressure and 'bully the fish' I reel down and start pumping the rod. This turns out to be a bit of a waste of time as the fish simply pulls back and strips another 30 yards of line off my Fathom II. Finally I start to make some progress but I honestly think that the line I gained was more down to the fish moving towards the shore than it was me having any sort of control over it. Richard and Martin have jumped over the breakwater to the next bay to try and get a glimpse of whatever is leading me on a merry dance. It's now 20 yards out so I exert a little more pressure once more, once again a similar result to the last attempt to dominate the fish with another 20 yards of line stripped from my reel. I slowly get the fish into the shallows, I'm right on the waters edge now and 'playing' the fish over the breakwater, (I think that most of the time the fish was actually playing me). We still haven't seen a dorsal fin which would have given the fish away as a decent hound.

Richard then shouts 'it's a Ray', I'm thinking surely not as the fish powers off once more I, this time straight at the breakwater. I've got to get it away as it's heading straight for the part just below the surface and if it gets over that I'll get snagged and lose it, so I take a risk and really pull against the fish. This fortunately does the job and also results in getting the fish close enough for the waves to work in my favour. Richard then shouts out 'it's a Stinger!' The problem is now the fish is in shallow water I simply cannot beach it. I don't want to risk pulling the hook so I shout out 'let it tire itself for a minute'. This had the same amount of success as the last attempts to gain control as the fish manages to turn once more and take a further 10 yards of line back into deeper water. I'd also tightened my drag for what I thought was the final battle, but the force of her last bid for freedom sees my rod pull down so far before I manage to loosen it that she almost pulls the rod onto the breakwater. Finally it seems spent and I manage to get the fish back into the shallows. Richard and Martin grab the line and pull it onto dry land. I still cannot see the fish as being over the other side of the breakwater I'm somewhat lower than the beach on the right. I'm soon 'advised' that this is a little special when Richard lets out a number of expletives! Resting the rod on the breakwater and jumping over I'm met with what I can only describe as the biggest shore caught fish I've ever seen, let alone caught!

An omen of things to come for Andrew

It's not the wingtip to wingtip that surprises me but the sheer depth of the fish, it's got to be around 10 inches thick! Now we've got to unhook it, there's also no way that she's going back without a weight. Martin kindly wraps the tail and we flip her onto her back, the hook literally pops out on the T-bar, (when you look at the picture of the 2/0 Sakuma circle hook and the state of it you'll see why) Fortunately I use a large IKEA bag as a weighing sling which is fairly wide so we lift her between us while holding the tail very firmly and slide the bag underneath her. Richard hooks the scales on and heaves 49lb 1oz! She may have gone slightly more as we are holding the tail up for safety. Also my scales only go to 50lb. I'm simply stunned and don't really know what to say as both Richard and Martin congratulate me and shake my hand. A quick few pictures as to be honest my thoughts turn to getting her back into her environment as soon as possible. I gently pull her the couple of yards back into the shallows, she turns and I release her tail, (stepping back rather quickly at the same time), she does a quick 360 in the water as though she was taking a look at me and getting her bearings, then with a flap of her wings she's gone, and I'm physically and emotionally wrung out!

What can you say after that? I cannot thank both Richard and Martin enough for helping land and weigh her, I really wouldn't have got her in if it wasn't for your efforts. I'm extremely lucky to have got her in anyway, by the star of the circle hook she was lip hooked on one more run and she would have bent it straight, (back to larger hooks for ragworm baits I think).

I try and get back to fishing of sorts but I really cannot muster the concentration so I quickly stick another ragworm on, cast out and just leave it. Richard gets another bite which results in a perfectly formed 4th baby Thorny of about 1lb. We give it another hour but with the tide ebbing fast at 9:20 we agree to call it a night. I lift into the crab rod and there's some weight attached, (this is the bait that has been soaking for nigh on 2 hours now), The fish comes in fairly easily and it's actually a double shot of a small Ray and a dogfish to end the night.

So as I'm laying in bed typing this out right now I'm still a little stunned, I wanted to try for a decent stinger this year as my two previous ones have only been around 3lb each, but where do I go from here? Never in my dreams did I envisage landing a fish that big, and I'll probably never land one that big again in this lifetime, unless I'm lucky enough to hook a decent Tope when we venture down to West Sussex for them next month. It's difficult to explain the awesome power that she had, a top predator in these waters. We've also had 8 Thornbacks between us, 4 each so it would have been a decent session without the stinger.

Good luck if you are out over the weekend, next week – I will be hound hunting somewhere but right now I really need to gather my senses!



Fishing for Schools **Todd's Fishing Adventure** - An Introduction To Angling

Getting young people involved in fishing in the modern era is never going to be an easy thing with all the indoor entertainment that is there these days. There is a feeling in the fishing community that although the statistics for participation have gone up since Covid, we still need more juniors on the bank as it will be them that are the future of angling.

I realize that there are some really good fishing initiatives running throughout the country. Normally there is a junior event arranged which is a great success that hooks youngsters in, but the problem in a lot of cases there is no follow up sessions. Which is where the problem lies.

A few years ago on a Fishing 4 Schools course with Thamesview School, Gravesend I happened to meet a young lad, named Todd, who was really keen on fishing and wanted to learn more, after the 4-session course had finished. For any young person able to get on the Fishing for schools Course, it is a great experience and where their interest in fishing begins. After this course finished I was approached by Todd's mother who asked me if I would be willing to

coach her son, she wanted him to be at the stage where he was able to go fishing on his own, but naturally a adult would always be with him.

To be honest I wasn't sure at first, mainly as I am really busy with the work I do with schools and mental health groups, normally working with groups and not one to one sessions, and for the fact that I do not like to charge, I would prefer a young person to go to a Fishing event that is free, there are a few out there, but normally one offs, not where you can get taught a longer course, which you need if you are going to learn different methods of fishing.

Because I knew the lad was a really keen and nice lad, I agreed to go ahead. We started at Shorne country park, which is perfect for a junior to learn, not the biggest of fish but the variety is excellent and the fishing is normally good. We went through the basics, started on the whip, learnt how to plumb up which is vital in colder conditions and practiced using the disgorger, the one fishing skill that youngsters are really keen to get the hang of it. Its the one thing that parents get concerned about, when their children go fishing, are they going to be able to unhook a deep hooked fish, because in a lot of cases the parents have never been fishing themselves. It is one of the advantages of working one to one that you can give the student plenty of individual attention and in no time the lad was really confident using the disgorger.









Over a few years, mainly in school breaks we have learnt a variety of skills including Whip, Pole, waggler and the feeder and along the way at Birthdays and Christmas Todd has got many new bits of fishing gear including rods and reels. Along the way I have met the Todd's Grandparents who have brought him and stayed with him throughout the sessions, in particular his grandmother was keen to learn more about fishing herself. I also had a few sessions with the lad's father which was good. I always look at it that if the family are involved and get to know more about fishing, they are more likely to take their children fishing and can also pass on advice to them.

My last session coaching the lad was at my club water D.D.A.P.S (Sutton) on the banjo lake, where I was able to get the lad a guest ticket. We concentrated on feeder fishing, looking at making groundbait and pellet for the method feeder, the lad had a really good session catching Carp and Bream on the feeder and some good silver fish on the waggler. Todd was particularly pleased with the bream he caught mainly because it was a nice sized fish but also it not a species that he had caught on the other venues we use.

It is always good for a young angler to try different venues, for the Experience and to see the different variety of fish, and good to take Him around my local club waters T.W.A.P.S and D.D.A.P.S to see their Waters. After the last session, the lad's mother informed me that her Todd wanted to join a Fishing club, and asked my advice about what club to join, either of my two clubs would be good clubs to join, but because the lad comes





from the Gravesend area and I know there is not a waiting list to join, I advised on joining the T.W.A.P.S club. His mother has paid his subscription and he and this mother are now members of the Club. His mother has been a rock, throughout our coaching sessions.

This is something I had always been working to with Todd, but something you cannot rush, but to see a young lad join his local fishing Club, which could mean a hobby for life, really means a lot to me.

With some much appreciated help from The Tackle Box at Dartford, this years Fishing for schools, Kent programme, is now underway. The two schools are Thamesview school and Gravesend and Stone Lodge Dartford.

These courses are a mixture of education and Fishing skills, that forms part of the Cast Level one course, which focuses on; The Countryside code, Relevant Health & Safety issues, Weather conditions and fish care. So although we love our fishing there is an Educational focus to the course.

The Golden Years of Coarse Fishing

Tench, worms and monster gudgeon

After my brief travelogue about canals and locks, I'll continue with my memoirs about my 65 years of fishing. In the words of the great Welsh rugby fan Max Boyce: "I was there", which just about sums up my early years of coarse fishing at some of the most famous waters in the country and with some of the legends of the era.

I never had the drive, dedication or time to hit the 'big time' with my big fish captures, I had a few, but spread my net too widely, never concentrating too long on one water or one species at a time.

The glorious Tench was a case in point. I've caught hundreds in my time from all over Kent and Sussex, probably my favourite fish with its olive green flanks and little red eye looking up at you from the net, after falling for a large juicy lobworm. No prepacked baits for me, just home-caught worms from my garden lawn, maggots, cockles or mussels free lined between the weed beds.

Worming was an event in itself on a hot summer night, after rain and with no wind. The worms hated wind and scurried back into their lairs at the slightest hint of it. How many of you youngsters have ever been on a 2 hours night worming expedition, armed with a bright torch, bucket and carpet slippers? Here's a new use for your mobile phones give it a try. You have to use stealth, worms are still the best overall natural bait for most big fish, just ask Thomas Lochrane the Keston Carp expert and his group the K.L.C. of which I am an honorary member! It worked 60 years ago, and it still works today.

You need to be dead quiet, with a strong grip and back, to comb your garden lawn and borders for gigantic lob worms, some over 8 inches long. The soil must be damp, best after heavy rain, as you creep around slowly pulling these almost eel like creatures from their holes as they lay out on top of the wet grass in the pitch black. In the 1960s I've filled a small bucket in under 2 hours work, I presume you can still do it today, although I haven't tried for years, with my dicky back! Don't pull too hard or you will break them, get a grip and pull very slowly and straight. I'm sure I would have won the world worm catching championships if there ever was one!! Some dark nights the worms lay right out of their holes and you just pick them up, my Dads Dahlia borders were the best, just on open soil.

Sometimes we used to venture further afield on our worming quest. The hallowed turf of Bromley Town F.C. and Hayesford Park saw epic tussles, long before they ever got into the National League. We were even challenged by the police one night, who wouldn't believe that we were hunting worms and not breaking into the grandstand. One copper was going fishing himself the next day so we palmed him off with a tin full and how the roach of the river Medway just loved them.

Often we had so many worms that we sold them to Ken Browns Tackle shop in Homesdale Road for one old penny a piece, and many a fine Tench, Carp or Roach were caught after our achievements the night before. Today you can't beat a good old lob worm

for specimen Perch that are coming out of many of the waters listed in the Freshwater Informer, Warren Edwards swears by worms or prawn for big Perch, don't pay £15 for 50 lobworms off the internet, catch your own, it's great fun!

My early Tench catches at Keston and the Rookery were mainly taken on worm. These were generally fished freelined on a size 8 hook beside the Lilly beds, laying on with a small quill float or silver paper as a bite indicator. In the Wealden ponds around Tonbridge and on the backwaters of the Medway, I had many tench on float fished maggot, and at Horton Kirby top lake when it was still being worked in 1962 or so, small tench were prolific in a mixed bag of roach, Rudd and Gudgeon. The huge Gudgeon in the lower lake were like small barbel, I recall, and I am sure I must have broken the record there one day in a bag of 118 Gudgeon weighing nearly 20lbs. On March 8th 1962, it's all in my diary and I remember it well! The Gudgeon record then was 4ozs 4drms and the causeway between the two lakes was brand new with no trees or bushes on it 61 years ago, just bare gravel banks where I fished facing towards the distant railway viaduct. Two

shillings a day payable to the bailiff on the bank. Oh, for those glorious days again!


The squeaky Gudgeon of Redmire Pool were another feature in my early fishing life. Although we had no record breakers from the nutrient rich lake, fish for them we did,off the Dam with float fished maggot when the carp fishing became too exasperating in 1966. Chris Yates also fished for them, but surprisingly never broke the record there as well, as far as we all know?

In 1968 I fished at Burghfield pits near Reading with Jim Gibbinson, when he lived at Mortimer. Several times we fished for the tench that were prolific there at the time. We fished at night and

had good bags of fish to just under 5lbs. In those far off days a 5lbs tench was a super specimen, when the record still stood at just 8lbs 8ozs, but it wasn't until July 1972 that I finally broke the 5lbs barrier with several such fish from a beautiful small reservoir in the midlands just north of Northampton. Sywell Reservoir was famous for its pike, and Wagstaff had a 28 from there in 1962. The tench fishing was legendary, and members of the Tenchfishers like Pete and Janet Jackson secretly fished here for years before the news got out.

Old estate lakes were famous for the huge tench that they were producing at the time in the mid 60s. Waters like Southill Park in Bedfordshire, Blenheim Lake, Bowwood, Castle Ashby and in Kent, Johnson's Lake at Snodland. They all had their devotees like Peter Drennan, Frank Guttfield, Bill Quinlan and Stephen Harper, and in Kent Steve Edwards and Jim Gibbinson at Snodland. Sywell was no different, Bob Church, Pete Jackson, Phil Smith, Mervyn Wilkinson and one Chris Tarrant all fished here with me that memorable year of 1972, and what fishing it was among the reed fringed margins high up on the two arms of the 180 acre reservoir.

Night fishing was not allowed, it was strictly 8am – dusk on a day ticket from the water board office at the gate on the morning of your fishing day. None of this advanced booking, which so infuriates me today. We all camped overnight in nearby lay-bys and turned up at 8am at the gates to get our day passes. Can't remember what it cost, no more than 5 old

shillings, for the best tench fishing in the country at that time! We developed metal Dexion trollies to cart all our gear and maggots over the Dam wall and up to our chosen swims far up on the west bank near to a huge weed bed and reed fringed swims where the tench were feeding on larvae and caddis and corixa larvae prolific in the weed up there. We used swim feeders and treble maggot on a size 10 hook, and held the rod to feel for bites, just like we did on the Avon for the Barbel.

I had many Tench up there, including my best of 5lbs 6ozs and a brace of 5lbs 2ozs,good fish for those days. Bob and Peter all had fish over 6lbs, but they were local and could fish every week end in 1972. Today double figure fish are caught up, there, but I

don't know what the ticketing arrangements are these days, if it's a club or syndicate water today. Once it was the best Tench water in the country, but in later years Kent could rival it with the fine fishing at Snodland and in the Stour Valley near Canterbury. I never carried on with the tench once Bewl Water opened in 1978, but it is indeed Bewl which now holds great Tench under the old cages area, where bait fishing is now allowed so I believe from the boats.

I have tench in my garden ponds today, but I rarely see them, they really are the bottom feeders of the fish world. In June they can sometimes be seen basking in the weedbeds, just like the carp, but I've never known them take a floating bait like crust or mixer, unless of course you know differently! Mixers for Tench off the top? Chris Ball May know a thing or two about that?

I must get down to the Tench pool at Greenacres fishery this summer. An old bomb crater full of good fish so I am told, and try and catch a fish I haven't landed now for over 40 years. Tinca tinca.





Big fish, in natural waters are at the top of the pyramid, so few in numbers. I've often thought that when conditions are 'cock on' and all the fish are feeding hard, those big fish are completely outnumbered and more often than not are beaten to our baits or lures. In these conditions we are too busy hooking, playing, and landing fish, that our bait is unlikely to be picked up by the specimens we're after. When the weather is not favourable however, enough to put the bulk of the fish off feeding, it's times like these that might just give us the edge we're after. Let's face it, catching big fish isn't an exact science, if your location is right, avoiding unwanted fish leaves your swim undisturbed long enough for the big'un to come our way.

Fly-fishing for carp



signs of fish. After a complete circuit of the lake, I decided that nowhere looked any better than where I was already fishing.

I decided to change tactics and feed smaller 8mm floaters, in an effort to induce some fish to feed. I decided to 'juice up' the pellets with halibut oil too, my thought was the scent leaking off would attract the attention of carp even if they didn't see them? Four hours into my session and, I finally saw the first carp take some floaters, then a couple more fish joined in. The only problem was I'd also caught the attention of a Canada goose and several mallards, Doh! Six hours after starting and I caught my first fish, a grass carp of 14lbs, then another grass carp of 16lbs. What was strange was almost all the feeding fish were grass carp? Earlier, I'd seen carp repeatedly jumping in the far margins, could this be the prelude to spawning? If so, it would explain the lack of interest from the commons and mirrors to my loose feed. This was later confirmed when a mid-double mirror spent milt all over my unhooking mat as I unhooked it. I gradually managed to hold several fish within my casting range and caught another grass carp, a small common and a super ghost common of nineteen and a half pounds, which fought like a tiger taking all my fly line and 30yds of backing. Fortunately, no one was fishing the pegs below me as it kited into

For the last few years, I've filled in by fly fishing for carp when `the dog days of summer' arrive, a period when the trout fishing dies and it's unsafe to fish for pike, my other quarry. To be honest I've enjoyed the carp fishing so much that as each year passes, I look forward to `the dog days of summer' when I can start carp fishing again.

Last season was my best yet, in four short months I caught over three hundred and fifty, mainly double figure fish, with ten twenties and a thirty-three pounder, a new fly caught PB. So, when I got a message from Colin Beddoe, a recent carp fly-fishing convert, telling me the carp were having it off the surface at Elphicks, I just couldn't resist a visit. Colin had a very successful day fishing Kettles Lake, catching his first twenty pounder of the season, along with several doubles.

It was a cold morning with a strong North Westerly wind blowing down the length of Kettles when I arrived. The only calm area was the last three pegs at the 'top end', where a line of trees offered some shelter. I started feeding 11mm floating trout pellets very sparingly, in an effort to draw fish towards me. I was very cautious not to feed too much as the wind was taking the loose feed downwind and would potentially take the fish with them. After a couple of hours of trickle feeding pellets and with no signs of fish, I went 'walkabout'. I headed to the bottom end of the lake to see if any fish were feeding on my free offerings? If carp were there, it would be easy to concentrate the feed and the fish, unfortunately there were no



the margins, which made it very difficult to have a clear line of sight, gradually I managed to coax it back into my swim before scooping it into my waiting net.

Kayak event

Last year Bogdan Pascaru managed to persuade Bewl Water's management to allow kayaks on the reservoir for a trial fishing event. The competition was well attended and a great success. It was such an enjoyable event that everyone was keen that Bewl should be added to the venues they visit each year. This year's competition was going to be a two day 'festival of fun'. I say that because the kayak community, although rather small, is a friendly bunch, everyone knows everyone who's participating and they fish, camp, and socialise together. This year's event was attended by most of the successful 'Team England Kayak Squad', the current 'World Champions', including Mike McGuire the individual 'World Champion', so the competition was going to be very competitive. I attended, in my capacity as a local 'expert', who has spent forty odd years fly-fishing and lure fishing Bewl reservoir. I did a



brief speech before the competitors made a 'mad dash' to their secret spots. Their target was to catch, one trout which had to be retained, one pike and five perch, each day. The pike and perch were measured and released but could be 'up-graded' during the event. These guys take their fishing very seriously, as could be seen by all the equipment they managed to load into their kayaks.

It's worth mentioning that Grafham and Rutland reservoirs also hold good numbers of specimen zander that fall to the same methods and tactics.

So far, my catches have been dismal, while I've been guiding. However, time fishing and enjoyed is never wasted. Everywhere I've been recently has been suffering with colder than normal water temperatures for the time of year, coupled with a succession of cold easterly winds, never a good direction for fishing. Well, that's all my excuses out of the way, fortunately I've been teaching my clients how to 'fish and search' large bodies of water from a boat. So, any fish caught are a bonus and very welcome when they do eventually turn up. I was guiding on Rutland on a very windy day last week, searching a very large shallow bay. Most of the boats around us were trout fishing, hugging the shoreline for shelter. My boat partner and I, once we were sure how to cast safely under the conditions, started drifting out into open water. I was regularly checking the depths on my echo sounder, trying to identify potential holding features. We then decided to anchor up towards the downwind shore, in ten to fifteen feet of water. Anchoring allowed us to slow our presentation down and make several casts through the same area, sometimes with different flies or different retrieve patterns, so much to try and learn! Every half an hour or so we re-positioned along the shelf, as we searched for an elusive pike. When we tired of this we returned to drifting, although this covers huge amounts of water it does require the pike to be prepared to chase. As the wind increased, we headed up-wind seeking some shelter and again dropped the hook in shallow water. My boat partner had a gentle take, followed by a savage hit, 'fish on'. Although a small pike it was his first on the fly and firsts are always the hardest and most important. As I keep saying 'confidence is vital', a confident angler will always succeed as he knows what he's using works and it's only a matter of time before he catches!



A recent series of sessions perfectly demonstrates this. Following on from what I considered to be a rather poor pike season overall I seemed to be having a lean time on the tench and bream front. I was getting action, but it was very slow, and bites were hard to come by. One of the family bought me a birthday present that included a new hat with the inscription 'lucky fishing hat' on it. I could not wait to try it out.

As it happened, I was due to go out tench fishing with

the following week to a small club lake where he had never been before. On the day for sociable reasons, we decided to fish in the same swim with Martin on the right and me on the left both fishing up to the edge of extensive beds of Lilly pads – the ideal spot, it would seem. To cut a long story short, the lucky hat failed me as Martin went on to catch 7 tench and lose several, while I could only manage a small Perch and a Rudd! To further compound the hat's inabilities another angler moved in to my left and managed to get amongst the tench as well. What can you say? It may be that the hat was a slow starter however as the following session on a different water saw my luck improve with several decent fish on my float tactics tench, bream and a bonus carp. The only thing was that although I had the hat with me, I had left it in the car! I did even better the following trip and had decided to wear the hat. I managed to land eight good fish, again on the float. Just to make mincemeat of the lucky hat idea though, Martin was with me again and he had about thirteen (unlucky for some) nice fish carp, tench and bream – and he was not wearing a hat! Make what you will of that. However, it does seem now that the pendulum has finally swung back in my direction and

since these events took place (early May) I have been getting consistently good results, without really changing much about my approach - tackle or bait wise. It just seems that at times you just can't get it right and then suddenly you can do no wrong.

I am as you might imagine looking forward to the river season opening this month although I have no firm plans about where I will go yet. It has been a relatively wet spring and I am suspecting that conditions and levels will be good for the 16th. It is always a bit of a dilemma what to do at this time of the year, particularly if my tench fishing hat is working properly. I normally find a way to get a bit of both worlds on the go and I think that this 'choice' is guite a nice problem to have, and I am hoping that both river and tench hats are going to be on their best behaviour.

As you can gather from the above, I am not at all superstitious and certainly don't believe in fate. It never ceases to amaze me how large a percentage of our species seem to be happy to just believe what they want to without any real evidence for it, in fact quite the contrary. I always remember my old grandad believing that the world was flat. No number of photographs from space or accounts from scientists could persuade him otherwise. Mind you, he had some other strange beliefs. Had they been true, I would have been struck down long ago.
